

## C. A. BENGTON SHOT DOWN

### Well Known Citizen Killed at Lightner By Tenant Yesterday Morning--Body Brought Here and Prepared for Shipment to Old Home in Travis County.

C. A. Bengtson, a prominent citizen and large land owner of the western portion of this county, was shot and instantly killed as he stepped from the west bound Frisco at Lightner, his home, yesterday morning about 11:00 o'clock. C. G. Simmons, aged 56 years, and a tenant of the dead man, has been lodged in jail at Ballinger charged with the killing.

News of the tragedy was received here a few minutes afterwards in a telephone message to C. A. Anderson, an intimate friend of the dead man, who, in company with Sam Moffatt, Sheriff J. C. Wall and District Attorney Walter Early, left immediately for the scene in Mr. Anderson's automobile. Upon their arrival Simmons surrendered to Sheriff Wall, who later turned the prisoner over to Sheriff Puett of Concho county upon his arrival from Eden, where he was at the time of the killing.

According to evidence brought out at the inquest, which was conducted yesterday afternoon at Lightner, Bengtson, who came to Brady Monday night to attend to some private business matters, returned home on the train yesterday morning. On arrival he started for his home

located three or four hundred yards north of the depot, passing the building in which the postoffice is located, and where Simmons was employed by him as assistant postmaster. Simmons is said to have secreted himself behind the building on seeing Bengtson alight from the train, and as he neared the building stepped out and fired on him with a single barrel shot gun loaded with buck shot. His aim was bad, however, and only a few shot took effect, the thumb of the left hand being pierced and one or two fingers lacerated. One bullet also shattered the right hand. With the firing of the first shot Bengtson turned and circled around the building and started for his residence, a short distance away, and as he came into view again Simmons fired the second shot, the full charge striking near the center of the back, one ball passing entirely through the body. Bengtson fell to the ground and Simmons advanced on him, re-loading his gun as he walked toward his victim, and when within a few feet, fired the third time. The left arm was shattered and a large hole torn in the left side by the full charge from Simmons's deadly weapon, one of the bullets

passing out at the right nipple. Simmons then went to his home nearby and telephoned for officers to come and get him, that he had killed a man and was ready to give up.

Simmons made no statement to the officers which would throw any light on the cause which led to the killing, but told two traveling men who passed through Lightner a few minutes after the occurrence of the tragedy in an automobile enroute to Brady, that the dead man had wronged his daughter several

months ago, and that he had only learned of it Monday, and determined to kill him at the first opportunity.

Deceased came to this country about four years ago from Travis county, where he was born and reared, and where his parents, several brothers and sisters and other relatives at present reside. He was a man of an unassuming, inoffensive nature, big hearted and jovial, and made friends readily with those with whom he came in contact. He made frequent business trips to

this city since locating at Lightner, and had a host of friends among all classes of citizens of the town, and those who knew him most intimately are unwilling to believe that he was guilty of the conduct with which Simmons charged him, but are rather inclined to the belief that the trouble may be traced to some business transaction between the two men, over which a dispute arose last week.

The body was brought to this city late yesterday afternoon by Undertaker Roy O. Wilkerson in an automobile and taken to the undertaking parlors of O. D. Mann & Sons, where it was prepared for shipment to Austin tonight, near which place interment will probably take place Sunday.

Mr. Bengtson was about 38 years of age and married, but had no children. His wife was

taken to Austin only last Friday and placed in a sanitarium for treatment, and the news of the tragedy was a great shock to her. Other surviving relatives are his aged parents, who reside at New Sweden, near Austin; two brothers, Victor of Austin and Andrew of New Sweden; two sisters, Mesdames George Lyckman of Lund, Travis county and Frank Johnson of New Sweden.

Joe Lyckman of Austin, a brother-in-law, will arrive here this afternoon to accompany the body to Austin.

