BULLY FOR BRADY.

G. B. Awalt Tops Fort Worth Market With Hogs.

Brady and McCulloch county scored another blue ribbon success Wednesday when G. B. Awalt, Camp San Saba's progressive stock farmer, topped the Fort Worth market with a carload of hogs at \$7.80. The carload number 68 porkers, and the average weight was 238 pounds. All the hogs were maize fed.

This is the first instance on record where McCulloch county hogs topped the market, Oklahoma swine usually running 15c to 25c better than those of this section. Mr. Awalt's load, however, was especially nicely turned out and fine-looking and easily carried off the honors.

Mr. Awalt still has about 90 head left, which he expects to market a little later.

In addition to hogs, Mr. Awalt gives much of his time to registered and high-grade Red Polled cattle, and his Bide-A-Wee stock farm is famous the country over for the fine cattle he raises, his calves bringing fancy prices and being greatly in demand among breeders of classy stuff.

SERIOUS RUNAWAY.

Team Crashes Into E. A. Marshall's Mules Yesterday.

A team belonging to Lon Downs yesterday ran away, and in the endeavors of bystanders to stop their wild flight, they were turned into a team of mules belonging to E. A. Marshall, with the result that the tongue of the wagon pierced the abdomen of one of the mules, inflicting an ugly wound, from which the intestines protruded.

The accident happened at 10:30 in the morning. Mr. Downs had driven to the Brady gin, having a load of seed cotton, and also a bale of cotton. He dumped the bale off, while the seed cotton was being fed into the suction. His team of grays were rather skittish, and knowing their disposition, he had set the brake hard and had wrapped the lines tightly around the brake. A bolt which held the brake rod, had become loosened and dropped out, allowing the brake to slacken, and when the team became frightened there was nothing to hinder their breakneck dash up the street and across the square.

Mr. Marshall's team of mules was hitched to the court house railing on the east side, and the

runaways dashed into them at full speed, the impact being so great that the wagon tongue on the Marshall wagon was snapped like a twig. An examination of the injured mule showed that the tongue had entered the flank just behind the ribs to a depth of about eight inches, tearing the intestines loose, and the veterinary states that it is entirely unlikely that the animal should recover.

The runaways escaped unscathed, except for slight scratches on the leg of one.

A PITIFUL CASE.

Let Charity Begin at Home—Help the Needy.

A pitiful case has been called to our attention—that of the Marshal family, who live just three blocks southwest of the Central school building. The father has been crippled for several years with rheumatism, which has resulted in blood poison setting up in one of his legs. He is barely able to be about with the aid of crutches. The mother has supported the family by taking in washing, and a week or two ago pricked her finger on a pin carelessly left in the clothes. As a result, blood poison has set in and her whole hand is infected. A little girl, aged 11 years, and the oldest of six children, has for five weeks been sick with slow fever, and a younger child has developed slow fever also.

The family is in destitute circumstances, but Brady people have opened their hearts to them. The county furnishes them the necessities of life, the services of a doctor have been supplied and ice is provided for the fever-stricken patients. The kind-hearted ladies of the Baptist church, to whose attention the case was first called, have done all in their power to alleviate the distress of the family, and have endeavored to supply nurses.

As before stated, the family is being taken care of, and the only thing that lacks is the services of a competent nurse in order that the sick folks may be snatched from the jaws of death, which will almost surely close about them unless they are given most careful attention. To secure a nurse, about \$3.00 a day will be required.

Messrs. T. J. King, Evans Adkins and Tom Ball have been appointed a committee by the people of the Baptist church to solicit funds for this purpose, and it is sincerely hoped that the people of Brady will respond liberally to the appeal. Remember, it is in the Master's service.

Quite a large number of negro cotton pickers have been brought in from East Texas during the past few days. Such a pity that white labor cannot be secured to get our big crop of cotton, but it is out of the question.

A son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Ware at the Noyes ranch this morning.

