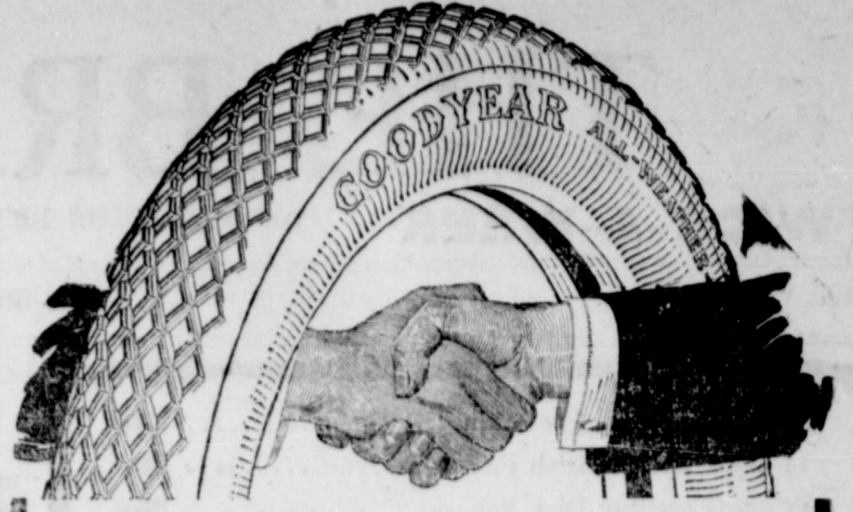

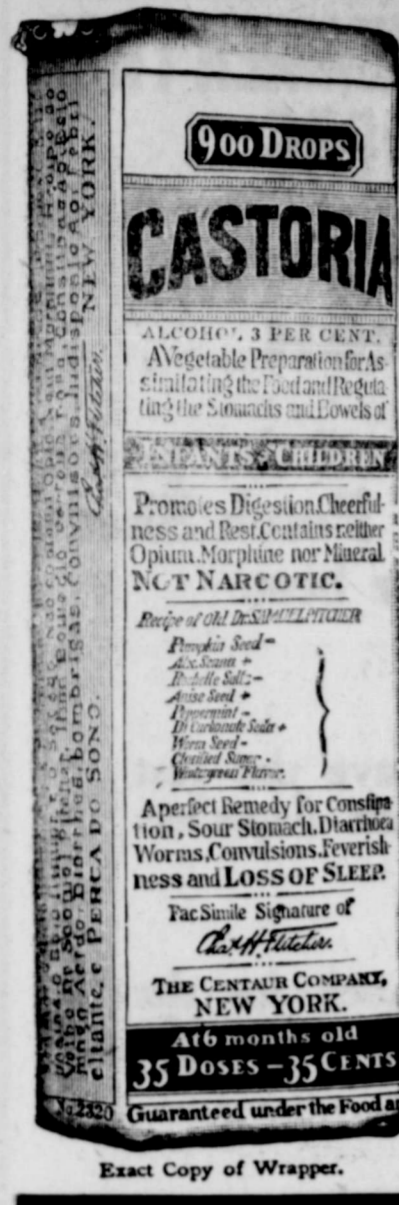

**WONDER WORDS.**  
Says Chinese Pheasants Are Birds We Should Introduce.  
Wonder, Ore., May 17.  
Editor Brady Standard:  
In the springtime (now) here the grouse hoot, and the pheasants drum on the logs with their wings and the mountain quail talk as plain as plain can be with the omission of articulation. The quail say: "quit-now; quit-now; quit right now!" Or else: "Sit here; sit here; sit here!" The hoot of grouse is not like the hoot of the owl, but is something similar, only a deeper bass tone.  
If we had no automobiles I would tell you of the drumming of the pheasants, which sounds like distant thunder; but now I will say, like the rumbling of an automobile. We have game birds here that are getting to be quite plentiful in some localities. They are the Chinese pheasants. They were introduced in this country by the government, from China. They are a remarkably beautiful bird of about the size of a prairie chicken. They have bright glossy feathers, red, black, green, white, yellow and brown. They have long tail feathers like the Mexican peafowl. I believe they would go better in Texas, even than here, and I think it would pay to introduce them in your fields and pastures and make it a penalty to kill them for a few years until they get a good start toward increasing.

ex-Texan in New Mexico. If those who move to the other states would write back and describe the country it would make very interesting reading. Besides, it would show their appreciation for good old Texas, and those they left behind.

