BIG LIST OF PREMIUMS

PRIZES OFFERED IN POULTRY SHOW MARCH 6TH.

Unusually Large List is Made Up Among the Business and Professional Men of Brady

The committee from the Brady Commercial Club having in charge the work of securing a list of premiums to be offered in the Poultry Show here Saturday of next week, reports that they have met with hearty responses on all sides, and that the list which they have secured is one of the largest ever raised here for this purpose.

Other details of the show are in the hands of competent committees, and all preliminary work will be disposed of several days in advance of the opening date.

It is the ambition of the promoters to make this one of the biggest events of the kind ever held in Brady, and if the success with which the premium committee has met the past week is a criterion, their fondest hopes will be realized.

The directors of the Commercial Club in putting on this show have one object in view above all others, and that is to encourage the raising of poultry on the farms of the county, and to this end have established a class for farmers alone. There will be two first and second premiums for each breed of fowls—one for those produced on the farm and one for the city raised. Another deviation from the usual rules

has also been made by the committee in charge, in that exhibitors will not be required to show pens, entries of trios and single fowl being permitted instead.

It is requested that all exhibitors who can do so bring their own coops, as the number in possession of the Commercial Club is limited.

BARN IS BURNED. SOLID CAR OF EGGS

Dan Hurd Loses Building and Contents Wednesday Night.

The big barn on the Dan Hurd place a few miles northeast of the city was totally destroyed by fire about 10:00 o'clock Wednesday night. The building contained a large quantity of feed stuffs, wagons, buggies, harness and farm machinery, including a threshing machine, and the loss on building and contents is estimated to be between \$2000 and \$3000, with insurance amounting to \$1000.

When discovered the flames were bursting through the roof of the structure near the center of the building, and members of the family confined their efforts to getting what machinery and live stock out of the building they could reach. By quick work they were able to save three head of young calves, several head of hogs, a few bushels of corn and maize and the threshing machine. One calf, a large quantity of maize and corn and several sets of harness were destroyed.

The fire could be plainly seen from the city and several citizens went to the scene in automobiles, but the building had fallen in before they arrived.

Runnels county is petitioning its court for \$200,000 road bonds.

Precinct No. 1 is asking for an election on a \$100,000 issue and Precinct No. 2 is petitioning the court for the same amount.

From reliable sources it is understood that the issuance of these bonds is looked upon with much favor by the taxpayers of both precincts. The people of the county are realizing the value of the good roads in other counties and are awake to the situation of the benefits which would come to their own county in having first class highways.

Irion county roads are being built in a most satisfactory manner with the bonds issued last year, and if Runnels county succeeds in voting \$200,000 bonds it will then be up to Tom Green county to do something to connect the links.

BARN IS BURNED.

SOLID CAR OF EGGS

Dan Hurd Loses Building and Contents Wednesday Night.

H. P. Roddie & Co. Make Large Shipment to New York.

The big barn on the Dan Hurd place a few miles northeast of the city was totally destroyed by fire about 10:00 o'clock Wednesday night. The building contained a large quantity of feed stuffs, wagons, buggies, harness and farm machinery, including a threshing machine, and the loss on building and contents is estimated to be between \$2000 and \$3000, with insurance amounting to \$1000.

When discovered the flames were bursting through the roof of the structure near the center of the building, and members of the family confined their efforts to getting what machinery and live stock out of the building they could reach. By quick work they were able to save three head of young calves, several head of hogs, a few bushels of corn and maize and the threshing machine. One calf, a large quantity of maize and corn and several sets of harness were destroyed.

The fire could be plainly seen from the city and several citizens went to the scene in automobiles, but the building had fallen in before they arrived.



A SLANDER OF THE SOUTH.

The following is taken from a recent issue of "Life":

"Our friends down South, being sure that the negroes are inferior, deny them advantages and provide inferior schools for negro children in order that they will continue to be inferior and thus prove the correctness of the contention of the scientists and sentimentalists that the negro is inferior. After all, there is nothing quite so satisfying as the feeling that you have got things fixed so that you will always have an inferior race in your midst."

Life usually contains a fair assortment of wit, humor and fact. In this instance, however, it is the editor, and not the contents of the magazine, that stands pre-eminent as a monstrous joke. If ever a man was flayed by the press of the South, it was the editor of Life, for his ill-timed, venomous and absolute false statement.