Our Melvin gins are humming right along, with a total of 1631 bales ginned to date, the Utsey gin leading with 855 and the Bauhof gin 776 bales. It is now predicted that the crop will amount to more than 4,000 bales as there is still a great deal of cotton in the field.

It was our pleasure to make the acquaintance of Veteran C. Ince this week. He is one of the few old timers of Texas, having come to this state in 1859, and is hale and hearty and able to get about as spry as many younger men. He went down to Brady this morning on business.

A bloody scrap took place at one of our gins Wednesday between a white man and a Mexican, and when it was over the doctor had to take several stitches to sew up a gash in the Mexican's head caused by coming in contact with a rock. The row was the result of a race to get their cotton onto the gin scales first.

The Melton Land Co. this week sold the old Youngquist farm east of Melvin to D. J. Malmstrom. We did not learn the consideration.

J. H. Broman has bought from Savage Bros. the place occupied by J. J. Chamberlain, west of town for \$30 per acre.

Concho county officers made a raid on a negro gathering near Pasche Saturday night and in the drag net caught a lot of poker players and crap shooters. It is said that several white men were found in the games. One of the officers blacked up as a negro and mixed freely with the crowd, without attracting suspicion, and when the raid was made a general stampede occurred. A big portion of the crowd was rounded up, however, and some cotton picking money will be contributed to the Concho county exchequer.

The West Sweden gin is now in operation and up to Tuesday had ginned 60 bales of cotton.

We are pleased to know that our old friend, W. T. Sheppard, formerly of Stiles, is now a citizen of good old McCulloch county, and has bought property at Brady. Will is a tip-top good fellow, and our only regret is that he did not locate at Melvin instead of Brady. But he has not yet seen Melvin, and we still have hopes of winning him.

Prof. Lawrence Allison was a passenger on the train Saturday from Eden to Brady. He went down to consult the county superintendent about the course of study to be used in Melvin school this term.

Mrs. R. B. Hardin suffered a painful injury by being thrown against the top of an automobile Sunday evening. A lurch of the car against an embankment caused the occupants to be thrown upward, and in the sudden contact with something Mrs. Hardin's lip was lacerated and she was bruised about the face.