He said he would be willing to crawl upon hands and knees to get to a country like that. I asked his name and he said "Cavness. Mat Cavness." And, do you know, I never thought to ask him if he knew Cap. Dan Wills, captain of the home guards? I don't know where he is now, or I would ask him yet. So you see, my friends, you never meet with an old Texan anywhere you may go but he has a warm spot in his soul for grand old Texas, and a kindly feeling for those he left behind.  
It is so cold here I will have to stop writing and go warm my feet. We are having cold, rainy weather now, and have had fire in the front room every day for nearly two weeks.

## EXCUSE THE EDITOR

A newspaper man can not expect to escape criticism, but he is not wise to court it. The newspaper is a builder, not a destroyer; and criticism is not often conducive to the things necessary to building. As an abstract proposition, it may also be stated that much of the criticism which makes so many wounds and causes so much community disruption would never be uttered were the critic to make a thorough investigation before making the aggrieved statements, as suggested by The Standard.—Brownwood Bulletin.

## PRINTING THE NEWS.

We often hear some thoughtless fellow say: "If I was running a paper I would print the NEWS. I don't care who it might hit. If they don't want to get into the paper, let them keep out of trouble." We remember one particular instance in which a similar remark was made: We had, through the pleadings of an old mother and a tearful sister, "killed" a good story concerning the escapade of a rather worthless young fellow. So we were accused of cowardice by this certain critic and were told that we did not know how to run a paper. In vain we tried to explain that many things beside our own personal likes and dislikes entered into our weekly labor. It was no use. He said we should print the news.

Six months later the same man came sneaking up to our home in the dead of night to plead and beg us not to print a much worse story in which he himself was mixed up.

We had the story; but had no intention of printing it, for it was one of those things that it is best for all concerned and for the public, to suppress.

But our critic had heard that we knew the details and, with the details and, with the unfairness that characterized his first utterance at once jumped to the conclusion that we would chortle with joy over the chance to flaunt such a choice bit of gossip in the faces of our readers.

Remembering his attitude on the other occasion, we let him squirm a bit. We reminded him of his former statements and intimated that he had at that time opened our eyes. "We would publish the news. If anyone did not want to get into the paper, let them keep out of trouble." He remembered. He admitted that he had so expressed himself. But he was wrong, he said. And this case of his was different. Moreover, he was a prominent man, and married—and he had a family—and all of the same stuff that

every editor hears when some one gets into trouble.

Well, the story was not printed. It never would have been. But we feel sure that our critic believes that the only thing that kept it out was his "prominence" and "influence."

No, dear friend, about the only element that was totally ignored in coming to our decision was you, yourself.

This spring may be backward, but it is certain it is not bashful. It greets us with the warm handclasp of bright sunshine, sublime, fisherman's delight sort of weather—and then gives us the cold shoulder in the form of frosty nights. Spring is a false jade, all right.

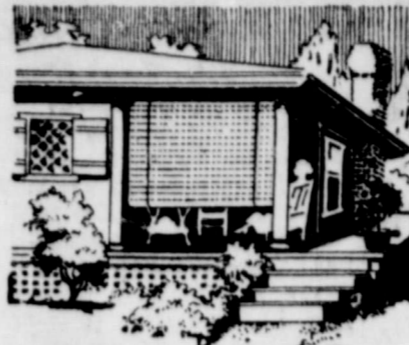

## WOMAN'S HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

### Epworth League in China.

A few days ago I went with a company of Epworth Leaguers to open a new street chapel which they are renting from funds provided by themselves. It is a good location and they keep a reading and inquiry room open every afternoon and evening. It was opened not only for the evangelistic meetings which are held there by the Volunteer Band, a company of our members who are ready to give of their time to the spreading of the Gospel, but chiefly for the benefit of merchants and clerks who are in large business houses near there. Many of these are inquirers and probationers, but because of their business cannot regularly attend the meetings of the church. For this reason the inquiry room is kept open, so that whenever they have a few minutes they may have instruction in the fundamentals of the Christian religion and Bible study. Again, this will be a place where any of these whose parents or employers will not allow them to pray in their places of business, which are their bedrooms as well, may go for prayer. Such a place is very essential in China.—W. M. Smith, Soochow, China.

