Rain Monday Night.

The county was visited by a good rain on Monday night, the fall varying from a light sprinkle in some localities to an inch and a half or two inches in others, being heaviest in the western and northwestern portions.

Melvin reports a precipitation of more than two inches, while other points west of the city also had a heavy rain, the fall being sufficient to cause a rise of about two feet in Brady creek.

The gauge at the Commercial National bank showed a total of .3 of an inch.

The rain came at a most opportune time, as practically the entire grain crop of the county had been cut and in the shock, while other crops were beginning to need moisture. Crops of all kinds over the entire county were never in better condition at this season, and nothing short of a calamity will prevent one of the biggest harvests in the history of this section.

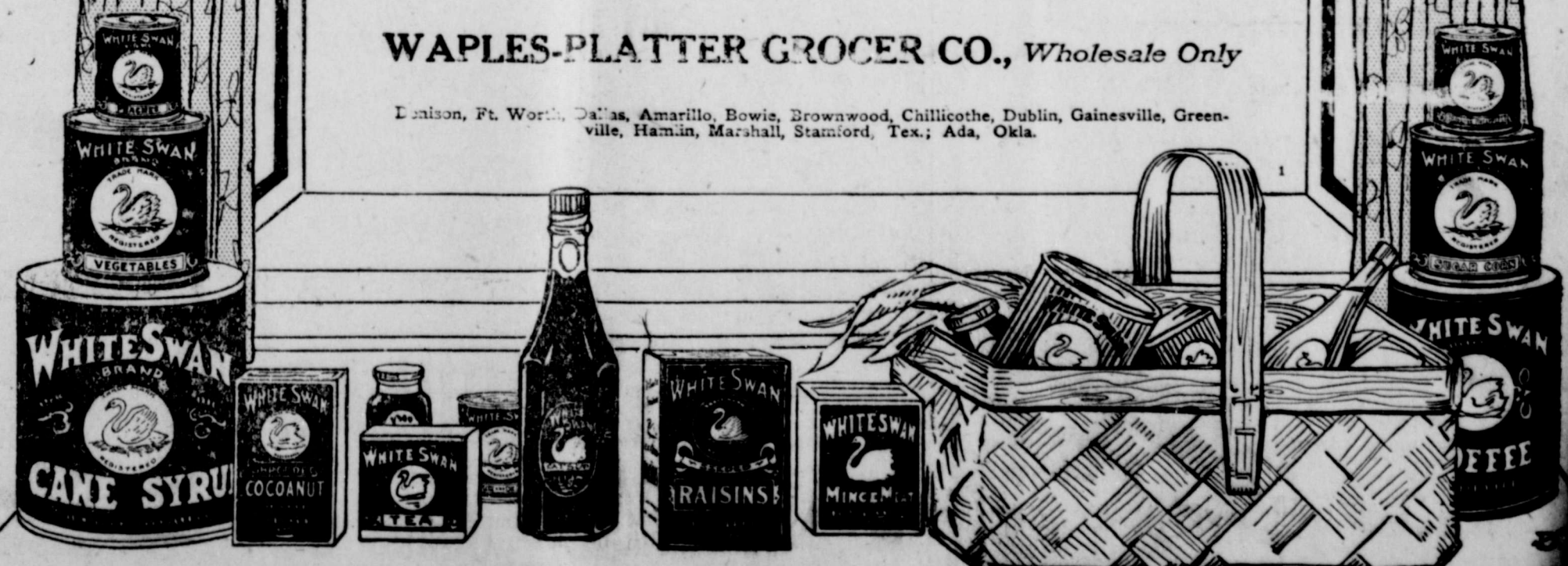

Adjudged Insane.

Walter Childers, a farmer living in the Pear Valley country, was adjudged insane by a jury in Justice of the Peace court here Monday afternoon on a writ sworn out by brothers of the unfortunate man.

