PRODUCTION THE REMEDY.

Will Rend the Shackles and Liberate the South.

Corpus Christi, Tex., June 12.—In his speech upon the Agrarian problem in Texas before the Texas State Press association here yesterday, D. L. M. Keasbey, professor of Institutional History in the University of Texas, developed the philosophic side of the land question in Texas with remarkable clearness. Taking the two antithetical types of civilization, viz., the productive as against the exploitive type, he traced the struggles between them for supremacy all down the ages, in every land and clime from the Garden of Eden to the fertile valleys and prairies of Texas.

He emphasizes the distinction in these words: "The exploitive, which is a phenomenon of the north, emerging from the thick forest and extending over the open areas of the cold-temperate zone; and the productive, which originates in the south, and proceeds from sub-tropical oases, along sun-kissed sea shores and smiling valleys, on its westward way through the warm-temperate zone."

He then proceeded to show how, by means of the one-crop system, and during the reconstruction period the exploitive type of civilization fastened itself upon the south—a region, he declares naturally adapted to the productive type of civilization. The remedy he declared to be the breaking of the south from the bondage of the great financial powers, and closed with this glorious appeal to the representatives of the press of Texas:

"The civil war is a thing of the past, the dark ages of reconstruction are over. Like the Mediterranean basin, the Gulf country is now entering her renaissance era, and, like Italy of old, Texas is now taking the lead. The part played by the printed page in the Italian renaissance by the press of the state is easy to discern. You, ladies and gentlemen of the Texas Press association, are the litterati of this inspiring age. The pen is still mightier than the sword, what though the world is at war. I call upon you accordingly, and in full faith, to yield your weapons forcefully and skillfully, withal, against the phalanxes of financial exploitation in behalf of the productive activities of mankind."

City and County Losing Much From Lack of Commercial Club

Since the demise of the Brady Commercial Club, two weeks ago, a number of occasions have served to bring to the attention of the business men and citizens the necessity of maintaining a thoroughly live and wide-awake organization to look after the many matters which demand the attention of those who are vitally interested in the growth and development of this section of the state. One of these matters—and a most important one—was the meeting of the Highway Association. Brady could have secured this meeting with little or no effort on the part of her business men, but the matter went by default. There was no commercial club or other organization or individual to take the lead and make the necessary arrangements to secure this meeting. No one seemed to be sufficiently interested to even answer the communications from officers of the association regarding the meeting, for the

