BRADY WATER PURE.

State Bacteriologist Finds No Harmful Bacteria.

Supt. J. M. Lyle of the Brady Water & Light Works is in receipt of a letter from Dr. Malcolm Graham, state bacteriologist, as follows: "We have received and have made bacteriological examination of the specimen of water sent us, but are unable to isolate any harmful bacteria."

This information is not only a source of considerable gratification to Supt. Lyle, but should be learned with a great degree of pride and satisfaction by the citizens of Brady as well. When the new filter plant was first installed, the water was pronounced 99% plus pure, and although the filter has now been in operation some three years or more, it is gratifying to have positive assurance that it is still performing its duties with the same efficiency as at first.

COTTON IN BRADY.

Windup of the Season is Near at Hand.

THE OIL FIELD.

Testing Strata From Richland Springs to Paint Rock.

With the active drilling operations in progress at Richland Springs and Rochelle, and with drilling about to commence at Paint Rock, local parties interested in the Millersview field are closely watching the trend of affairs, inasmuch as the fields are all in direct line. The Lohn field is also in line with the oil fields now being tested, which would indicate the confidence which oil men have in this vein finally producing paying wells.

The fishing job on the Millersview well has finally been completed after many months of heart-breaking endeavor, and since the well has been cleaned out the prospects look very bright, the oil coming up through the sand at a depth of 1430 feet where drilling was brought to a halt by the loss of tools. An order for a string of casing has been placed, and as

soon as the casing is received, the oil will be tested out.

In connection with the mention of the well to be drilled at Paint Rock, it is interesting to note that operations there are in charge of Thos. Slick of Cushing, Okla. Mr. Slick, it will be recalled, was the pioneer driller in the Cushing field, selling out his holdings for one and a half million dollars.

To Install Fire Plug.

Citizens living in the southwestern part of Brady have subscribed funds for the installation of a fire plug at the Bauhof corner, a distance of four blocks from the Richards corner, where the last plug is at present located. It is planned that as new fire plugs are purchased, what are known as "steamer" plugs will be secured and used to replace the plugs now used in the fire limits, while the old plugs will be placed in the outlying districts. The "steamer" plugs have two 2 1/2 inch openings, the same as the old plugs, and in addition a regulation 6-inch opening for connection with the suction pipe of the auto fire truck. By means of this "steamer" opening, nearly three times the volume of water can be thrown as with the ordinary connection. The securing of the "steamer" plugs in the fire district of Brady will serve to further reduce the key rate of the town.

The turkey season means quite a lot to Brady, for besides putting thousands of dollars in the hands of the raisers, it also provides a nice bunch of Christmas spending money for the pickers.

A. A. Lange closed his store as usual the other night at about 8:00 o'clock and betook himself upon his homeward way. As he was walking along North Bridge street close to his home his heel struck something soft and yielding and slipped upon the cement walk. Mr. Lange in the dusk merely noted a black streak upon the walk, but continued on his way until the thought struck him that it might have been a snake. He retraced his steps and called Virgil Lee Sessions. With the aid of a light they discovered a rattlesnake about three feet long writhing in its death agony, its rattles sounding an ominous warning. Mr. Lange's heel had struck the rattler squarely upon the head.

E. J. Broad has a small car load of corn shucks in his lot, but disclaims any intention of starting a shuck mattress factory. Mr. Broad Wednesday gave an exhibition of his Champion No. 2 Corn Sheller, and all who were in attendance say the sheller is one of the most remarkable pieces of machinery they have ever seen. The corn was fed in cob, shuck and all, and was shelled out and cleaned by the machine at the rate of 90 bushels per hour, the cob and the shuck being separated and every particle of dust and dirt removed. The machine is operated by a 5-horse power engine, and its usefulness is not limited to corn shelling, but it operates in a similar efficient manner on maize, and likewise may be used for threshing peanuts. Then by the use of a grain cylinder, every manner of small grain or seed may be threshed out. A number of farmers Wednesday brought in loads of corn for testing the machine, and all are loud in their praises of its merits.

