Damage at Lohn.
Dr. J. P. Barton was in from Lohn yesterday morning, and reported that while they had no loss in their community the rest of the wind storm had wrought considerable destruction. The gin and seed house were blown down, resulting in considerable loss to Mr. Stewart, twenty per cent of the lumber having been rendered useless. Both gins were moved off their foundations and damaged. A house on Dr. Barton's place was partially destroyed, the barn blown down and a buggy broken besides considerable damage throughout that section.

However, the citizens are optimistic in the world, and consolation in the thought the rain is going to more than make up for the damage. Samples of corn bear this hope, the ears being plump and well filled out, while all other crops are in fine shape. As for the damage wrought, the citizens joined hands and set to work with a merry good will replacing the churches on their foundations and putting them in better shape than ever before. The seed house has also already been rebuilt, and work on the gin is progressing nicely.

In fact, Lohn is enjoying greater progress and building than ever. Besides the new gin, the new school house is under construction and L. O. Marshall is just completing a handsome new \$1,500 residence. No wonder the citizens are in optimistic mood.

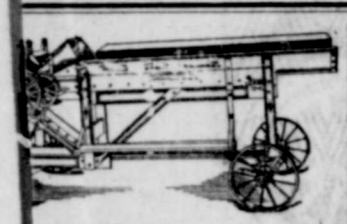

Additional Storm Damage.

The heaviest hail of the recent storm is reported to have fallen on the E. W. Marshall place north of town, where the entire crop was destroyed and about 40 or 50 trees blown up by the roots.
