SPLENDID INSTITUTE

TEACHERS UNANIMOUSLY
ENDORSE JOINT MEET.

Splendid Program of Lectures
and Much Good Work Accomplished During Week.

The joint teachers institute was brought to a close Friday afternoon, and echoes of enthusiastic praise for the program arranged by Supt. E. L. White are still to be heard among the teachers and all who were in attendance upon the institute. In fact, the teachers, as a body, are unanimously of the opinion that it was the best institute ever held and one in which more good was accomplished and more benefit derived than in any ever held in this section. So enthusiastic are the teachers over the joint institute that it is almost a foregone conclusion that they will meet in Brady again next year.

There were three great fea-

tures in the institute. First, was the demonstration by S. G. Rubinow, associate professor of agricultural education, A. & M. in which a practical illustration was given of the judging of the good points of a cow, for which purpose a fine Jersey cow was furnished by the Connally dairy. The demonstration also included a practical illustration of the Babcock milk tester. This unique feature of the institute program aroused greatest interest among the teachers and closest attention was given every part of Mr. Rubinow's lecture.

One of the most interesting features of the institute was the lecture of Dr. A. E. Winship of Boston, a gray and grizzled veteran educator who is making his fortieth trip across the continent. Dr. Winship is scheduled for lectures in thirty of the largest cities of the U. S. He has just returned from the San Francisco exposition where he lectured, and he has also lectured at the State University of Tennessee and the State University of Wisconsin. During his stay in Brady Dr. Winship

was deluged with telegrams inviting him to give lectures before various educational bodies.

Dr. Winship spoke upon the difference between education and information. He took the position that a man might be a university graduate and still be a non-entity. He said he would rather see an ignoramus striving to do things than to see a so-called well-educated man "sitting on the tail of progress and hallowing 'whoa'." Dr. Winship also stated that the work undertaken by the joint institute was along the right lines, and was destined to bear fruit and make for better schools for the children in this part of Texas. He said there was as much difference between West and East Texas as between North and South America. Dr. Winship was very much carried away with the institute, and a message from him after his arrival in Dallas stated that he was still hearing of the great institute held out in McCulloch county.

The third feature was the lecture by Dr. H. T. Musselman,

editor of the Texas School Journal, Dallas, on "Life and Education." Dr. Musselman was, possibly, the most pleasing speaker of all and his lecture was notable for the depth of thought and store of information his message carried with it.

As before stated, the institute was all that could possibly have been anticipated, the program being carried out in the best way, and the best of spirits prevailing throughout. The teachers expressed themselves as highly pleased with the hospitality of the Brady people and with the entertainment accorded them. On the other hand, it is estimated that no less amount than \$3,000 was left in Brady by the teachers during their stay.

As in all profitable transactions both visitors and citizens were benefited, and for this reason it behooves the people of Brady to bend every effort toward securing the joint institute again next year.

Cutting Affray.

A cutting affray which may have serious consequences took place in the Mercury neighborhood Saturday afternoon, when Marion Short attacked his brother with a knife. The quarrel is alleged to have originated over pay which Marion Short was to receive for work done for his brother, and occurred while the two men were seated in a buggy near the town of Mercury. The victim was reported in very serious condition Saturday night, having been cut and stabbed in the abdomen, the cut penetrating the hollow, and slashed across the breast. The doctors held out small hopes for his recovery Saturday night, but Sunday the victim was reported resting easier and it is thought he may recover.

Marion Short was brought to Brady Sunday by Deputy Sheriff J. S. Lovelace and charged with aggravated assault. He waived preliminary examination and was released under bond of \$500.

SUPPORTING THE MARKET.

It is to laugh, the action of the British Board of Trade, in "supporting the market for American cotton." Announcement is made that the board will pay for all confiscated American cotton that it has bought from the British government, and pay for it at the market price at the port of shipment at the date of shipment.

The cotton was seized when the price was around 7 cents to 8 cents at American ports. The owners have been out the cotton and the money therefor at the price that cotton was selling in neutral countries at the time it was seized, plus interest and charges on the money involved. Meanwhile, cotton has advanced to 12 cents in America, and the British Board of Trade is willing to pay the price of a year ago "in order to support the market."

