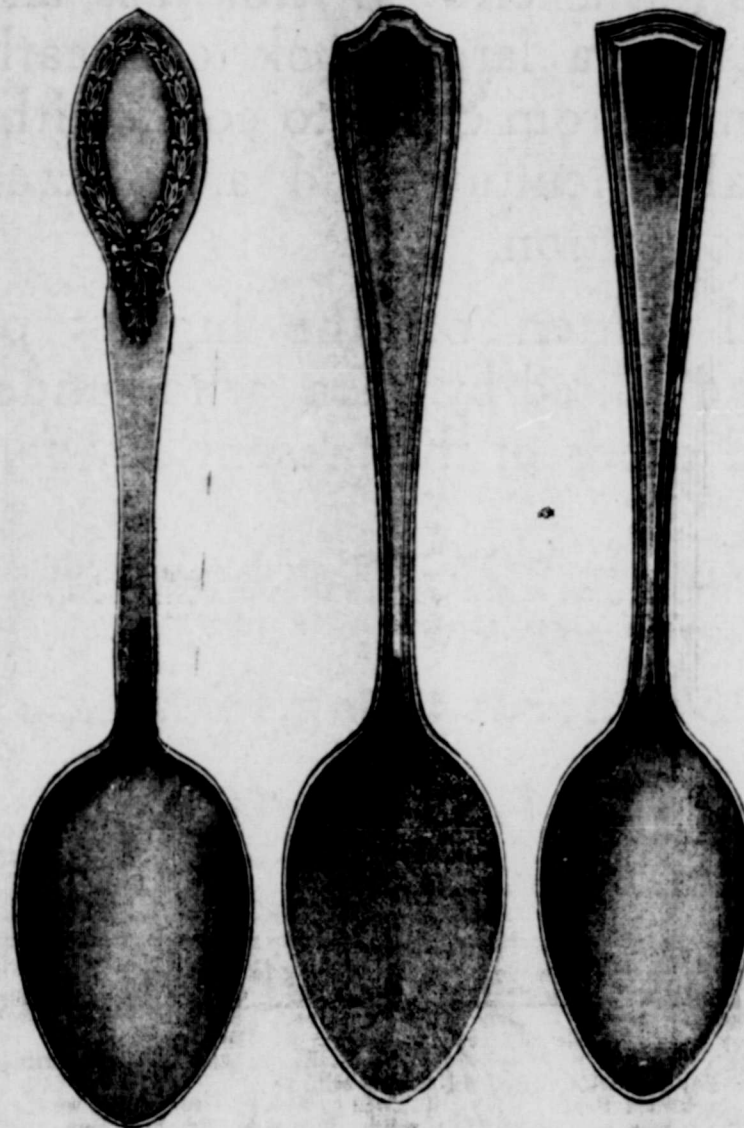
At Methodist Church.

GARY ATKISON CASE.

Verdict For Five Years in the Penitentiary.

The jury in the Gary Atkison case yesterday morning at 8:00 o'clock returned a verdict finding the defendant guilty of manslaughter, and assessing his punishment at five years in the penitentiary. The defendant, through his attorneys, immediately filed a motion for a new trial, which was overruled, and notice was then given of an appeal.

The case was a hard fought one on both sides, and occupied the attention of the court all the first half of the week. There was a large attendance throughout the trial and the proceedings were watched with the closest of attention.

Pending the appeal, bond was granted Atkison in the sum of \$4,000, and he will be released from custody today.

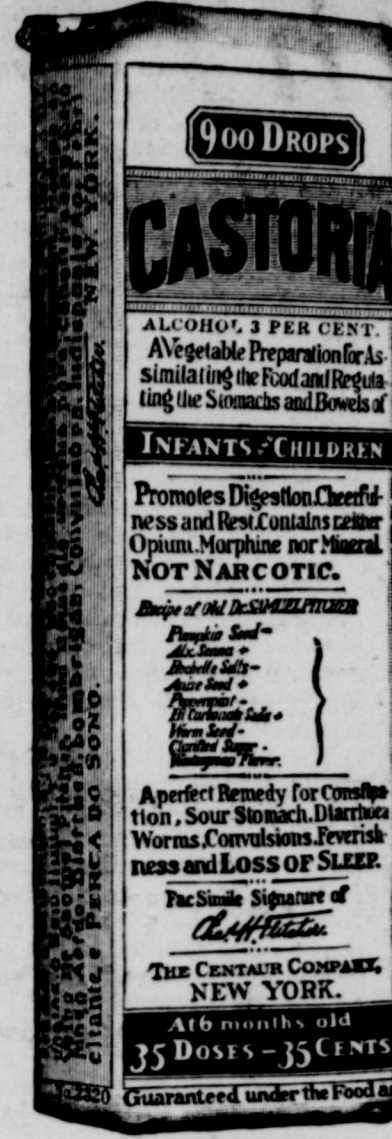

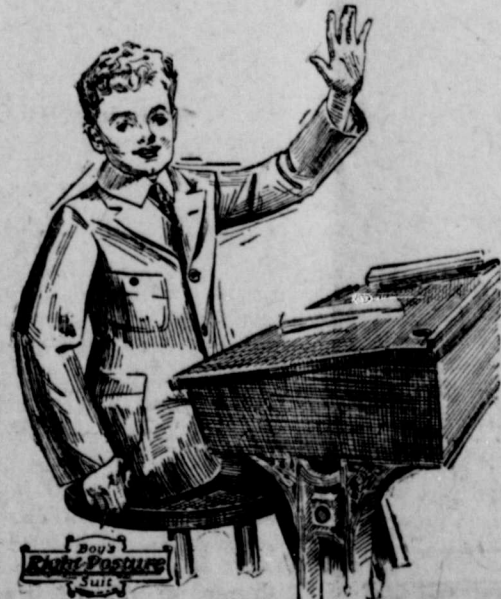

The committee stands firm on its original proposition—the owners to place the gutters, the city to improve the street. It is now up to the property owners.

FIRE PREVENTION DAY.

October 9th Proclaimed By Gov. Jas. E. Ferguson.

Jas. E. Ferguson, governor of the state of Texas, has issued a proclamation designating Saturday, October 9th, as State Fire Prevention day, and requests that mayors of cities, villages and town throughout the state let their proclamations issue calling upon the people to observe this as a general clean-up day, by the removal of rubbish, trash and waste from all premises. It is especially urged that electrical wiring, chimneys and flues be carefully gone over and placed in safe condition for winter use, and all public and private institutions, hotels, asylums, factories and theatres be carefully looked over on that day and all changes effected that will tend to the protection of such buildings and their occupants.

Attention is also directed to the following paragraph in the governor's proclamation:

"Let no one be deceived into the belief that because, perchance, he does not pay insurance premiums and has not suffered an individual fire loss, that he has escaped this tax. In modern business the fire waste tax is a part of the cost of every article of trade and commerce consumed by either man or beast. The significant and interesting feature of the fire loss problem is that easily fifty per cent of it is preventable."

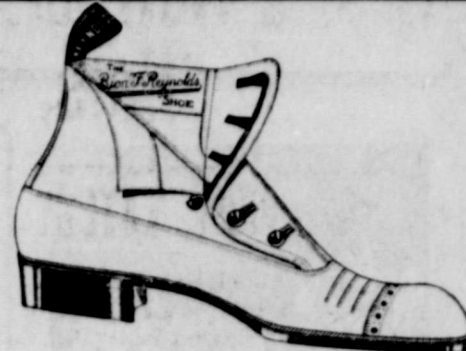
