BROAD. | POOR BUSINESS IN A LAND OF GOLD (?). <br> An exchange asks why there should be poor business in a land of gold and quotes the following: <br> Seventy-five tons of gold, convoyed by a flotilla of destroyers as guard arrived in New York from England Wednesday. There were $\$ 100,000,000$ in the shipment and it was sent to strengthEuropean credit in America. <br> There is more gold in the United States than in any other country in the world. The latest figures show that on Aug. 2 there was two billion, six million, three hundred ninety-nine thousand, five hundred thirty-nine dollars in gold cash and bullionthe greatest stock of gold of any country in the world-probably greater than any other two countries in the world. <br> The supply of gold in the United States is the greatest in her history and she is still accumulating it at the rate of $\$ 12,000$,000 a month, which was the amount added to the stock of gold in July, or between July 1 and Aug. 2. <br> No nation in the world, ancient or modern, ever had such a stock of the precious metal. England today has, it is estimated, $\$ 800,000,000$. She has been hoarding the metal and urging the people to use paper money. <br> The increase in the stock of gold in the United States is attributed to the accretions from the balance of trade which is now so largely in favor of the United States. <br> It is impossible for England to hold its gold reserve. It is impossible for France. It is impossible for Italy or Russia. As for Belgium, she is bankrupt. <br> This week $\$ 100,000,000$ in English gold reached New York | city from Halifax. The warring nations must have supplies. This will deplete their supply of gold. <br> Should this war continue for a year or two years then the printing presses will be started by the governments of the warring nations and paper money will be issued to the subjects of those nations. Then will come the real test and it will be a survival of the strongest. <br> But Uncle Sam has the gold; more of it than he ever had at any one time in the history of this republic. Uncle Sam has a billion bushels of wheat. He has two and a half billion bush. els of corn. He has an enormous oat crop. <br> Here in the South will be produced twelve million bales of cotton and this is a very conservative estimate. Europe is clamoring for food stuffs. Europe is clamoring for munition of war. Europe is clamoring for cotton. <br> Thousands of bales of cotton go up every week in the smoke of battle. This cotton is not consumed by the spinners of the world. It is consumed by the powder makers of the world. Then why point to the great number of spindles in the allied nations in comparison with the number in the Teutonic countries and Turkey? <br> But the gold is pouring in. There is a demand for the grain of the North and the foreign buyers are paying the price. There is a demand for the cotton of the South, but the foreign grain buyers object to the sale of cotton to the people of neutral countries. <br> Farmers should hold their cotton.