The matter is quite aptly disposed of by the editor of the Fort Worth Record in the following:

Life is a journal of pictures and comment. Life is a New York publication. Like all New York publications, it is a journal of higher civilization.

It poses as a pictorial humorist and universal educator.

Its editor professes to be well informed and as profound as Solomon.

Life should confine itself to humorous epics.

Texas does not deny negroes educational advantages.

Texas does not provide inferior schools for negro children.

When it comes to educational advantages the color line is not drawn.

Children of the black race are given good schools and excellent teachers.

Prairie View college for negroes is a state institution.

White property owners of Texas tax themselves for the support of this state school and for public schools everywhere within the boundary lines of the state for negro children.

The editor of Life should visit Texas.

If it is impossible for him to get away from Manhattan island then he should get in touch with Texas negro educators, or he should address a communication asking for information, to the state superintendent of public instruction.

Why not do justice to "our friends down South"?

Why not tell northern readers of Life that for forty years the white property owners of the South have taxed themselves to educate the children or the grandchildren of former slaves?

"The contention of scientists and sentimentalists that the negro is inferior" should not worry the editor of Life.

If he holds to the contrary, that's his business. There isn't the slightest objection on the part of Texas to the editor of Life looking upon the negro either as his equal or as his superior.

With some, it is a matter of education.

With others it is a matter of habit.

With others, a matter of taste.

This is a free country.

There are no hobbles on the editor of Life or others of his way of thinking.

But he should not spread the slander abroad that the people of the South deny educational advantages to the children of the

blacks.

Texas is a Southern state. A majority of its people are southerners. They enter a plea of not guilty to the indictment by this New York editor.

Last week's issue of the Rochelle Record announced the retirement of Laurence Haddow from the active editorial and business management of the paper, W. A. Hamilton assuming charge the first of last week. The Record has been published by Mr. Haddow for the past three or four years, and has enjoyed a very liberal support from the progressive merchants of that thriving little city. The demand for these animals has proven so great that Mr. Cogdell has decided to ship another car here within the next few weeks, and is booking a number of advance sales during his visit this week.

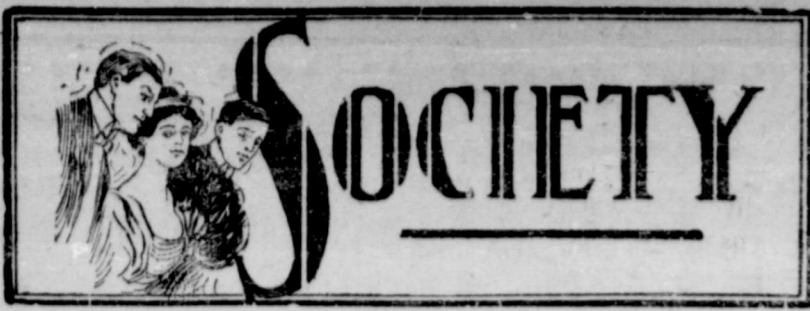

MID-TEXAS TEACHERS.

Their New Association to Start With Meeting March 26-27.

Preparations are being made for the big association meeting of school teachers to be held in Brownwood Friday and Saturday, March 26th and 27th, under the auspices of the Mid-Texas Teachers' Association, when nearly one thousand teachers are expected to participate.

It will be remembered that the Mid-Texas Teachers' Association was organized only a few months ago as a result largely of the activities of County Supt. of Schools E. L. White, with a view to affording teachers opportunities county teachers institutes can not afford, especially in the matter of securing the presence, co-operation and lectures of the foremost educators in the country. As a result of this centralization McCulloch county teachers will on March 26th and 27th have the pleasure of hearing lectures by Hon. W. F. Doughty, State Supt. of Public Instruction; Dr. J. L. Henderson of the University of Texas, Dr. H. T. Musselman, of Dallas; C. A. Tripp, Director of Extension Department of the College of Industrial Arts, Denton; Mrs. P. V. Pennybacker, President of the National Federation of Women's Clubs, and many leading local school men.

Supt. E. L. White of McCulloch county is chairman of the

program committee and has attended to most of the details of arranging for the speakers for the big meeting, which is sure to attract wide attention among teachers of this and other counties.

