In certain districts of India which are not traversed by railways the ancient couriers still survive and carry mails from village to village. In the jungle districts they carry bells about their necks to frighten away tigers. The American Indians had their swift runners, who carried messages in times of war between alfied tribes or from the warriors in hostile territory to

their native villages, and extraordinary tales are told of their swiftness and endurance. The running messenger in Europe

was succeeded by the mounted messenger, and as civilization progressed systems of couriers were established. which slowly evolved into the modern system of posts.

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
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