MARKETING ASSOCIATION.

The Stephenville Marketing association has scored a few points in the handling of the apple crop this season. So far the association has sold 46 cars of apples, 39 of them picked, fancy fruit, bringing on an average of \$500 per car. The seven cars of culls brought through the association \$200. Other shippers sold nine cars of orchard run of apples outside of the association to outside buyers and the returns were approximately what the culls brought the association. The association has sold four more cars of fancy apples to be delivered just as soon as they can be loaded. A total of 53 cars have been shipped this season.—Farm & Ranch.

OVERLAND SETS ANOTHER RECORD.

A new shipping record was established by the Willys-Overland Company on September 29, when 627 cars left the factory. Never before in the history of the big Toledo concern has it been able to reach this high-water mark in daily production.

During the past four months the production of the Overland factory has grown tremendously. In June the shipments averaged 300 cars a day. Before the end of August this was increased to 500 a day.

During September the shipments of Overlands again showed a marked increase, each week in the month being larger than any of those preceding. In the four days from September 27 to 30, inclusive, 2233 cars left the big Toledo plant. On the last Wednesday of the month 627 were shipped, a new day's record for the Overland Company. From April 21, when the shipments of new models first began to leave the factory, up to September 30, the Overland had shipped 49,977 cars. During the same production period on last year's models, shipments amounted to 21,426 cars. This was considered a phenomenal record at the time, yet 1915 shows an increase of over 133 per cent.

By shipping 627 cars on September 30, the factory not only broke all former records, but it fulfilled the prediction made by its president, John N. Willys, last January. At that time Mr. Willys made public the fact that he believed the Overland Company would jump its production up to 600 cars a day before another year had passed. Even his closest associates considered it a hazardous statement to make, as the factory at that time was producing less than 200 cars a day.

However, they did not know of the stupendous building operations that Mr. Willys had in view. The Toledo plant at that time contained an aggregate of 60 acres of floor space. This has been increased to more than 80 acres, and with the completion of buildings now under way the Overland plant will have 103 acres of floor space. As it stands today, the Toledo factory is the largest plant devoted exclusively to the manufacture of automobiles in the world.

BIG EDUCATIONAL CAMPAIGN

Business and Civic Revival in Brady Inaugurated by Messrs. Elmore and Wipprecht.

Brady is beginning to experience the influence of the mighty business revival campaign that is being conducted under the direction of R. B. Elmore, industrial commissioner of the Texas Immigration Bureau of Dallas, assisted by Paul Wipprecht of the State Agricultural department, County Superintendent E. L. White, City Superintendent W. L. Hughes and the Young Men's Business League.

Upon the invitation of Rev. T. P. Grant, Mr. Elmore opened the week's work at the Presbyterian church Sunday morning where he addressed a large audience, including members of other local churches on the gospel of good health. Mr. Elmore is a plain speaking individual, and drives home to his hearers a forceful message.

He dwelt upon the care of the body and teeth and urged teaching of the sex problem to children, as a protection to them and to posterity. He urged his audience to get away from the absurd idea that from the neck up all was sacred, from the neck down, vulgar. He said: "Ignorance is not innocence. Tell children the truth—teach them to know self—the beautiful story of life and its beginning. False modesty is father of youthful indiscretions that too often breed the moral pervert, imbecile and physical wreck. Every boy and girl should have that information that puts them in full possession of healthy marital relations before marriage."

In speaking of patent medicines, Mr. Elmore called attention to the per centage of alcohol printed on the labels. He said: "No, you won't touch whiskey or even sip beer, but you'll fight booze in the shape of what is labeled 'Woman's Best Friend,' a female regulator, and there is many a man and woman today with a craving for strong drink who can thank mother because during the embryonic period, she foolishly listened to some neighbor who advised her to take this or that patent medicine, 'because you need it to build you up.'"

Mr. Elmore arraigned the fake consumption cures as fraudulent and urged all to consult a regular doctor before taking these fake cures, as none of them had any virtue.