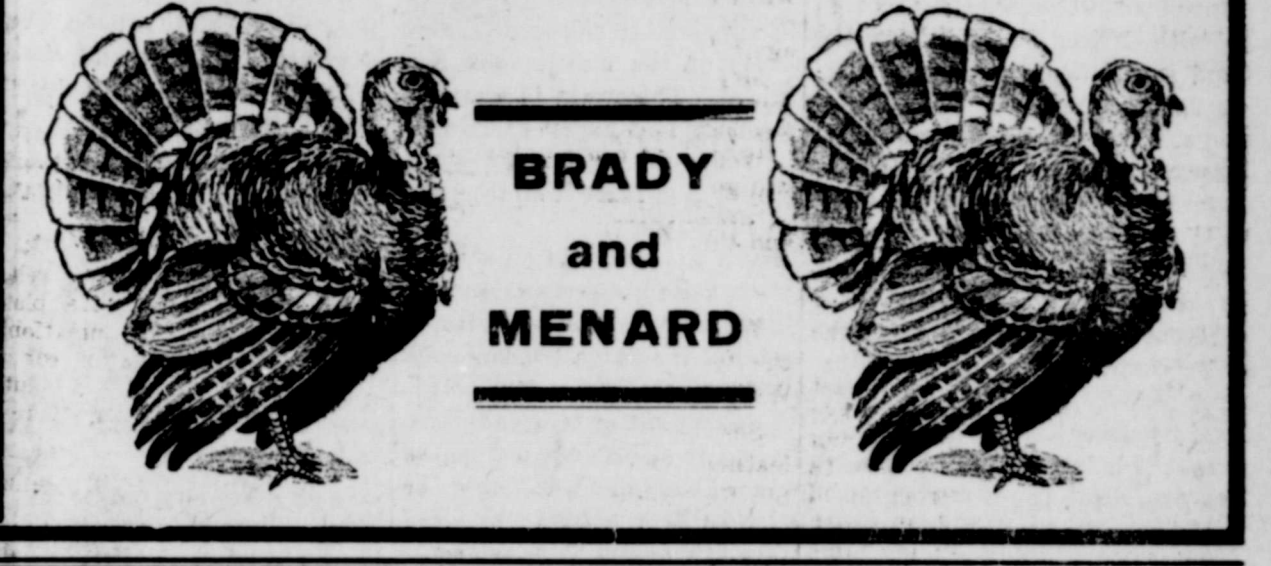

Brown, and a certificate of health was issued to each child. Special attention was given to possible disease of the eye. 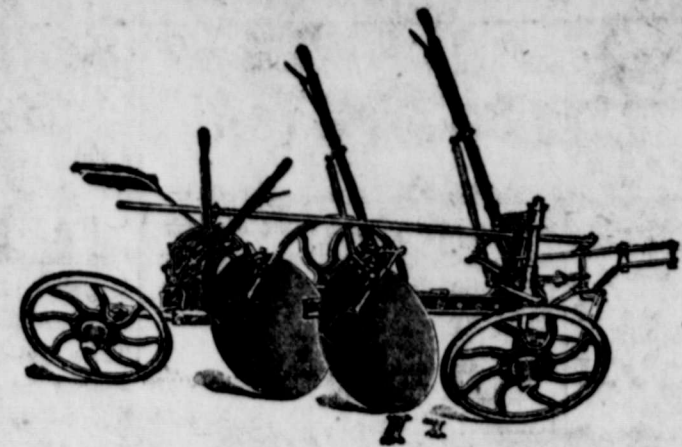

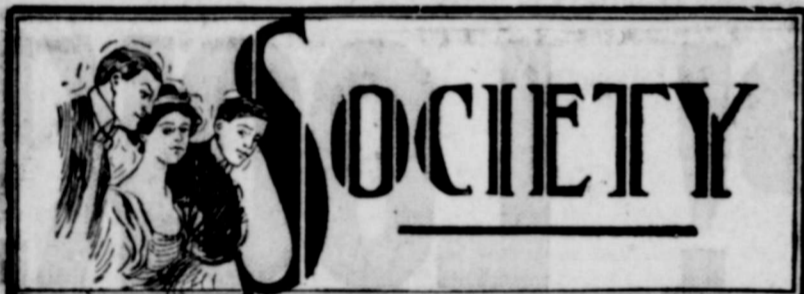

COUNCIL WANTS NEW SYSTEM READY AUG. 1 1916.

