Child Dies.

The death of Duke Paul Callan, the little son of Dr. G. P. Callan, occurred Monday evening at 7:00 o'clock at the Temple sanitarium, where Dr. Callan had taken the little fellow for treatment. While the news of the death saddened every heart, it was not unexpected, as a message Sunday stated that he was being kept up by hypodermics, and that the end might come at any time.

Duke Paul was aged three years, six months and nineteen days at the time of his death. He had been ill only a short time, but his condition was immediately recognized as serious, and the anxious father hurried to the sanitarium with him. An operation was there pronounced useless and unnecessary, but an effort was made to restore vitality to the body by the transfusion of blood from one of the nurses, which proved unavailing.

Dr. Callan will arrive this afternoon with the body, and funeral services will be held from the family home at 4:00 o'clock, interment being made in Brady cemetery.

COTTON REACHES 12c

MIDDLING BASIS IN BRADY TODAY.

Ginners' Report and Condition Report Send Cotton Prices Climbing Upward.

Following the receipt of the ginners report on cotton Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock, which gave a total of 2,960,007 bales ginned up to September 25th, as compared with 3,393,753 bales for the corresponding period last year, and the cotton condition report received at 11 o'clock, giving the condition of cotton as 66.8 as compared with 73.5 at a corresponding date

last year, cotton advanced to the highest point recorded this season up to that time, middling cotton bringing 11.75, as against 11.25 Saturday.

This morning another advance was recorded, cotton reaching 12c for middling basis.

Cotton seed is also bringing a good round figure, \$29 per ton having been paid in Brady since Saturday.

INCREASE FACULTY.

School Board Finds It Necessary to Add Teacher.

Because of the large classes in the Brady Public school, the school board has found it necessary to add another teacher to the faculty, and Miss Cunningham of Comanche has been secured for the position. Miss Cunningham is well qualified, having taught in the public schools for a number of years, and the school board feels exceedingly fortunate in having been able to secure her services. The 5th and 6th grades, which have an enrollment of between 50 and 60 each, will be divided, Miss Cunningham taking part of each grade, and thereby lightening the tasks of the teachers of these grades.

IN DISTRICT COURT.

Suit of J. T. Christian vs. Santa Fe Goes to Jury.

Arguments in the case of J. T. Christian vs. the Santa Fe Ry. Co., damages were completed Monday evening, and the jury has been considering the case since, with no verdict reported up to 1:00 o'clock this afternoon.

The case, which was transferred here from San Saba county, was for \$10,000 damages, Mr. Christian alleging damages as a result of railroad construction through his place, claiming diversion of a stream which was the source of supply for a lake, and also alleging failure of the Santa Fe to perform certain parts of work contracted. The case was begun in court Thursday morning and has been hard fought on both sides all the way through. Shropshire & House and T. C. Wilkerson of Brownwood represented the plaintiff, C. K. Lee of Fort Worth and Sam McCollum the defendant.

Brother Died.

J. W. Embry last week received the sad news of the death of his brother, O. C. Embry, on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the railroad sanitarium in San Antonio, to which place he had been taken following an accident in which he and his wife were victims. Mr. Embry, accompanied by his wife, started out in a railroad motor car on a trip, and in some manner, as yet unexplained, the car was overturned near Odem, Mr. Embry receiving internal injuries which caused his death, and Mrs. Embry being also seriously injured, while two Mexicans, who were with them, received fractured skulls. The injured folks were hurried to the San Antonio sanitarium, where Mrs. Embry still remains.

The remains were carried to Midlothian, Ellis county, where the funeral took place last Wednesday.

Mr. Embry was the youngest brother of J. W. Embry, and was born August 10, 1866. For a number of years he was division superintendent on the Orient between Sweetwater and Alpine, and about a year ago he removed to San Antonio, where he accepted a similar position. His widow, a married daughter living in Sweetwater, a son attending school in Sweetwater, and two smaller children survive him. All of the children were at the bedside of Mr. Embry when death came to relieve his sufferings, but were unable to attend his funeral because of the serious condition of Mrs. Embry.

FIND PETRIFIED BODY.

Found Near Brownwood By a Farmer.

Brownwood was greatly excited Thursday morning by the news that a petrified body had been found near town. It was said that the body was that of a boy apparently about 17 years old, and that every feature of the body was perfect. A party of county and local physicians went to the scene and examined the find, and were inclined to pronounce it the first genuine specimen of petrified human being that had ever been discovered.

The find was made by Rice Stewart, on his farm near the Frisco stock pens, three miles west of Brownwood.

When the body was first examined hastily there was little doubt that the object was a genuine petrified boy. Later, however, a more careful examination by several physicians disclosed evidences which cause a doubt as to the genuineness of the theory of petrification.

District Attorney W. U. Early returned Thursday night from Brady, where he has been attending district court, for the purpose of conducting an inquest following the finding yesterday of what purports to be the petrified body of a boy.

"I am being criticized for attempting to hold an inquest over this dead and petrified body," declared the district attorney today, "but I feel that it is my duty to investigate this case. It is evident that the youth whose form is petrified met death by being murdered, the arrow head in his ear showing this beyond doubt. It is the duty of the officers, therefore, to make a due investigation, regardless of criticism."
