### FIRE TRUCK ARRIVES

City's Big Automobile Combination Truck Received Saturday.

The big automobile fire truck recently purchased by the city arrived Saturday afternoon from the factory of the American-LaFrance Fire Engine Co., at Elmira, N. Y., having been out shipped via Galveston on February 25th.

The truck was unloaded late Saturday afternoon by George W. Meade, demonstrating engineer from the Chicago office of the American-LaFrance Co., who has been sent here to instruct the members of the fire department in handling the big fire fighter, and was driven around the public square and thence to the quarters which have been prepared for it in the Brady Auto Co.'s garage.

The truck is the very latest fire fighting apparatus turned out by the American-LaFrance Co., and is what is known as a Triple Combination, Type 12. Twelve hundred feet of 2 1/2 inch hose is carried on the truck, in addition to a chemical tank equipped with 200 feet of chemical hose, axes, ladders, hand chemical extinguishers and everything necessary to successfully combat a fire. The truck is also equipped with a pump which will handle between 800 and 1000 gallons of water per minute, the pump being operated by the same motor which propels the truck. The motor is a 6-cylinder and develops 100 horse power. The truck is geared to develop a speed of 52 miles per hour.

The apparatus will undergo the official test before its final acceptance by the city council this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

## GROWING GOOD CORN.

### The First Essential is Testing and Securing Good Seed.

To grow good corn one must have good seed, says Contestants' Bulletin No. 2. The soil must be well prepared, with good cultivation and care. Both the corn and the acreage should be selected.

Choose the variety that makes the best yields in your neighborhood; use early maturing seed. Of seed equal in other respects, the kind grown in your neighborhood is the best.

The ears should always be selected as soon as they are ripe in the field, from the strongest and best stalks. Two hundred ears per acre would not be too many to select, since you will take only the best and feed the others.

From the best heavy, solid ears, choose six kernels from different parts of the ear and give them the germination test. Feed the ears whose kernels show weak seeds or sprouts, or which show none at all. Shell your best ears singly after throwing out all small and poorly developed kernels from the butts and tips of the ears. Plant a peck to the acre.

Choose a well drained piece of ground that will warm up well. Avoid places where the ground stays wet. The ground should be deeply plowed in the fall and will give better yield in all except sour soils if a crop of cowpeas or velvet beans has been grown on it and plowed under. Well rotted, moist barnyard manure may be put on abundantly in the winter or early spring and cultivated into the soil. The manuring had better be done several months in advance of the planting. If conditions require the use of commercial fertilizer use the kind that the experience of your community shows will produce the best results. Don't use acid phosphate on sour lands; lime is needed there. In the sour lands of the Gulf Coast frequent, thorough tillage and good use of drainage will remove most if not all of the trouble from acid.

Remember in plowing that you seldom go as deep as you think. Don't use the "middle buster"; use a big plow with lots of power, a disc, if you have it, or follow in the furrow with a bull-tongue, so you can break up the plow sole of former years, and give a deep soil body for the roots to grow in. This kind of plowing followed by frequent harrowing and other cultivation will keep your corn growing green and strong.

Plant at least an inch deep when the ground begins to warm up. Plant kernels for twice as many stalks as your acre should

have. The cut worms, crows, and other destroyers will get some of it and you will want to thin out the poor stalks; allow more room between rows and hills for tall growing varieties of corn, or for corn planted on thin or poor soils or where rainfall is less than 25 inches annually.

The rows may be spaced from three and one-half to five feet apart and the hills 18 inches apart when thinned. If the corn is planted by hand the kernels should be separated several inches in the hills, but it is better to use the drill. If there are cut worms in your fields they may be poisoned by placing at each hill a little ball made of dough of fifty pounds of bran, one pound of Paris green, and enough cheap molasses to hold it together. Prevention, however, is better than cure, so fall plowing is the best means to use. Check-rowing allows cultivation to go both ways in the field, and since our failure in growing corn is principally due to lack of cultivation, following deep plowing it should be a factor in making for bigger yields.

Thin out before the stalks are a foot tall and after they are too hard for cutworms to damage. Cut below the surface of the ground and thin to slightly more stalks than a perfect stand. Later, cut out such stalks as develop poorly.