Central Energy System to Replace Magneto System—Other Business of Council.

At a meeting of the Brady city council on Tuesday night, with Aldermen Cook, Williams, Tipton and Hallum present, and Mayor Baze presiding, the matter of improving the local telephone service was taken up. The council has for some time demanded better service from the West Texas Telephone Co., and in response to this demand General Manager F. W. Greber has given his assurance that the improvements will be undertaken just as soon as local conditions warrant. Mr. Greber sets forth the position of the company in that the improvement will mean the discarding of practically all of the present system and the installation of an entirely new equipment, the change costing the equivalent of \$25,000. The company stands ready to make this expenditure, and asks the patience of the Brady citizens and the Brady council until local conditions are more favorable, and also points to the fact that a suitable central office is at present unavailable, and that this feature must positively be provided before improvements can be contemplated.

The Brady council takes the position that, while appreciating the reasonableness of Mr. Greber's requests, yet it feels duty-bound to have definite assurance as to when the improvements will be undertaken and completed.

Acting upon this opinion, motion was made and duly carried that the city council approve of the following letter written by the mayor to the West Texas Telephone Co., and that said letter be included in the minutes:

"October 27th, 1915. F. W. Greber, Gen. Mgr. West Texas Telephone Co., Brownwood, Texas, Dear Sir—Yours to the city secretary, on motion of the city council, was referred to me for reply, in which you enclosed a motion or resolution passed by your board of directors.

"The council appreciates the tone of your letter and the spirit therein manifested, but at the same time their duty to the people of Brady make it incumbent upon them to refuse to accept the time in which you promise relief by the installation of the central energy system, yet at the same time it has been suggested that they possibly would accept the sug-

gestion or promise of Mr. Greber to Mr. Tipton of installing this system ready for operation by August 1st, 1916. There is no need of taking up any further time concerning this proposition unless we are assured with intention of carrying out to the letter the installation of this system not later than August 1st, 1916, and any further delay will only strengthen this determination on the part of the city, as we are going to have telephone service by some one, and do not contemplate waiting until 1917 to get it either. Very truly yours, A. C. Baze, Mayor."

Other business of the council was as follows:

Apportionment of the Confederate pension fund was today made and announced by Pension Commissioner J. C. Jones. BOLL WEEVIL DISPERSION.

Office of Information, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Washington, D. C.—The unusual storms of August and the very rapid multiplication of the boll weevil in Texas have resulted in a tremendous movement into northwestern Texas and Oklahoma. This movement is probably not yet completed, nor has it been entirely mapped out. The indications are that over half of the state of Oklahoma is now (October 11) infested. Information has just been received that the boll weevil is at Vernon in Wilbarger county, Texas, and at Cache in Comanche county and Mineo in the extreme northern part of Grady county, Oklahoma. Unless immediate measures are taken by the planters throughout Oklahoma and northwestern Texas it can be expected that the boll weevil will do some damage next year.

The Bureau of Entomology advises that the planters throughout Oklahoma and the supposedly infested sections of Texas begin immediately to pick their cotton and destroy the plants. By destroying the plants the developing weevils will be killed. Two methods of destruction are available. If the plants can be plowed under to four or five inches this is the most desirable method of procedure, otherwise they should be stacked in windrows and burned as soon as dry.

After destroying the plants preparation should be made for a winter cover crop and for a rotation of crops next year.