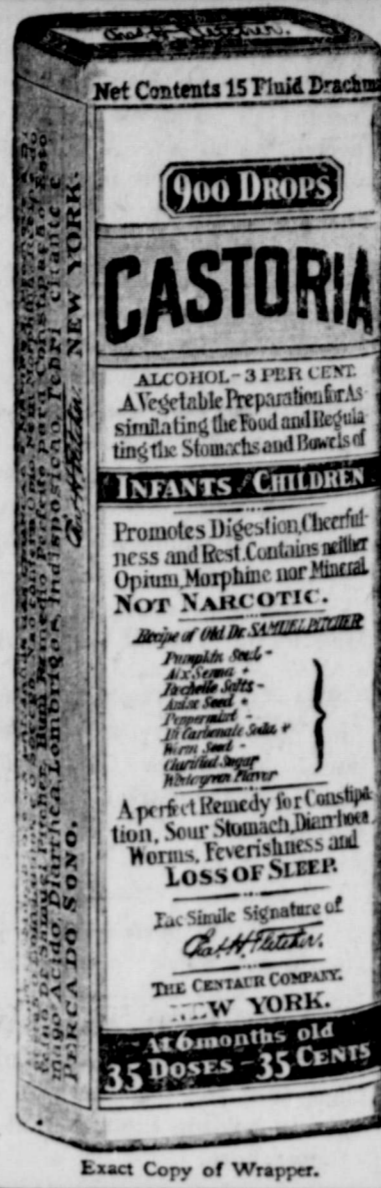

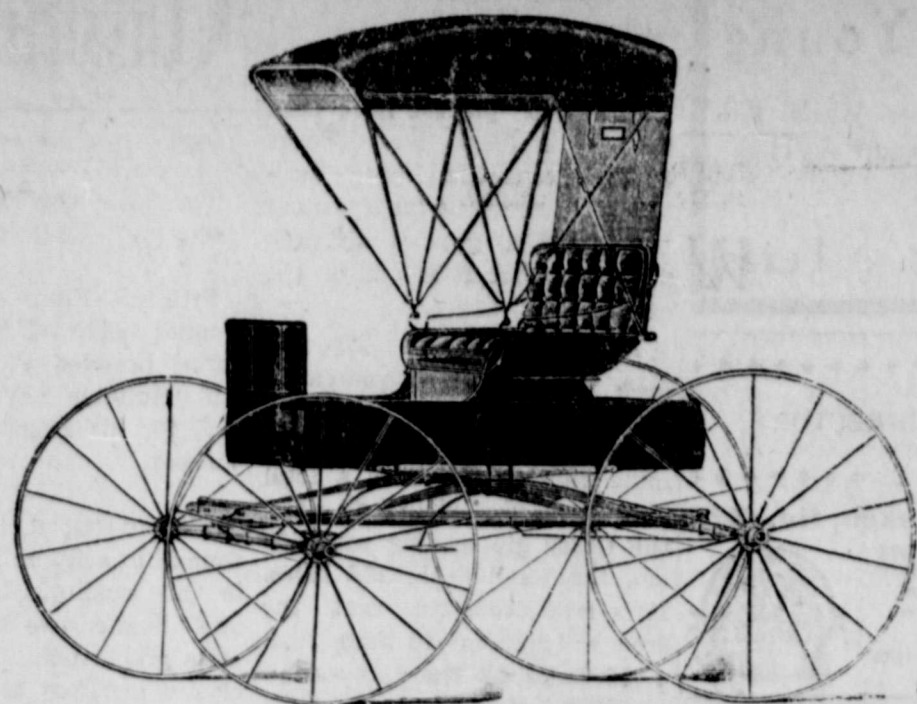

Small Crowd Finds Elmore Instructive and Entertaining.

R. B. Elmore, industrial commissioner of the Texas Immigration Information bureau, addressed a small assemblage at the court house auditorium Tuesday night, his lecture proving both interesting and instructive.

During the day Mr. Elmore had addressed the pupils at the school, and his address at night dealt with matters of interest and benefit to the school, as well as with industrial and civic problems.

Mr. Elmore's message was received with closest attention by his hearers, and his clever sallies and emphatic statements brought round after round of applause. Among other subjects he spoke of mail order house methods. In order to be fully conversant upon this subject, Mr. Elmore visited the big mail order houses in the North, where he was invited to inspect their business and business methods in the minutest detail. He was given an outline of what the mail order houses had done in the past years, and what they expected to do next year and in the years to come. He was invited to return to Texas and give the merchants here the regards of the mail order houses, and to tell them they were welcome to the credit trade, but that the cash trade belonged to the mail order houses. He showed how these concerns were tightening their grip upon the rural communities and also showed how the merchant could successfully combat this industrial warfare.

Another subject of interest was that of rural home-building. He showed how it might become

possible to change the ratio of 60 per cent of tenant farmers in Texas to 90 per cent home owners.

