

#### High Priced Wheat is Aussured for a Year at Least

"As a consequence of Russia's isolation, the exports of wheat from that county since July 1 have been only 12,064,000 bush. 000 of 9,000,000 bushels, mostly els, all of which went out before the declaration of war by Germany. During a similar period ago the exports were 69,416,000 bushels. It is said that Russia has between 100,000,000 and 150,000,000 bushels of wheat to spare, and is anxious to ship it. Letters from the interior of Russia have reported wheat selling at 40c to 50c a bushel but since the recent advance in European and American markets the price in Odessa, the chief Black sea port, has risen to \$1.19.

"What are called the Danubian shipments of wheat-principally Roumanian-are also barred from the European markets by prohibition of the Roumanian government and the closing of the Turkish strait. Since harvest the Danubian shipments have aggregated only 2,475,000 bushels, as compared with 29,564,000 a year ago and 37,216,000 two years ago. Owing to short crops, the shipments from Argentine, India and Australia also exhibit sharp deficiencies for the period.

WAR TAX RULING.

#### Confusion in Regard to Transfers of Vendors' Leins

Herewith is a copy of recent rulings if Judge A. S. Walker, internal revenue collector for the Third district of Texas, relative to the placing of documentary stamps upon conveyance of real estate, transfers notes, jurats of notaries public and certificates of acknowledg-

"The ruling of this office is that a deed conveying land is taxable under the Act of Oct. 22, 1914, only to the extent of the cash consideration or its notes are given in part payment the lien being of course retained to secure them these notes are taxable as promissory notes. To illustrate, if A conveys to B a piece of land for the considera. tion of \$2,000, \$1,000 in cash and \$1,000 in vendor lien notes. A should stamp the deed to the extent of \$1.00, and B should stamp the notes to the extent of 2c for each hundred dollars in each note.

"In case of a simple release of vendor lien note, the stamp tax has no application. In case of a transfer of vendor lien notes, if the instrument contains a provision under which time of payment of the notes is extended, or under which other persons than the original makers of the notes assume their payment, the transfer if made on or after Dec. 1, 1914, would be taxable on the same basis as the notes transferred.

"In case of a transfer, either by endorsement on the note or by execution of a written instrument to that effect, if the attitude of the maker of the notes is not changed as a result of the transfer, the stamp tax has no application.

"The jurate of a notary public to an affidavit or his certificate of acknowledgement to an instrument is not taxable


#### WEATHER

Hatching Early Pullets

If citizens or farmers wish to gin to get ready for them at year is to hatch pullets early. It is the early hatches from rived that are the largest money er. The early hatched cockrels can be marketed in almost any market when they attain a weight of three-fourths of a pound to a pound and a half each, which they should reach at about six to ten weeks of age, respectively, at a greater any other time of their lives. The early hatched pullets, if properly grown, should begin to lay in the fall at the time when eggs are scarce and high in

Here are a few facts to remember: Pullets must be well matured before they will lay many eggs. Pallets that lay in the fall before cold weather sets in will, as a rule, lay all winter. It is the early hatched pullets that produce eggs in the fall and early winter, when prices are high.

February, March and April are the months to do your hatch. ing in order to secure early hatched pullets. Yearling and 2-year-old hens do not lay many eggs in the fall, as they are molting at that time, and the feed they consume goes not only to keep up the energy and life of the birds, but also to put on or grow a new coat of feathers.