### Conditions in China.

The region of Nantunghow, in China, offers very peculiar opportunities for evangelistic effort. This is one of the richest agricultural districts in all China—six thousand square miles of territory, with nearly one thousand people to the square mile, making a population of fully five million. The re-

gion is covered with a remarkable system of canals, making travel for evangelization very easy. This section is very progressive and has never been disturbed by a revolution. The Missionary Intelligencer (Christian) says of this region: "We are the only mission really proposing to occupy this field, and upon us practically lies the religious responsibility for the whole district. The leading citizen of Nantunghow is Chang Chien, who is a multimillionaire, minister of commerce and agriculture for China, and head of President Yuan Shi Kai's cabinet. He is the most generous and public-spirited man in all China and is trying to make his city and region a model for the whole country. He has established a system of education in his district unknown in any other part of China, with schools in city, town, village and even country. These schools are, for the most part, in temples where his men have either destroyed the idols or huddled them in the alcoves

to make room for the pupils. In Nantunghow he has built from his own private funds large normal schools for both men and women in order to train teachers for these schools. He has also built a large museum, and agricultural school, a foreign hotel for the care of the few foreigners who come to the city, an orphanage, and a hospital.—S. S. Visitor.

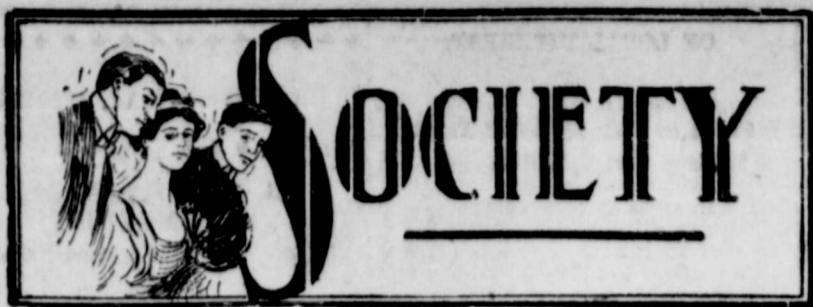

**KEY RATE REDUCTION**

**FIRE RATING BOARD MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS.**

Files List of Changes, Which, If Complied With, Will Mean Key Rate Less Than 40c

Following an inspection of the city last week by Chief Engineer K. B. Godley, Jr., of the State Fire Insurance Commission, Mayor A. C. Baze is in receipt of a communication from Secretary A. R. Andrews of the Commission in which a number of changes are enumerated, which if made by the city, will result in a very material decrease in the present key rate of insurance.

At the time of Mr. Godley's visit here he informed Mayor Baze that the city could reduce the key rate from 60c to 38c without a very large outlay of funds, and that the saving thus resulting to the policy holders of the city would amount to considerably more than the expense incident to the necessary improvements. The matter will be taken up by the city council within the next few days and steps taken looking to a very material reduction of the present rate.

The list of recommendations made by the commission is

shown in the following:

**Water Works.**

(a.) Experience has demonstrated that the metering of service connections to consumers is a very valuable asset to any city in the conservation of its water supply, and as there is 65 per cent of the present connections so equipped, we recommend that at least 75 per cent be metered and the present charge of 1c appearing in key rate will be avoided.

(b.) The pumping station is the foundation for the protection of any city against fire and the base of domestic consumption, and if the building is not constructed of fire resistive material and void of hazardous occupancies the city is being endangered and the proper authorities are failing to carry out the intention of fire protective devices; therefore, we recommend the opening between pump room and electric light plant be bricked up or approved labeled fire doors be installed on both sides of opening, and unless this recommendation is complied with it will be necessary that a 10 cent charge be made in the key rate. In order that you may receive credit for duplicate pumps and boilers, it will be necessary that the present iron clad boiler room be replaced with one of brick, stone or concrete with non-combustible roof and aside from having

the hazard removed, a reduction of 3 cents will be allowed in key rate.

(c.) To eliminate the present charge of 3 cents in key rate for fire hydrants not properly spaced, we recommend the installation of additional fire hydrants of standard two-way and steamer type, spaced not to exceed 300 feet apart in mercantile district nor over 600 feet apart in residence section.

(d.) The best engineering practice has proven conclusively that mains less than 8 inches in diameter should not be laid in the mercantile district, and in order that the present charge of 10 cents in mercantile district may be removed, we recommend the replacing of all mains in the mercantile district with at least 8-inch standard cast iron bell and spigot joint mains.

(e.) Oily waste and rags are subject to spontaneous combustion and if not properly cared for are liable to cause a disastrous fire. This hazard may be removed by the installation of approved labeled oily waste cans at pumping station.

(f.) Install a pressure recording gage in the mercantile district of your city and file and date all records from same.

(g.) We note at present there is only one supply main from pumping station to service distribution main, and in order to be prepared for a breakdown in this pipe, which would be extremely disastrous, we suggest the laying of an additional supply main, and aside from the protection afforded, a 2 cent reduction will be allowed in key rate.