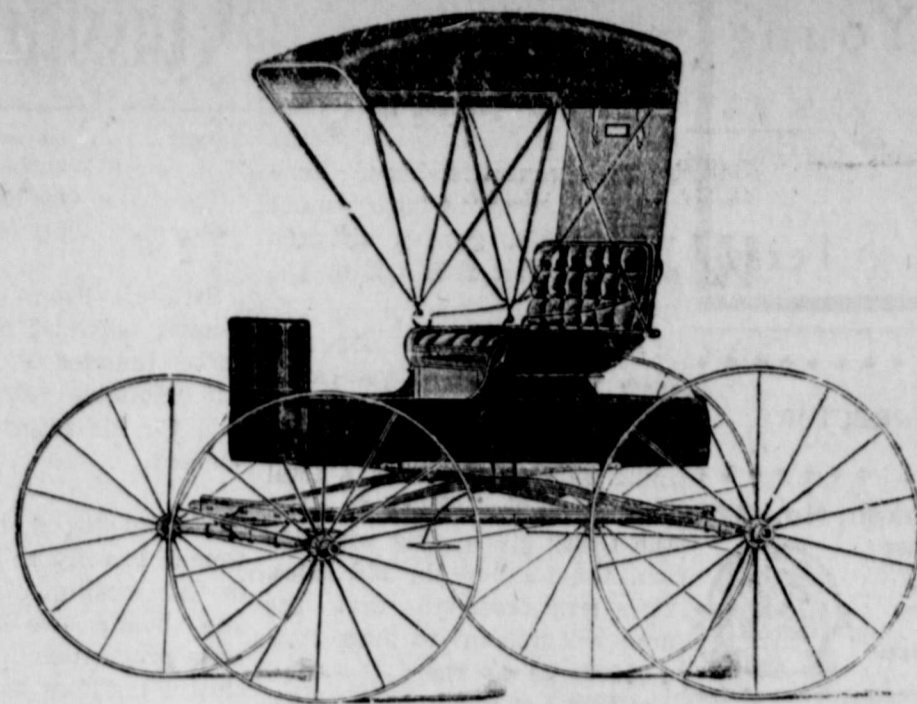

ARDMORE HOLOCAUST.

Evangelist Bedichek's Narrow Escape From Death.

There is one preacher of the gospel in Brady who did not pay his barber and shine bill, and offers a very reasonable excuse for not doing so. The man is Evangelist E. A. Bedichek, who is conducting the revival at the Church of Christ.

A graphic account is given by him of the Ardmore, Oklahoma, holocaust of September 27th, when a tank of gasoline exploded, strewing blazing gasoline over the business section of the city, with the result that 57 people lost their lives in the explosion and resultant fire.

Mr. Bedichek spent several hours in Ardmore the morning of the disaster, intending to leave on the 2:45 afternoon train. He proceeded to the depot at 2:15, leaving his grips there, and finding he had some spare time, strolled back up town and entered a barber shop about 120 yards distant. Being in a hurry, he had the bootblack shine his shoes simultaneously with the barber shaving him. Both the barber and the bootblack had almost finished their tasks when the dull roar of the explosion sounded, followed immediately by showers of glass from the shattered windows. Mr. Bedichek says he never saw the barber or the bootblack again, and he himself made a hurried exit from the tottering building, not even stopping to secure his coat and hat or to remove the barber's towel from about his neck.

When his nerves had quieted

and he had found time to take an inventory of himself he found a gash on his hand, while his legs were cut and bruised by the falling glass. The cut on his hand has practically healed, but the other injuries continue to give him great pain and annoyance.

Mr. Bedichek says the fires caused by the blazing gasoline were extinguished in about two hours, and the passenger train, which had been halted about a quarter of a mile up the track, was allowed to proceed after a three-quarters of an hour delay. Upon his arrival in Oklahoma City, he was seized upon by reporters of the daily papers, and account of the disaster which appeared in the Daily Oklahoman being his verbal story of the affair.

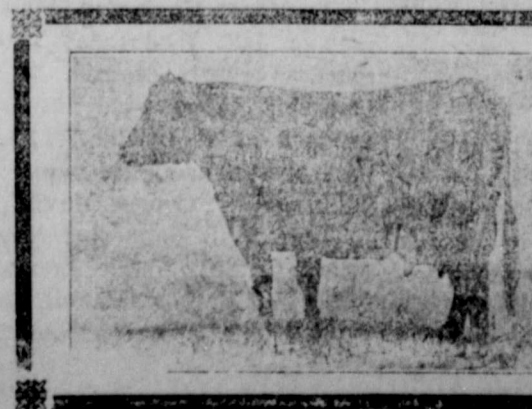