According to evidence adduced at the trial, Childers' affliction first became noticeable about six weeks ago, when he told his wife that he was going to be arrested and placed in jail, from where he would later be taken by a mob and hanged. In order to protect himself from supposed arrest, he persisted in keeping a pistol close at hand all the time and at night slept with the weapon either in his hand or underneath his pillow. On one occasion the life of himself or some member of the family was endangered by the accidental discharge of the pistol in the dead hours of the night.

His condition has been more serious the past few days, and members of his family found it necessary to have him restrained and he was brought here Monday by Deputy Sheriff Will Liverman of Voca, to which place he was taken to the home of his mother about three weeks ago, following an attempt on the life of his wife Sunday night.

Childers will be sent to one of the state asylums as soon as arrangements for his reception can be made.

Japanese "Picture Brides."

At the detention station of the United States Immigration Bureau I witnessed recently the singular sight of about 40 Japanese greeting their "picture brides." Neither had ever seen the other before. This was the first examination, and they were not permitted to do more than identify each other, and the wire netting of the "pens" separated them. Then, when the health of the bride is established, the groom secures a marriage license and comes after his bride. The majority of the weddings are performed by Buddhist priests. If the bride cannot pass the medical examination she is deported.—Rev. Wm. Acton, San Francisco.

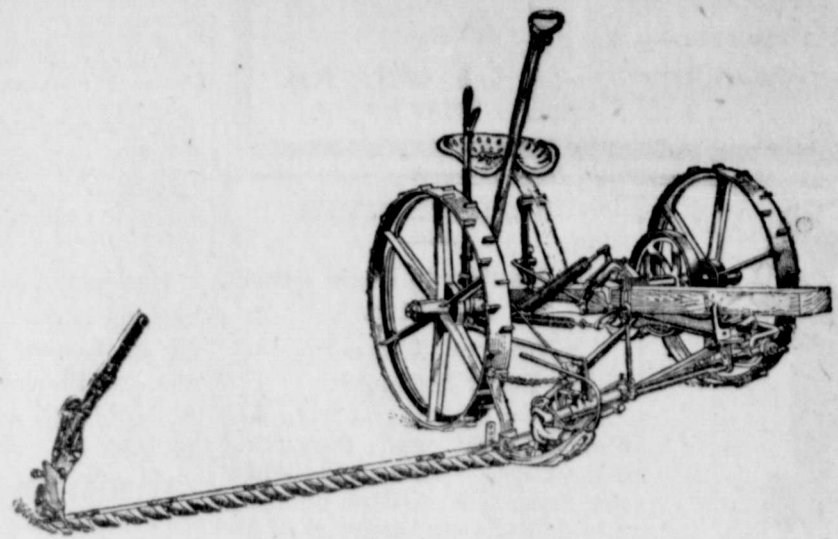

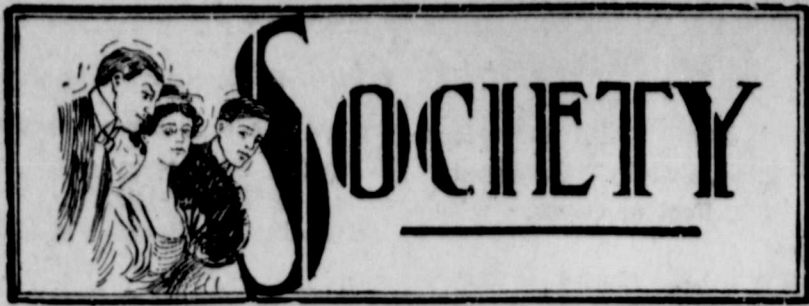

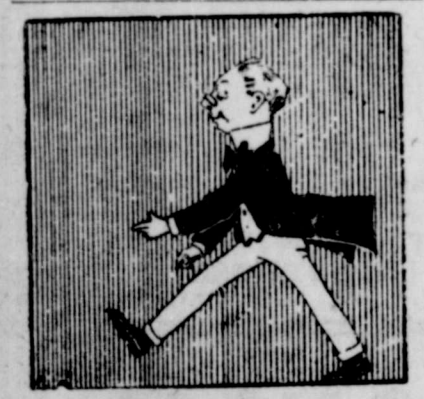