The corn plant requires warmth and moisture; 700 tons of water are needed to make 50 bushels per acre. At least two-thirds of this moisture is required after the plant has passed the silking stage, and is forming the ear. Since this is the time when the rainfall is insufficient the only certainty of making good yields is by frequent, shallow cultivation through the whole growing season, and especially after the ear begins to form. The custom of "laying by" costs Texas farmers millions of dollars every year. Keep the soil well mulched by using the harrow when the plants are small and then the cultivators and sweeps until the ear is beginning to harden. Never let a crust form on your land if you want big, profitable yields. After your corn is made, go through the acre and choose ears from the best stalks for next year's planting. Don't fall plow blowing lands.

Planting in the water furrow offers certain advantages, making the tillage easier by saving part of the work with the hoe. This system is best for loose, sandy soils.

For clay loams and other stiff soils, level preparation and planting are advisable. Except on very wet soils, the yield of corn, other things being equal, should be greater, because the level land will hold the moisture better through drouth and give wider range to the roots.

The spring tooth harrow will give rapid cultivation and cuts down the labor of hoeing.

Don't cultivate deeper than three inches in the dryer portions of Texas; half that deep in the more humid years.

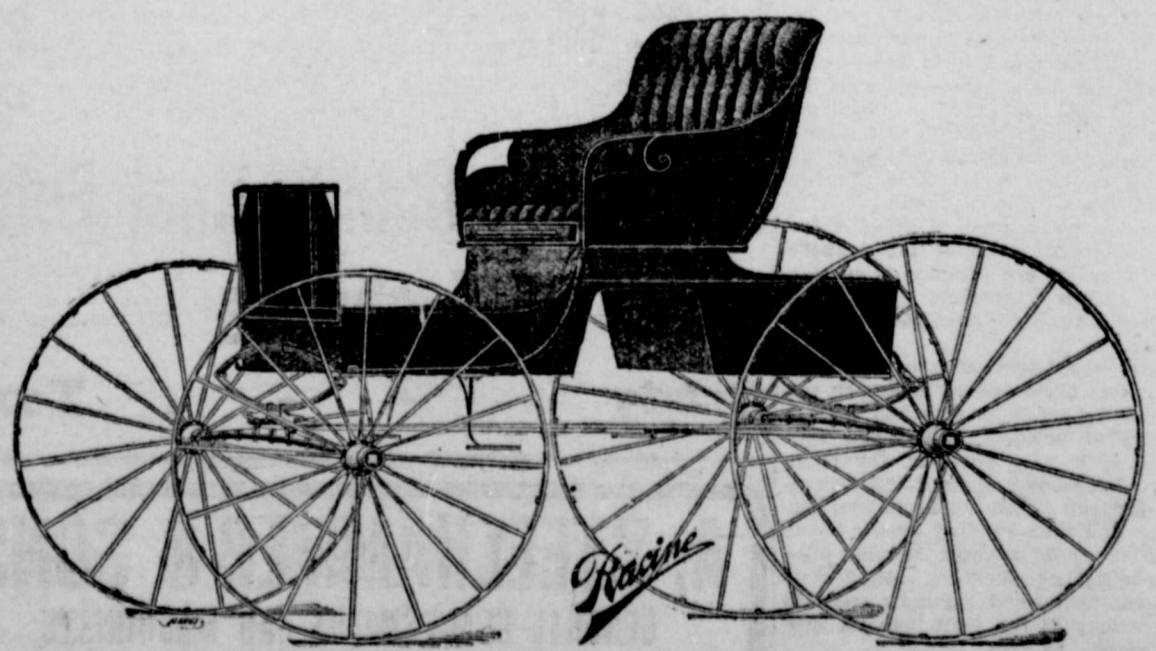

**DAINTIEST OF BOUDOIR BAGS**

Sweet Grass, Modeled in Pretty Shapes, Excellent Receptacles for the Summer Fancy Work.

Sweet grass receptacles seem to be the most suitable of all fabrics for holding summer fancy work, and the smaller-sized baskets come in wonderfully attractive shapes to be transformed into bags. One size, a miniature replica of the old-fashioned stocking basket, is fitted with a satin bag attached plainly an inch from the mouth of the basket, consist of a sweet grass thimble holder, a tiny satin emery and a reel of thread. Trimming the outer rim of the basket's mouth or lip are clusters of narrow satin ribbon alternating with tabs ending with little bowknots, also in ribbon.

Still more practical is a round and flat sweet grass basket in Roman colorings, to which is attached a huge basket of flowered satin lined with China silk. By stitching the outer side of the bag and its lining perpendicularly, to divide them into four sections, and then running draw ribbons through their several shirred tops, four separate pockets for sewing utensils can be formed, leaving a space in the center of the main bag for miscellaneous articles.