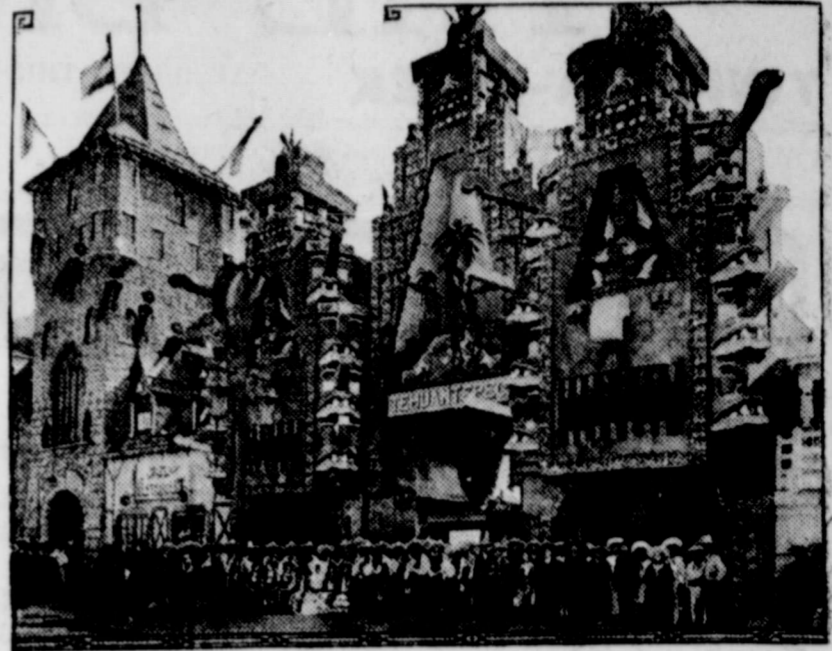

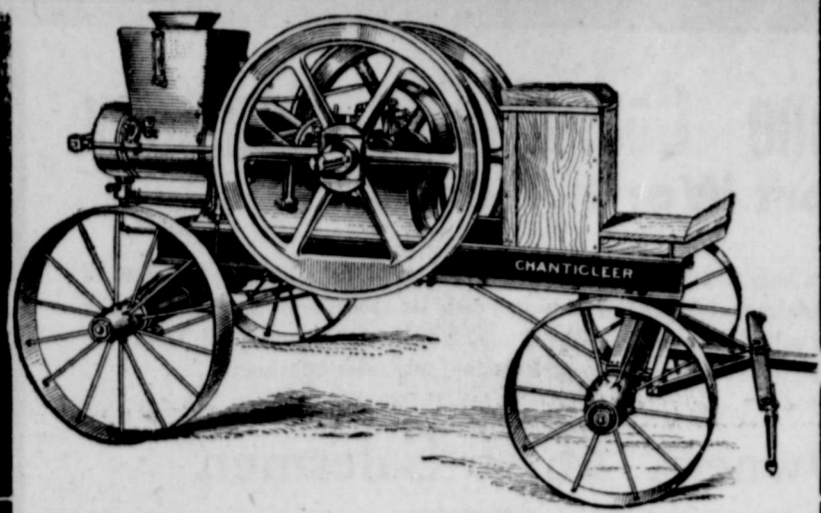

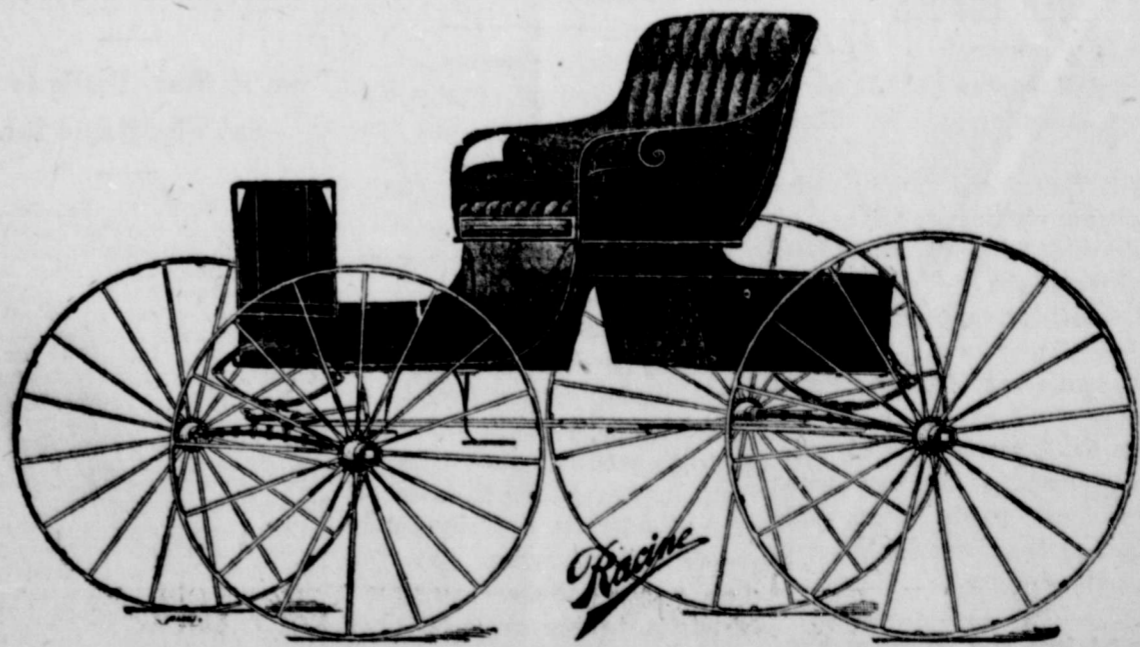