(h.) Install a fire hydrant at pumping station and provide at least 100 feet of 2 1/2 inch approved labeled cotton rubber lined hose with standard hose house over same with underwriters' nozzle attached to hose.

(i.) It has been proven that mains less than 6 inches in diameter should not be laid in the residence section of any city, therefore, we recommend that the laying of 4-inch mains be discontinued; also an objectionable feature exists in the prevalence of dead end mains in the system, as pressures at these points are greatly reduced, the hydrants become stopped up, water stagnant, etc., and in addition consumers so located receive a poor supply of water at low pressure, so we recommend that loop systems be made of all dead end mains and necessary controlling valves be installed.

**Fire Department.**

(a.) By the employment of at least one full paid fireman who shall sleep at fire station, devote his entire time to service and be solely paid by the city, a credit of 7 cents will be allowed in your key rate.

(b.) To insure long life for the fire hose in your city, we recommend the installation of a hose rack or tower for properly washing and drying all fire hose.

(c.) Provide a good supply of cut-off nozzles in the fire department.

(d.) By the installation of an automobile hook and ladder truck, the present charge of 2 cents which is in order in key rate will be avoided.

(e.) To remove the present charge of 5 cents in key rate for no fire alarm system, it will be necessary that an approved electric fire alarm system be installed.

**Police System.**

A city the size of Brady requires the services of four full paid policemen, two for day and two for night duty, thus by the employment of one additional full paid policeman the charge of 2 cents, which is now in order, will be eliminated.

**Fire Marshal Ordinance.**

In the present key rate of your city you are receiving a credit of 3 cents for fire marshal ordinance properly enforced and an inspection revealed the fact that same was not being enforced nor inspection reports filed with this department; therefore, in order that the 3 cents charge may be avoided we recommend the appointment of a fire marshal to rigidly enforce all provisions of this ordinance.

**Building Laws.**

To remove the present charge of 5 cents in key rate for building laws inadequate, it will be necessary that you adopt the building code of this commission in full, a copy of which we will gladly furnish upon request.

**Ordinances.**

As very many serious fires are due to the unlawful handling of explosives and inflammable materials, we recommend for your immediate attention, the necessity of adopting strict regulations governing same, in order that both life and property may be better safeguarded from fire.

**Streets.**

With reference to the conflagration hazard of your town, we suggest that you consider the advisability of paving or macadamizing at least all of the streets in the mercantile district, which, in addition to permitting the quick handling of fire apparatus would also reduce the key rate 2 cents.

**Arson Ordinance.**

You are receiving a credit in the present key rate for arson ordinance, and the necessary placards were not found posted in all public places; therefore, we recommend that these placards be reposted in order that this credit may be maintained.

**EXCELLENT WALL STREET TIP**

Purchaser of Securities Should Not Fail to Keep an Eye on Earnings.

I have noticed during a quarter of a century's observations, that when all the financial writers are proclaiming the merits of a particular stock, and, at the same time insiders, who are supposed to know all about it, are pointing out its good points, increasing earnings, etc., somebody stands waiting to sell. "Jasper" writes in Leslie's. I have also noticed that, when a stock advances, day by day or week by week, without anything being said in explanation, or without any effort being made to attract attention to it, there must be something "worth while" going on, especially if transactions in that stock be large. Perhaps some of my observant readers have noticed the same peculiarities of the stock market.

It is perfectly natural that when one wants to sell his goods he must extol their merits and that if he wants to buy a property he should go about it quietly, and if he has knowledge of its merits should say as little as possible about them until he has completed the purchase. The same motives and principles that move men to buy and sell commodities of any kind inspire men and movements in Wall Street.

For this reason I have advised my readers who wish to be successful in speculating, not to take tips so freely given by those who have their own purposes to serve, but to note with care the operations of the market and note that has bearing on the values of securities. I do not mean by this the rumors that financial writers and tipsters give out, but the real news found in official reports of declining or increasing earnings and the statements required by law, to be made and sworn to.

If your automobile tires or your rubber boots don't wear so well as they should, it may be because microbes are eating them. When perfectly dry commercial rubber is not capable of furnishing nutriment to any form of microbe, but when sufficiently moist it is frequently attacked by certain bacteria or molds which feed on the albuminoids, resins and sugars it contains. The red, yellow, brown and black spots which often appear on rubber are able to assimilate the hydrocarbon of rubber and by so doing destroy its value.
