### WEEK'S SECOND FIRE.

Destroys Shed of Mrs. J. A. Snider Saturday Afternoon.

Fire at 3:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon destroyed the buggy shed on the property of Mrs. J. A. Snider in the southwestern part of town.

The shed was already a mass of flames when the alarm was turned in, and nothing could be done except to prevent the flames from communicating to neighboring dwellings. The fire boys made their usual good time in getting to the scene, laying a line of hose from the Richards corner as far as the hose would run, but were unable to get within reach of the fire.

The origin of the blaze is unknown. Besides the shed, a buggy belonging to Willie Hurd was destroyed, and Bill Snider lost a saddle and harness, the total damage being estimated at \$225, with no insurance.

**ABOUT FIRE PLUGS.**

If any further illustration of  
the need of additional fire plugs in  
the southwestern portion of  
town was needed, it was fur-  
nished by the blaze last Satur-  
day afternoon which destroyed a  
buggy shed in that section.  
It will be recalled that a year  
or so ago, Parson Grant, as sec-  
retary of the Commercial club,  
endeavored for some time to in-  
terest the citizens in the extend-  
ing of the water mains and the  
placing of fire plugs in three  
places—one at the school house,  
and the other two at convenient  
points in the immediate neigh-  
borhood of the two recent fires.  
Non-interest and the apathy of  
the citizens mostly concerned  
led to the dropping of the un-  
dertaking.

Since the past week, the citi-  
zens of Brady, and more espe-  
cially those residing in the dis-  
trict exposed to fires, have be-  
come aroused to the danger  
which confronts them. Support  
has been volunteered upon all  
sides, and now while interest is  
at its height, the matter should  
be brought to a successful ter-  
mination. If no other way pre-  
sents itself, let a subscription  
list be circulated and the nec-  
essary funds raised in this man-  
ner. Not only should and would  
the citizens of the southwestern  
portion of town be willing to  
contribute, but every citizen of  
Brady would lend a hand to such  
commendable enterprise.

And while engaged upon the  
work, it would be a good plan  
to investigate other outlying  
sections of Brady. Ample fire  
protection is the cheapest safe-  
guard against future loss.

### THE STATE OF TEXAS.

To the Sheriff or Any Constable of McCulloch County, Greeting:

Whereas, on the 20th day of September, 1915, W. W. Sammons recovered in the district court of McCulloch County, a judgment against W. A. Gentry and G. W. Nichols for the sum of one hundred ninety-eight and 20/100 (\$198.20) dollars, with interest thereon from the 20th day of September, 1915, at the rate of ten per cent per annum and costs of suit; and, whereas, the said judgment is a foreclosure of a vendor's lien on the following described property, to-wit: Lots Nos. Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) in Block No. Nine (9), Spiller Addition to the town of Brady, McCulloch County, Texas, as said vendor's lien existed on the 3rd day of November, 1913, and it is ordered and decreed by said judgment that said property be sold as under execution in satisfaction of said judgment. And if said property shall sell for more than sufficient to pay off and satisfy said sums of money, the excess should be paid over to the said defendant, W. A. Gentry. But if said property should not sell for enough to pay off said sums of money, the balance due shall be made as under execution, and such order of sale shall have the force and effect of a writ of possession, and the officer executing same shall make a good and sufficient deed and place the purchaser of said property in possession thereof within thirty days from date of sale.

Therefore, you are hereby commanded that you proceed to seize and sell the above described property, as under execution, and make good and sufficient deed, and to place the purchaser of the same in possession thereof within thirty days after the day of sale, and you apply the proceeds thereof to the payment and satisfaction of said sum of one hundred ninety-eight and 20/100 dollars, together with the interest that may be due thereon, and the further sum of nineteen and 50/100 (\$19.50) dollars, costs of suit, together with your legal fees and commissions for executing this writ. And if the said property shall sell for more than sufficient to pay off and satisfy said sums of money, then you are hereby directed to pay over the excess thereof to the defendant, W. A. Gentry. But if you fail to find said property, or if the proceeds of such sale be insufficient to satisfy said judgment, then you are directed to make the money or any balance thereof remaining unpaid, out of any other property of defendant, as in the case of ordinary executions.

Herein fail not, but due return make hereof within ninety (90) days, showing how you have executed the same.

From The News.

The News understands that a proposition of much importance is being considered by the county commissioners. It has to do solely with the betterment of the public roads. Offers have been made to take county warrants at an interest rate of 6 per cent, payable in 20 years. The proposition is to issue these warrants to the amount of \$30,000 and to divide this amount pro rata among the four commissioners precincts of the county and put the money on the roads. A plan is under consideration by which it is claimed that this can be done without raising the tax rate. Those who have considered the matter believe that this has some advantages over a bond issue, which would have to be submitted to an election and then the bonds sold in the bond markets of the country. This is a long and technical route and the other way may be done with the parties who have the money to invest. To say the least, it is worth considering.

Richard M. Renz of this county died suddenly in Fort Worth Monday morning. He had been to the Dallas fair and came over to Fort Worth to meet George and Calvin Ratney, who had arrived that morning on cattle business. 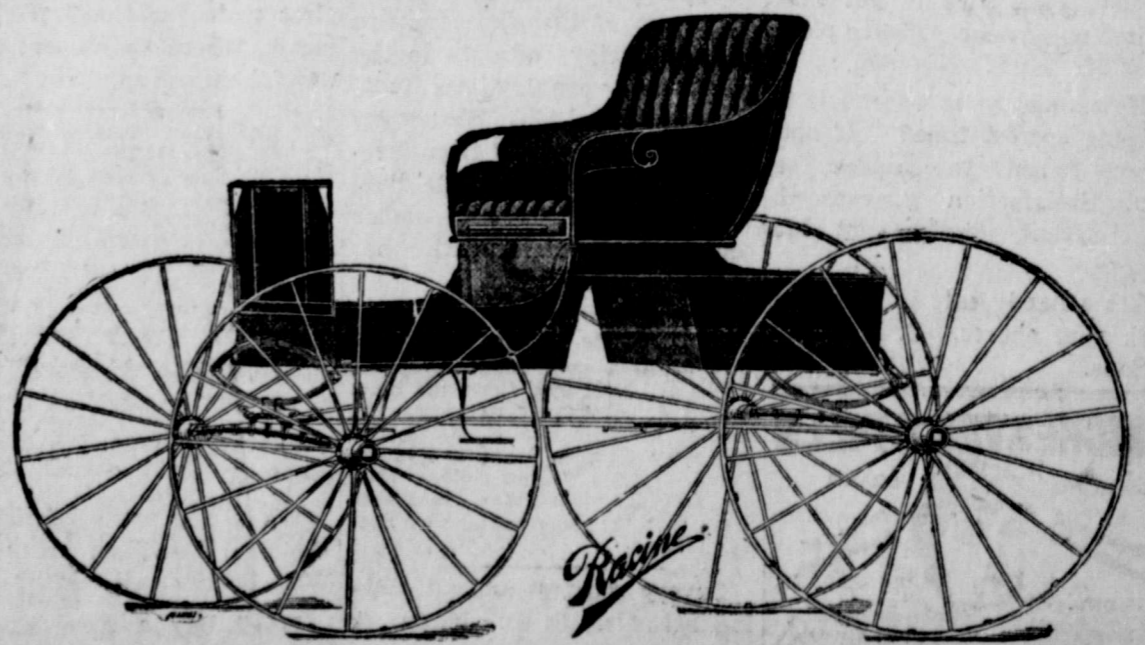
