### RESIGNS POSITION.

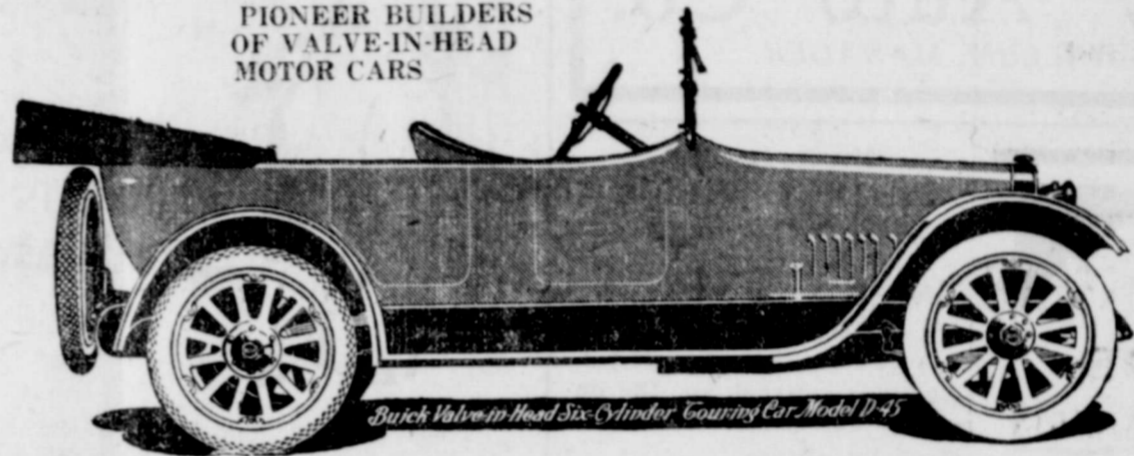



### WOMAN'S HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

A Visit to Argentine.

A group of our Uruguayan business men came to me at the close of the school year, asking me to make a trip with them in the interest of securing for our city a branch of the National City Bank, recently opened in Buenos Ayres, an invitation which I accepted.

The trip was full of interest. The first day we traveled through a typical cattle country. Then we came to the wheat belt. The country between the Uruguay and the Parana is a vast granary and a most flourishing section of Argentine. Here I saw the thresher at work—something I had never seen before in Brazil.

When we came to the great capital, Mr. Field, of the Y. M. C. A., kindly gave me a place in their rooming house; and from there each day, when business matters had been looked after, I was able to visit old friends and attend the opening session of the Annual Conference of the Methodist church, over which Bishop Stuntz presided. I met there Dr. Craver and Rev. Espindola, who were the first in years gone by to preach in Uruguayana. The printed program of the Conference showed many vital issues to be considered. I was fortunate enough to hear the bishop on the deaconess work, its history and adaptation to Latin America. I hope to see our missionary staff some day reinforced by deaconesses, both American and Latin. Discussions that I heard among the members convinced me that the time is not far distant when our boards will be dividing South

American mission fields as they are doing in Mexico and the Orient.

On Sunday I rejoiced to see a large congregation and a full Sunday school in what is known as the American church. Bishop Stuntz preached—for me a veritable treat.—Rev. John W. Price, Uruguayana.

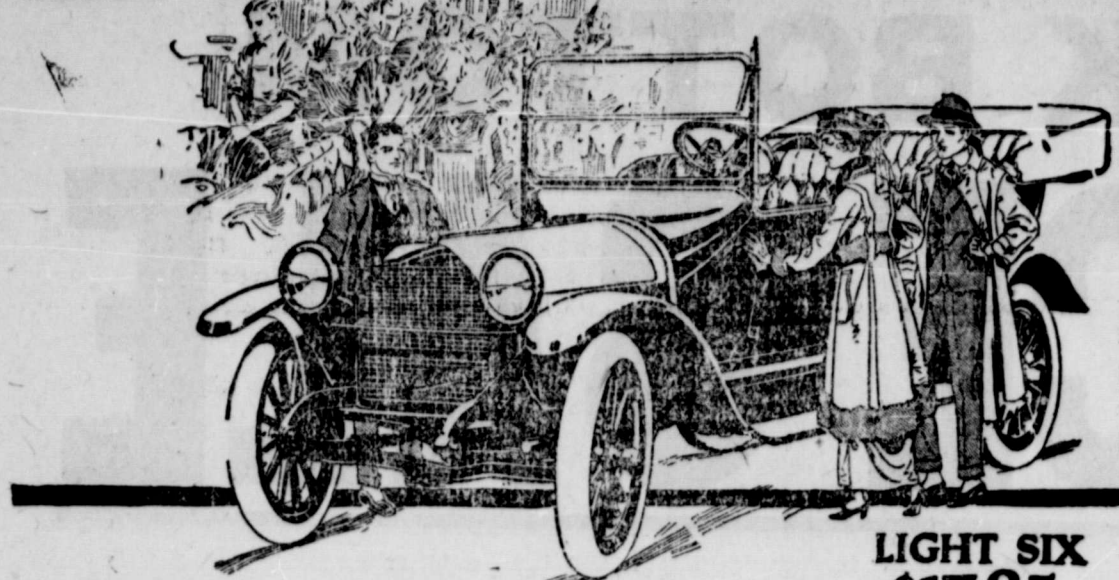