The sessions of the association will be held at the Howard Payne college and the Brownwood High school buildings, except when public meetings are held, when some larger auditorium will be used.

At present more than eleven hundred teachers are within the counties in this organization and it is expected next year to include other counties, affecting nearly two thousand teachers, but all the teachers in this section of the state may take part in the proceedings of the coming meeting.

The program of the association meeting as announced by Chairman E. L. White is divided into general sessions, grammar school section, primary section, high school section, and county superintendents' section. Separate programs have been arranged for each section. The general session on the morning of March 26th will include welcome addresses, and a musical program. Supt. Fleming of Ballinger will respond to the addresses of welcome. The feature of this session will be an address by Dr. J. L. Henderson, visitor of schools of the University of Texas.

Other addresses during the general sessions will be by Dr. Tripp of the Extension Department of the College of Industrial Arts at Denton; Mrs. P. V. Pennybacker, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs; Dr. H. T. Musselman of the Texas School Journal, Dallas; Hon. W. F. Doughty State Superintendent of Public Instruction; Miss Floris Culver, Specialist in Industrial Art of the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, and many other speakers of state and national reputation.

BABY BEEF CLUB.

Wm. Connally Perfects Organization Among Students.

Wm. Connally of San Marcos, a representative of the State Department of Agriculture, was in the city last Friday interesting Brady and McCulloch county citizens in the work of this department of the state government.

While in the city Mr. Connally visited the high school and delivered a short address to the student body. In his talk the importance of gaining a practical as well as theoretical knowledge of agriculture and kindred subjects by the boys and girls of Texas schools was strongly presented, and he called attention to the fact that in this age of the world's history it was vitally important that during the school life of the boys and girls of the country they be taught the rudiments of some useful occupation in order that they may be the better prepared to fight life's battles which come to them in after years. No better method of preparation has been devised, according to the speaker, than is offered in the addition of the subject of agriculture to the course of study prescribed for the high school students of Texas, the organization of Baby Beef and Hog clubs, Girls' Canning clubs, Egg clubs, and other organizations, by which the younger generation is given a practical knowledge that will prove of inestimable value in later years.

At the close of Mr. Connally's address a Baby Beef and Hog club was organized among the students, and the club starts off with an enthusiastic membership of 60 or 70.

A mass meeting of the business men of the city was held at the Commercial club rooms at 4:30 Friday afternoon, at which time Mr. Connally presented the matter of organization of a local branch of the Co-Operative Marketing Bureau. The bureau is conducted by the managers of the state's Bonded Warehouse System, and the detailed workings of the bureau were fully explained. Under the plan, as outlined by Mr. Connally, the bureau works similar to a telephone system, with Austin as "central," and the towns of the state representing the "subscriber." The "subscribers" collect a list of farm products, poultry, live stock, or anything of value which the owner desires to sell and sends it in to the "central" bureau at Austin each week. These reports are all combined into one list and sent to each one of the "subscriber" stations, where they are placed on file for inspection of buyers. In this way a man in South Texas who wants a car of maize, a flock of sheep, a bunch of cattle, or anything which the North, East or West Texas man wishes to sell, he can locate what he wants by inspecting the lists on file at his nearest station.

This service is free, and, when the system is thoroughly perfected, will prove of inestimable value to the citizenship of the

state in bringing seller and buyer together.

A motion to organize the local bureau met with unanimous approval at the close of Mr. Connally's address, and Judge F. M. Newman was named as president and County Superintendent E. L. White as secretary.

At the meeting it was definitely decided to organize Baby Beef and Hog clubs throughout the county. Mr. Connally stated that he would be glad to return here at some time in the near future and assist in this work, and suggested that the matter be taken in charge by the Commercial Club. This was done, and Supt. White was requested to arrange the itinerary. The work of organizing the county will require a week's time, and every school in the county will be visited. The personnel of the party which will undertake the active work of organization will include Mr. Connally, C. C. French of Ft. Worth, the Industrial agents of both the Santa Fe and Frisco railroads, County Superintendent E. L. White, Secretary T. P. Grant of the Brady Commercial club, representatives of both local banks, and a number of representative business men of the city.

The exact date of starting the work has not yet been determined, but will likely be the second week in next month.