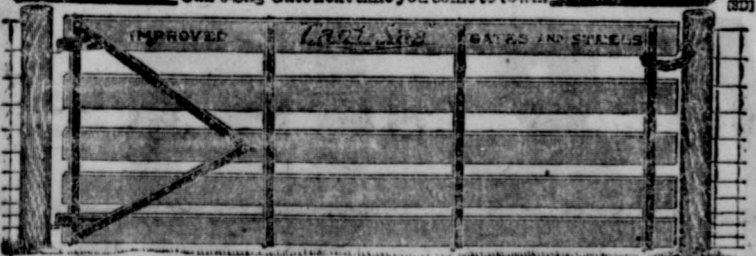

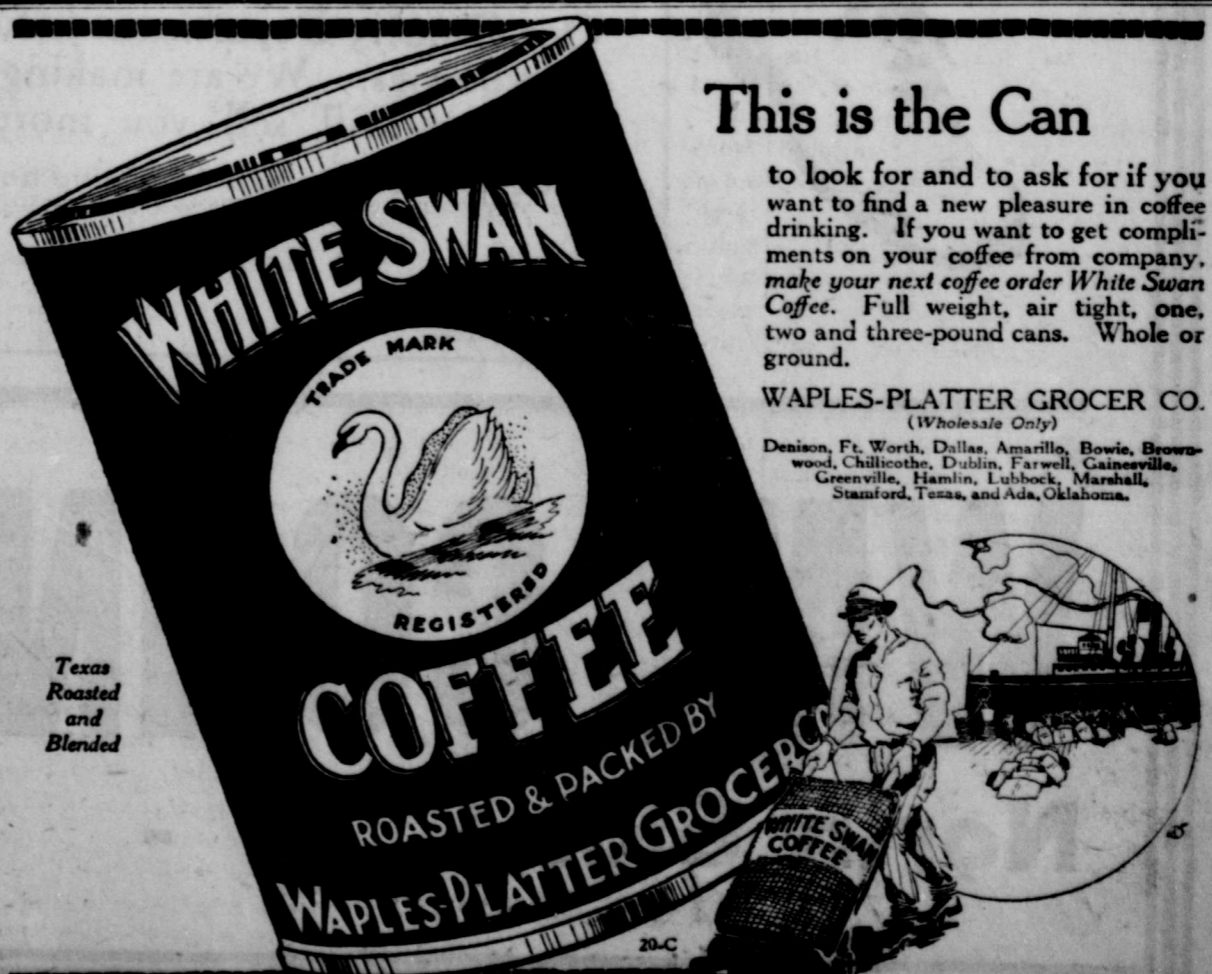