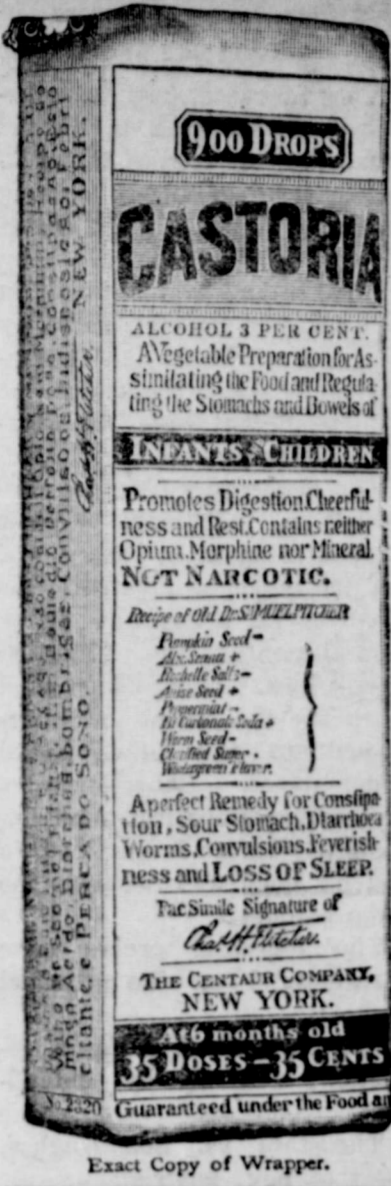

**Auto Magnates.**  
All that is required now-a-days to be a transportation magnate is to own an auto. In nearly all of the large and many of the smaller cities the "jitney" bus is cutting into the profits of the street car companies and making owners of autos richer. When it was at first suggested that owners of machines could make any money carrying passengers for a five-cent fare it was thought to be impossible. A few wiser than the rest started "jitney" lines with their machines. It has been demonstrated in San Francisco that the owner of a car can clear from six to ten dollars a day by carrying passengers at the "jitney" rate. 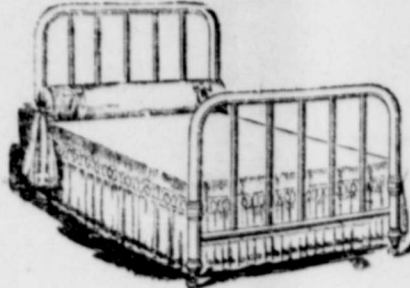
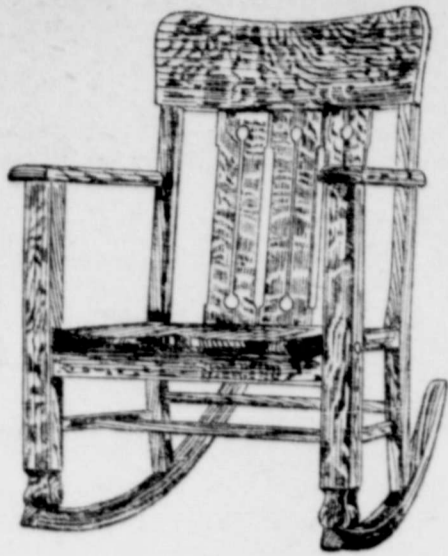

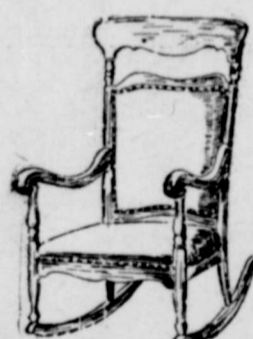

Cotton will be a surplus crop and the hundreds of millions of dollars which it will bring year after year will steadily add to the wealth of the cotton belt.

It is going to be hard, very hard, to get diversified farming generally established through the cotton belt. It will force hardships on the farmers. It will strain the business men to the limit to finance the farmers while they are learning the new system. There will be failure after failure in raising crops and in handling livestock and many will become disheartened. The general prosperity, the freedom from debt and the regular increase in the wealth of individuals and of communities that diversified farming will bring are well worth the needed sacrifice.—Ex.

A farmer's wife who owns five milk cows and sixty hens, sold \$415.80 worth of butter, cream, eggs, chickens and turkeys during the year 1914.

The first seven months of 1914 she sold 754 pounds of butter in San Saba for the total of \$188.50.

During five months of the year she sold \$26.00 worth of eggs. There is no account of the other seven months.

She sold \$56.27 worth of chickens during the year and \$90.30 worth of turkeys.

After the creamery started up she sold \$54.34 worth of cream. During the first seven months

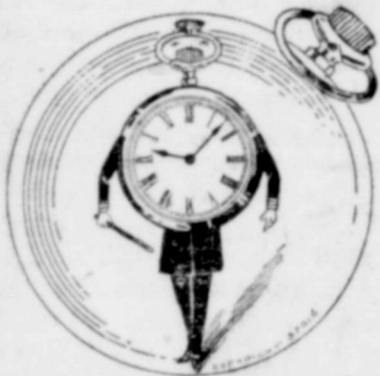