Speaking of the filthy fly, he said: "You laugh as it tickles the baby's nose, but you cry in a few days when the germs from the dirty fly has killed your darling with typhoid. A mosquito-brained fanatic will sometimes say: 'God took that precious baby to heaven.' It's a lie; God did not remove that child—you, by your indifference, by tolerating that which breeds the fly, are responsible for that child's murder, for that is what it is."

At the night meeting for men only in the court room Mr. Elmore discoursed to an unusually large audience. Those who were present declared the address to have been the plainest talk on a delicate subject they ever listened to, and full of instruction.

Mr. Wipprecht held forth in the Presbyterian church at night, discussing "Sanitation, Home Economics and Food." He is also a forceful, inspiring and instructive speaker, and for

45 minutes held attention while he detailed the importance of eating the right things in the right way at the right time. He decried balanced rations, diet for the nervous, quality of food for those suffering with a loss of appetite, and submitted a number of menus.

On Monday both gentlemen visited the public school and addressed the pupils on "Play." A monster kite was shown, made by Mr. Wipprecht, and the children were urged to learn how to make and fly kites for pleasure. "Learn to play," said Mr. Elmore, "pitch quoits, have tugs of war, play hill-dill; you girls get your teachers to drill you in high kicking." Both gentlemen explained the various games and it is safe to say the children will indulge in a variety of healthful sports.

Monday night at the court house Mr. Wipprecht went into detail on the subject of a Retail Merchants Credit association, pointing out the benefits to the merchant, to the community and to the citizen himself. He presented many new thoughts along the line and aroused considerable interest.

Mr. Elmore spoke of the methods of the mail order houses and urged defensive tactics upon the part of the merchants. He spoke about civic improvement and civic cleanliness, stating that while the grand jury acted within the law and its rights in forbidding the sale of tobacco, gum and cold drinks on Sunday, it should also take cognizance of ill-kept stores and the unsanitary foods and decayed vegetables and fruit that were offered for sale. He hoped, before the week was over to have a big bonfire in Brady in which all the rubbish, trash and weeds might be consumed, and urged co-operation of the citizens toward this end. He also illustrated the need of getting behind the school trustees in any move they might undertake toward school betterment, and stated that many things were left undone simply because trustees were not made to feel that public sentiment was backing their every effort.

Postmaster A. B. Reagan followed Mr. Elmore and gave some interesting figures as to the Parcel Post, as follows: October 1 to 15, 1914, outgoing parcels (mailed at Brady post-office to outside points) numbered 217; weighed 480 pounds; required \$17.79 postage, at an average cost per parcel of .082. April 1 to 15, 1915, numbered 344 parcels, weighed 938 pounds, cost \$27.03 postage, at an average cost per parcel of .078. October 1 to 15, 1915, numbered 315 parcels, weighed 1104 pounds, cost \$29.33, at an average cost per parcel of .093. The total for the forty-five days actual count amounted to 876 parcels, weighed 2522 pounds, cost \$74.15, or an average of .084 per parcel. Incoming parcels numbered October 1 to 15, 1914, 648. April 1 to 15, 1915, 873 (a gain of 35% in six months.) October 1 to 15, 1915, 1077 (a gain of 24% over the preceding six months.) The total, 2598, or a gain of 66% in twelve months' time. The average outgoing parcels was nearly twenty pieces per day, or 7,093 parcels yearly, at a cost of \$595. The average incoming

parcels, nearly 58 pieces per day or 21,073 yearly at a cost of \$1770. In other words, the incoming parcels exceeded the outgoing parcels by 296%. Mr. Reagan urged the Brady merchants to adopt steps to make the outgoing parcels at least equal to, if not exceed, the incoming parcels.

Following Mr. Reagan, Mayor A. C. Baze spoke briefly about civic matters.

Tuesday talks will be given on home garden work, and the school children will be asked to raise individual winter gardens for fun and profit.

Every night there will be a meeting at the court house and the following subjects will be discussed: "How to Lower the Key Rate"; "Tick Eradication"; "Buy-It-Made-In-Texas"; "Good Roads" and other topics incident to community betterment. Every person should attend all the meetings, as Brady needs the kind of a revival these live-wire experts are conducting.
