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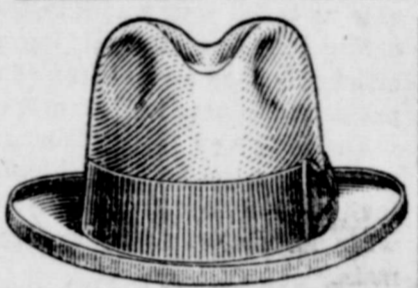

A heavy shower of rain fell in the city Friday afternoon, the downpour lasting only a few minutes, but was sufficiently heavy to flood the business section for a short time. The rain was accompanied by light hail, but no damage is reported from this source, the stones being very very small.

The rain was heaviest west and south of the city, while points north and east only had light sprinkles. A report was current on the street yesterday that heavy hail damage resulted in the Nine and Calf Creek communities, but the report could not be verified.

According to the Commercial National bank's rain gauge the precipitation amounted to .3 of an inch.

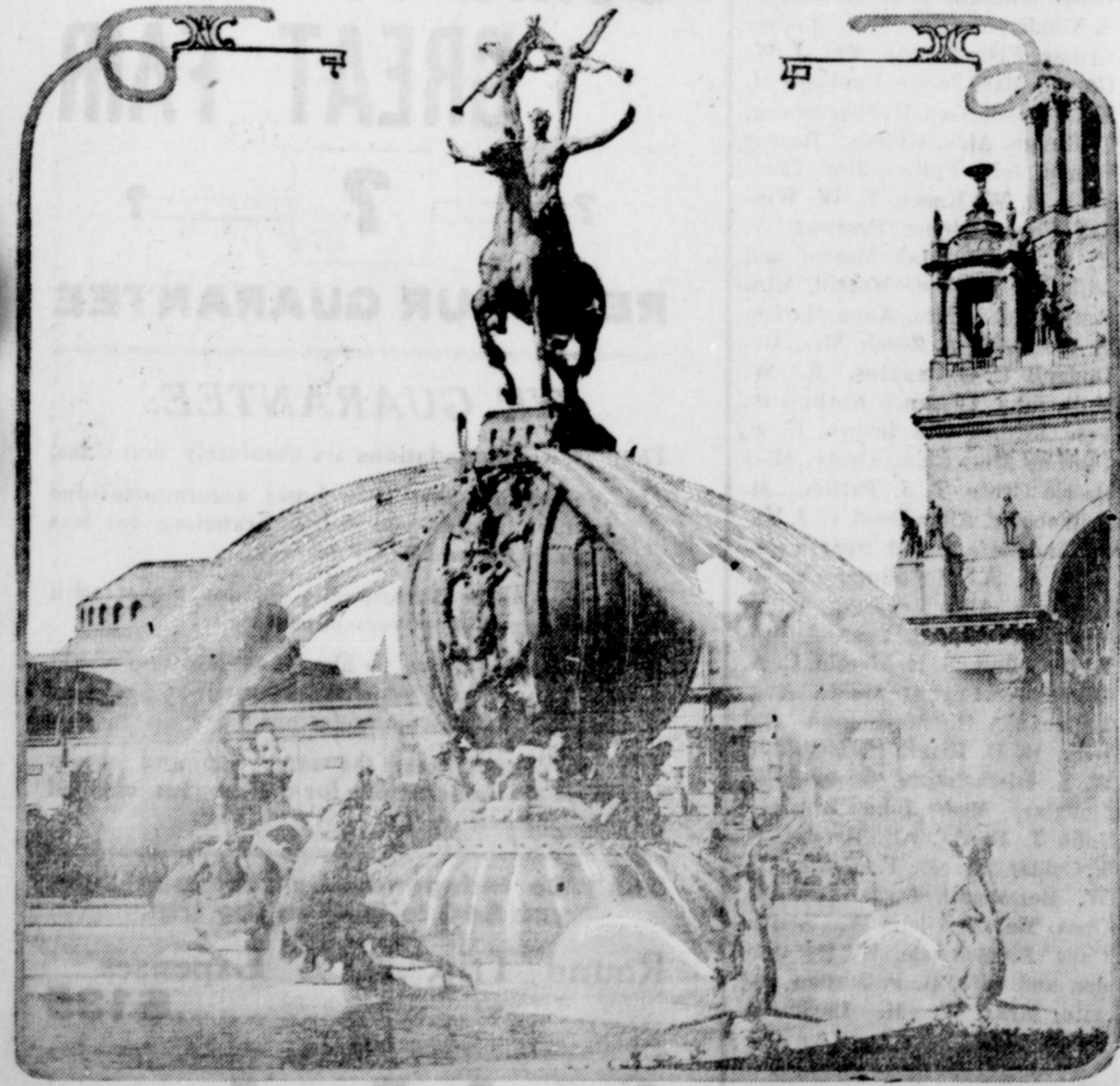

# FREE PORTS BUILDERS OF COMMERCE

CONGRESS SHOULD GIVE THEM PREFERENCE IN APPROPRIATIONS.

By Peter Radford.

This nation is now entering upon an era of marine development. The wreckage of European commerce has drifted to our shores and the world war is making unprecedented demands for the products of farm and factory. In transportation facilities on land we lead the world but our port facilities are inadequate, and our flag is seldom seen in foreign ports. If our government would only divert the energy we have displayed in conquering the railroads to mastering the commerce of the sea, a foreign bottom would be unknown on the ocean's highways.

This article will be confined to a discussion of our ports for the products of the farm must pass over our wharfs before reaching the water. We have in this nation 51 ports, of which 41 are on the Atlantic and 10 are on the Pacific Coast. The Sixty-second Congress appropriated over \$51,000,000 for improving our Rivers and Harbors and private enterprise levies a toll of approximately \$50,000,000 annually in wharfage and charges for which no tangible service is rendered. The latter item should be lifted off the backs of the farmer of this nation and this can be done by Congress directing its appropriations to ports that are free where vessels can tie up to a wharf and discharge her cargo free of any fee or charge.

A free port is progress. It takes out the unnecessary link in the chain of transactions in commerce which has for centuries laid a heavy hand upon commerce. No movement is so heavily laden with results or will more widely and equally distribute its benefits as that of a free port and none can be more easily and effectively secured.

### FLIES CAUSE CHARBON.

Transmit Disease to Farm Animals—Protection Difficult.

Horseflies are not only seriously annoying to live stock, but are frequently agents in transmitting the disease known as charbon, or anthrax, says the State Department of Agriculture. It has been proved in experiments that horseflies, as well as the stable fly, carry this disease. This fact does not lessen the necessity for burning of carcasses and prevention inoculation. In fact, it accentuates the necessity of destroying dead animals, for large numbers of horseflies have been observed feeding on animals which have just died or were about to die from anthrax. At this time the blood is known to be filled with the germs of the disease.

The worry caused by the bites causes animals to cease feeding and to group themselves together for mutual protection. Furthermore, the loss of blood due to the attacks may be very serious.

A preparation which will give some degree of protection consists of 1 gallon of fish oil, 1 ounce oil of tar and 1 ounce oil of pennyroyal. This may be sprayed on the animals with advantage, but this is practically impossible in the case of range stock.

Investigators have found that placing a film of kerosene on the surface of pools of water affords some protection as the flies that strike the kerosene are destroyed. In Central and West Texas it has been found that the eggs are usually deposited on rocks sticking out of running water. When first deposited the eggs are almost white, but soon turn almost black or, in other cases, an ashy gray. The minute larvae or maggots, hatch in a few days and drop off into the water or mud. Hence the utility of kerosene.
