### COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

#### Regular July Term Held Last Week.

The July term of commissioners court was convened last week, with all members in attendance.

The returns of an election held in Melvin Special Road District No. 2 Saturday, July 10th, were canvassed by the court and the result declared as follows: For the tax, 17; against the tax, 6. In accordance with the result of the election, the court levied a special tax of 15c on the \$100 valuation on all taxable property in the district for 1915.

The county clerk was authorized to issue a warrant on the general fund for the sum of \$27.50 with which to defray the expenses of B. F. Kilgore and wife to the Confederate home at Austin.

An order providing for the

approval by Commissioner H. E. McBride of all bills for labor and material in the construction of two bridges being built across the dry prong of Deep Creek was duly passed by the court.

The account of Drs. McCall & Anderson for services during the small pox epidemic last spring amounting to \$1000, and which was allowed for \$750 at the June term of the court, was brought up for re-consideration on account of the amount allowed not being satisfactory to said McCall & Anderson. After full discussion the account was allowed for \$1000, County Judge Brown requesting that the minutes of the court show his objection to allowing the account for this amount.

The annual report of W. D. Crothers, treasurer of the county school funds, for the year ending August 31, 1914, was presented to the court. The report was duly approved.

The report of Tax Collector S.

H. Mayo for the month of June was examined and duly approved by the court.

The quarterly report of District Clerk P. A. Campbell was examined and approved.

**AN APPRECIATION.**

"Flowers For the Living" is a movement organized by Lee Rountree of the Georgetown Commercial, and just to show that his heart is with the move this editor wants to pin a big red rose on "The Parson" of Brownwood, who edits the Parson's Column in the Brownwood Bulletin. The column contains wit, humor and straightforward common sense views or matters pertaining to that city.

He is essentially loyal to his home town, but he is too far-sighted and too broad-minded not to realize its short-comings, and lion-hearted enough to make public his opinions. In a recent article he spoke as follows:

There are three things—yea, four—on which the Parson used to wax eloquent when he was away from home, of which he never speaks these days. If by chance any should challenge the right of Brownwood to the title of 'The Cleanest Town in Texas' the Parson does not even give him the retort courteous, much less the lie direct. There are too many vacant lots in a disgraceful condition and too much 'literary matter' indiscriminately distributed for that.

"Then, when they tell the Parson at Brady that their water is the best in the State he does not say one word about the more than ninety per cent pure water that is dealt out to Brownwood. Somebody might come over and take a bath, or, at least ask for one; for taking one requires some hardihood gained from experience.

"The Parson never says anything more about our paved streets; there are too many fishing holes on Main avenue, and somebody might find them as he drove his automobile through the street.

"And the Parson does not crow over the good roads built at so great an expense a few years ago, for, to all appearance, they will have to be built again in a few years more if they are not to be worse than the ordinary country roads.

"The Parson does not blame anybody. He would like to; but it is one of the disadvantages of our form of city government that one cannot go to anybody, and say, with any certainty of being right, 'Why don't you see to this?'"

And while "The Parson" has been a staunch friend of the moving picture shows he did not hesitate to condemn them when they advertised pictures unfit for the public.

Every town needs just such a man as "The Parson". He is at once a dynamo and a safety valve in the municipal machine shop. He is a double-action force for good. Therefore he is deserving of a rose—and a word of commendation.

The watchmaker who bored a hole in a hair and threaded it with a silk thread, found the short cut to fame.—Temple Telegram.


Not near so famous as the guy who sewed a pair of wings on a fly with a log-chain.—Gainesville Register.

Tait Butler, in Progressive Farmer, says, "If ever the South needed leaders it is now, to induce all interests to combine to properly market the 1915 cotton crop. They told us last fall when cotton was down between six and seven cents, that it would go no higher because we would not export more than four or five million bales. Since January 1 we have exported more cotton than ever before, and for the year will export about as much as last year. The same old game has already begun and unless the producer can in some way be saved from the necessity of selling cotton to pay debts, cotton will sell below its value. No government aid of material value need be counted on. If anything is done to save us from the losses of last fall and obtain what the crop of 1915 is really worth, it must be done by the general business interests of the South. Schemes like the Wade fund and false hopes of government aid, which never come, induces us to do nothing until it is too late. Is it not possible for the South to save itself?"

The wife who rears a family of children and who either performs or directs the work of the household ought to be looked upon as a full partner with her husband in everything he does, and be spared the humiliation of being made to feel she is dependent upon him for gifts, sometimes grudgingly bestowed. There are some husbands, possibly an increasing number, who share their incomes with their wives, or who consider that all their possessions are held jointly, but there are many men still under the spell of the day when, in the eyes of the law, woman was looked upon more as a chattel than a human being.—Leslie's

### COUNTY COURT IN SESSION

The first case called for trial was that of W. R. Davidson, charged with a violation of the speed ordinances of the city, the case having been appealed from the city court. The jury returned a verdict late yesterday afternoon of not guilty.

The only other case on the criminal docket disposed of yesterday afternoon was that of Tex Phillips, charged with slander. On a plea of guilty Phillips was fined \$100 and costs by Judge Brown, totaling \$133.20.

The criminal docket will require the time of the court throughout the week and next week the civil docket will be taken up.

On account of the commissioners court failing to select jury lists for this term of the court, no jury has been summoned for next week.
