COUNCIL MEETING.

City Fathers Hold Lengthy Session Tuesday Night.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the city council Tuesday night proved to be a rather long drawn out affair, although only routine matters were disposed of, and the hour of 1:00 had struck before final adjournment was taken.

All members were present at the session, at which Mayor A. C. Baze presided.

City Marshal J. M. Anderson presented his report for the month of February showing the following receipts for the month: City taxes, \$43.75; penalties, \$4.36; fines, \$22.08; occupation taxes, \$3.34; dog tags, \$55.00. The report was approved and ordered filed.

A list of rules and regulations which have been adopted by the Board of Managing Trustees of the water and light department was presented to the council and duly ratified.

Because of the fact that the city's hog law has been invali-

dated by a decision of the court of civil appeals, a new ordinance was presented and finally passed at the Tuesday night session. The old ordinance prohibited the keeping of hogs within the corporate limits of the city, and was practically the same as the one in force in Coleman. A test case in that city was carried to the civil appeals court, and resulted in a decision that the keeping of hogs within a prescribed limit could not be prohibited, but could only be regulated. An ordinance to "regulate" the keeping of hogs within the limits of the city was passed under a suspension of rules. The ordinance in full appears in another column of this issue.

FIRE TRUCK SHIPPED.

New Auto Fire Fighter Will Be Received Next Week.

Mayor A. C. Baze received notification the first of the week to the effect that the big American-LaFrance automobile pumping engine ordered by the city last November had been completed, and that the machine was shipped from the factory at Elmira, N. Y., Thursday of last week, and that delivery would be made here about the middle of next week.

The shipment is being traced through and kept on the move, in order to make delivery by the expiration of the time specified in the contract, which is March 15th.

The new truck will be stationed in the Brady Auto Co.'s garage when placed in service, after being finally accepted by the city. Handsome and commodious quarters have been arranged in the northwest corner of the garage building for the accommodation of the big machine, with sleeping rooms above for four members of the fire department. By this arrangement the firemen will be enabled to get the machine to a fire at any hour of the day or night in a very short space of time, and thus give the citizens of Brady practically the same service as would be given by a paid department.

Frank Hurd will be in charge of the big machine in the capacity of day driver and mechanic, but several other members of the department will receive a special course of training under

the engineer from the factory, who will be sent here by the company to spend several weeks in instructing the firemen in the proper handling of the car.

Receives Car of Studebakers.

Simpson & Co., agents in this and several adjoining counties for the Studebaker automobile, last week received a car load of these popular cars. The shipment consisted of two Light Sixes and one roadster, all fully equipped with electric starter and lights. The roadster is the first one of its kind ever seen here, and has attracted a great deal of attention and favorable criticism among the citizens. The car has three passenger capacity, with the driver's seat a little in front of that for the passengers, and with a large storage capacity for tools, suit cases, etc., in the rear, making it one of the most complete models made by the Studebaker factory.

Mr. Simpson reports the sale of one of the Light Sixes to a party in Mason, although delivery of the car will not be made until the roads are in better condition.

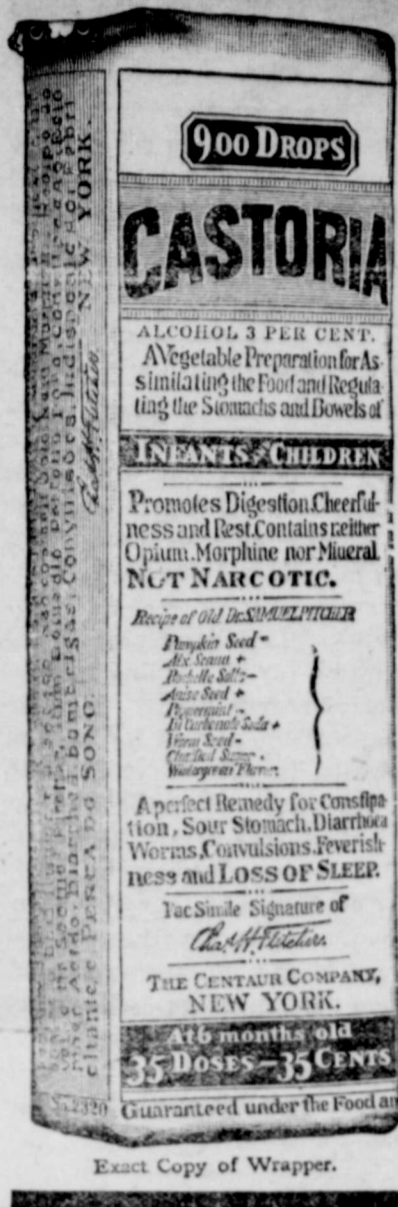

\$15,000 BROWNWOOD FIRE

Palace Cafe and Confectionery and Queen Theatre Damaged

Fire was discovered this morning between 4 and 5 o'clock in the R. M. and Arthur Low buildings on Center avenue, and by 6:30 the two buildings had been gutted by the flames. The Palace cafe and confectionery, the Queen theatre, the Modern Woodmen hall, the Fad Studio and the Art Shop are the sufferers in addition to the owners of the buildings. The total loss is estimated at more than \$15,000, partially covered by insurance. The fire is believed to have been started from the kitchen range in the Palace cafe.

The fire losses, so far as can be learned by the Bulletin, are: Palace cafe and confectionery, value about \$7,000; insurance, \$2,500.

Queen theatre, value about \$2000; insurance \$400.

R. M. and Arthur Low, value of buildings not given; insurance \$7,500.

Modern Woodmen of America hall, value not given; insurance on fixtures \$500.

J. O. Stephenson, owner of the Fad Studio, value about \$350.

The Volunteer fire department was handicapped in its fight against the fire by not being notified in time to do effective work. The absence of an efficient fire alarm resulted in a very small attendance of firemen at the scene of the conflagration. For some time after the alarm was sounded there were only three members of the department present, including the two wagon drivers. Other members of the department were notified by telephone, since they had failed to hear the alarm at the central station.

The buildings in which the fire occurred will be immediately rebuilt or repaired, and it is understood that the Queen theatre and the Palace cafe will also be re-established as soon as possible. Owners of these concerns today were unable to announce any plans on account of the confusion following the disastrous fire.—Brownwood Bulletin, Wednesday.

Brownwood Citizens Endeavor to Secure Line From Dallas.

A meeting of the members of the Chamber of Commerce was held last night for the purpose of discussing the proposed interurban line from Dallas via Cleburne to Brownwood.

The matter was discussed from every phase and it was a unanimous opinion of the members of the Chamber of Commerce that an interurban would be the greatest means of developing this section that could be found.

By a unanimous vote of the membership, the interurban matter was referred to the railroad committee of the Chamber of Commerce. This committee will take up the proposition with the Dallas Southwestern Traction Company and endeavor to reach an agreement for the survey of the line into Brownwood.

This committee is composed of D. F. Johnson, chairman; Will Bell, G. N. Harrison, Geo. Kidd, J. R. Looney, C. L. McCartney, Brooke Smith, Lee Watson, T. C. Yantis.—Brownwood Bulletin.



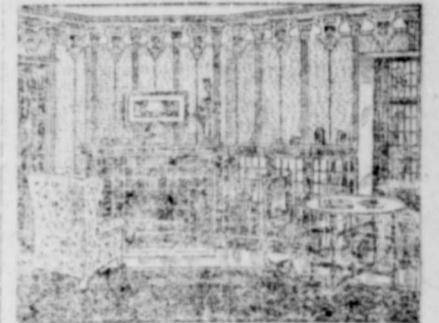
