STEEL STOCKS SKYWARD.

Present Boom in Wall Street Rivals Biggest Boom Known.

News dispatches from New York City announce that steel and other stocks, which had a year ago declined because of the war scare sky-rocketed last Friday, June 4 to such an extent that the present boom in Wall street rivals the biggest excitement of the days of the 1901 boom.

Of the general industrial situation the Chicago Drovers' Journal says:

Diplomatically we're in a rather precarious position just now as affects the European situation. Another American ship, the Nebraskan, having been crippled by either a mine or a torpedo near the British shores, it is out task now to find out the real cause for it, and learning proceed accordingly. To keep out of war, of course, is our desire, but trying situations are likely to arise any day which may bring us into war.

Meantime the industries or

this country are profiting largely as a result of Europe's inability to manufacture products it requires.

Many American concerns are declaring extra dividends on their capitalization as a result of the big business they have been doing with Europe.

Powder concerns and other manufacturers of war material are leaders in profit garnering, but there are many manufacturing plants turning out increased orders of various commodities which are going to the war stricken countries. Europe's credit here is strongly established and that means better business for the United States.

It is unfortunate that business conditions in this country should be stimulated chiefly by reason of hundreds of thousands of men in Europe being sacrificed on the fields of battle, but that is a situation Europe itself is responsible for.

While the chief profit makers now are American concerns dealing in "war specialties,"

there must follow a broadening of our export trade in all articles of commerce.

Italy having joined the fighting, there must need be long drawn out strife among the nations and the neutral powers, of course, will be the main commercial gainers.

That the demand over here for every conceivable article of commerce will continue for many months after hostilities have ceased seems certain, and this will mean that scores of manufacturing concerns in this country which faced possible bankruptcy proceedings a short time before the war broke out will be overwhelmed with war orders.

War's effect on neutral nations can only be broadening export trade. With practically all of Europe's manufacturing countries calling their artisans into the field to bear arms, the remainder of the manufacturing world must necessarily "speed up" to offset the deficiency in materials produced.

DIES SUDDENLY.

Oscar Johnson Succumbs to Attack of Heart Failure.

Oscar Johnson, a well-known Swede farmer living on the Olander lease about seven miles west of Brady, died yesterday afternoon about 1:00 o'clock of heart failure, superinduced by congestion of the stomach.

The deceased was in apparently the best of health up to a few minutes before his death. He had never complained of heart trouble to anyone and his sudden death was a severe shock to the entire community.

Mr. Johnson was a single man and lived alone, except during the busy season of the year, when it was necessary to hire extra help in making his crops. This spring he hired W. S. Placker of this city, and the two men had been living at the farm together the past few months.

According to Placker's statement, he and Johnson had worked in the field together yesterday morning up to about 11:30 o'clock, when the latter went to the house to prepare dinner. After the two had eaten dinner Placker went out onto the front porch and laid down to rest, while Johnson washed and put away the dishes. When he had finished he came to the front door and asked Placker if it wasn't pretty cool out on the porch. Placker replied that it was not, but that the wind was blowing pretty hard. Johnson then said that he believed he would lay down on the bed in his room, and closed the front door. A few minutes later Placker heard groans and went into the room to find out what the trouble was. He found Johnson gasping for breath, and he died a few minutes later, without ever being able to talk.

Placker stopped a passing automobile and asked the autoist to go to a neighbors and give the alarm.

Sheriff J. C. Wall and Justice of the Peace T. J. King went out and conducted an inquest over the remains, and a verdict was rendered in accordance with the facts as above set out.

Johnson was about 35 years of age at the time of his death, and had resided in the West Sweden community the past four or five years. He was a very quiet and unassuming man and was very popular in the community. Little or nothing is known here of Johnson's relatives, but it is understood that his parents are living in the old country, and that he has two nephews somewhere in Texas.

Arrangements for the funeral had not been announced up to a late hour yesterday.

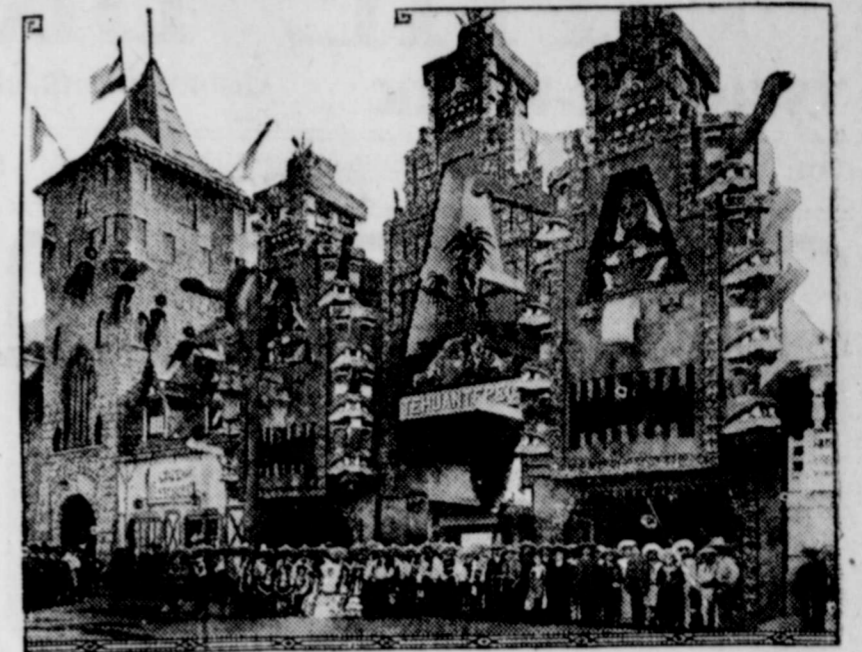

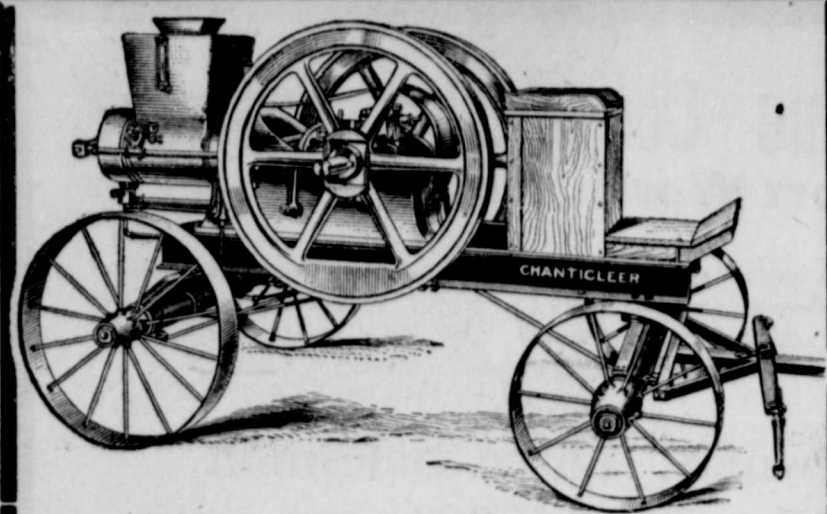

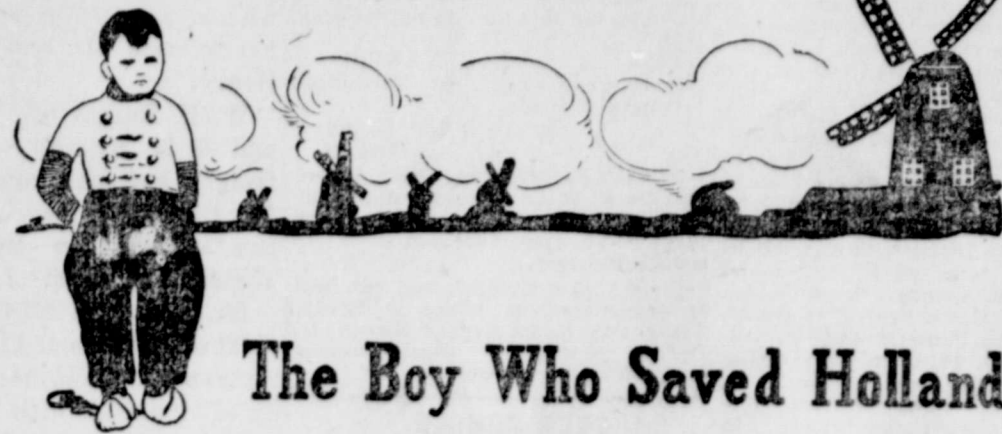

Thrusting his hand and arm into the hole, he stopped the leak, staying at his post until found in the morning.

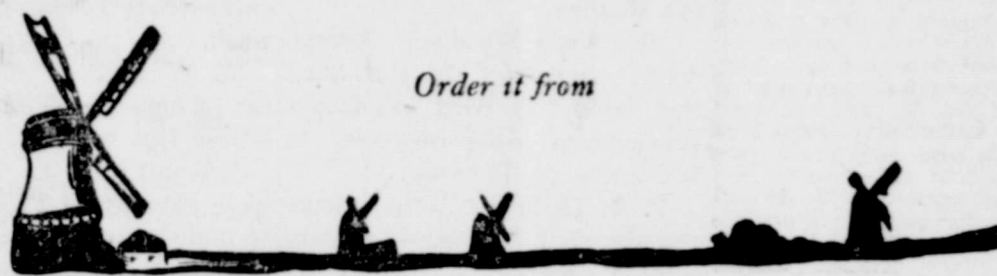

Lühr Survey No. 405; and beginning at a point on the West line of said Block 86, which point is 87 1/2 feet South from the N. W. corner said Block 86. Thence East 100 feet. Thence South 87 1/2 feet. Thence West 100 feet to West line said Block No. 86. Thence North 87 1/2 feet to the beginning. The maps of the City of Brady now in general use are here referred to and made part hereof for description. Said deed is of record in Vol. 25, page 561, Deed Records of McCulloch County, Texas, and said deed and record are here referred to and made part hereof for all purposes.
