J. A. BOWERS DEAD.

Sudden Death is Shock—Well Known in McCulloch County.

The death of J. A. Bowers occurred at his home near Hext Saturday night at 12:00 o'clock, following an illness of only eight days. The news was a great shock to all, Mr. Bowers being of sturdy build and having enjoyed good health up to the time of his fatal illness.

Death resulted from blood poison, following a slight wound on his hand received while building a chimney at his home. At the time no attention was paid to the injury, but on Friday a week ago alarming symptoms developed. Despite medical efforts and the most careful nursing, Mr. Bowers was unable to overcome the attack.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the family home, Rev. R. M. Bailey, pastor of the Christian church at Brady, conducting, and interment was made in the cemetery at Hext, a large concourse of friends of the deceased paying their last respects to the dead.

Mr. Bowers was born in Sebastian county, Arkansas, August 16, 1855, and was, accordingly 60 years, 4 months and 23 days old. He had resided in McCulloch county about six years, coming here from Austin, and was well known and highly respected throughout this section. For four years Mr. Bowers made his home in the Melvin community, removing to the Hext community two years ago, during which time he was engaged in farming. He was a splendid citizen, progressive, and a man of splendid character. He was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving him are his widow, four sons: J. T., of Austin, J. H. and D. W., of Hext, and H. W. Bowers of Brady, and five daughters: Mrs. J. K. Ross and Mrs. Perry Leonard of Austin, Mrs. Beulah Richardson of Brownwood, Mrs. Minnie McLean of San Antonio and Mrs. Dave Goodman of Hext. All the children were present for the funeral except Mrs. Richardson, who is visiting in Louisiana and could not be reached by wire.

MELVIN BANK ORGANIZED.

Capitalized at \$15,000, Fully Paid—Charter Applied For.

Melvin starts out for the trip through 1916 with a great big red feather sticking straight up in her cap. She has a bank, or rather will have a bank just as soon as the charter, for which application has been made, is received from Austin.

The organization of the First State Bank of Melvin, capitalized at \$15,000 fully paid stock, was effected at a meeting of the shareholders Wednesday night, when the following officers and directors were elected:

- T. C. Ward, president.
- Oscar Sellers, first vice president.
- J. D. McCaughan, second vice president.
- J. N. Mason, cashier.
- O. N. Mason, assistant cashier.

The necessary papers were immediately prepared, capital stock paid in, and a charter will probably be issued within the next ten days. Temporary quarters for the new institution will be provided until its permanent home—a handsome two-story brick building—can be erected.

The need of a bank has been keenly felt here, and there is no doubt of its success, inasmuch as the field is a splendid one and the chosen directory composed of successful business men. The selection of T. C. Ward as president was wisely made and meets with general approval. He is a hard worker and has accumulated a fortune by dint of industry and conservative judgment. Oscar Sellers, the first vice president, is our successful druggist, and is mighty good banking timber. He is conservative, far-seeing, and thoroughly qualified for the place on the directory. Messrs. Mason and McCaughan are experienced banking men. REPORTS FAVORABLY.

L. T. Cunningham Well Pleased With Inspection of Schools.

L. T. Cunningham, rural school inspector, was in Brady Wednesday morning enroute to Paint Rock to visit the schools in Concho county. Mr. Cunningham had just completed a two days' visit, in company with Superintendent E. L. White, of the rural schools in McCulloch county for the purpose of ascertaining whether they had complied with the rules governing the participation in the Million Dollar Rural School fund.

Mr. Cunningham was highly pleased with the result of his trip, and spoke in terms of highest praise of the schools, stating that all had passed the required standard, and several of them were entitled to a greater share of the fund than they had requested.

Mr. Cunningham had words of praise also for Superintendent

White, whom he termed one of the liveliest and most progressive superintendents with whom he had met, and one who was constantly studying the betterment of the schools. He stated that Mr. White was just at the beginning of his good work for the cause of education, and that he would, in the next few years, find greater and better opportunities for adding to the improvement of the rural schools.

Mr. Cunningham stated that he was one of two inspectors sent out over the state, and that they were covering on an average of one county a day. So far, \$325,000 of the possible \$1,000,000 fund has been awarded.

DROP IN TEMPERATURE.

Mercury Fell 42 Degrees Within Few Hours Tuesday Night.

Several citizens claim to have "hunches," to have observed "Indian signs," or to have "felt it in their bones" that there was a change in temperature coming, but the great mass of our citizenship retired to their downy couches Tuesday night totally unaware and unprepared for the drop in temperature that was registered in the wee sma' hours of the morning.

The thermometer registered about 70 degrees Fahrenheit Tuesday evening; the night was clear and moon-lit, and scarcely a breeze stirred. Along towards morning came a shower which fell in heavy gusts of downpour for a short time, and right on top of it came a bleak, blue norther that brought with it a scent of snow-capped mountains and ice-covered streams. What else was there for the mercury to do—it registered a sheer fall of 42 degrees, stopping only when it reached 28 degrees, or four degrees below freezing. Wednesday remained cold and cheerless, a freezing temperature maintaining throughout the day. Wednesday night the thermometer registered 16 degrees, or one degree lower than at any time during the winter last year. Yesterday remained cool, although the sun warmed up matters somewhat and melted the ice in places.

The rain amounted to a little more than a third of an inch and was welcome to farmers having winter grain and oats. Its extent, however, was quite limited, and in the direction north of town it is said to have reached only a few miles.

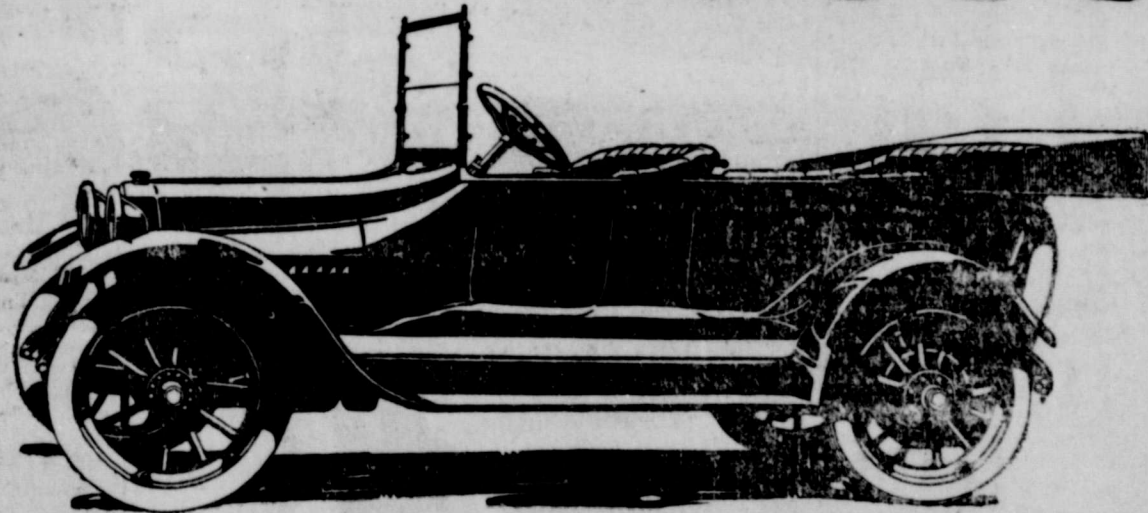

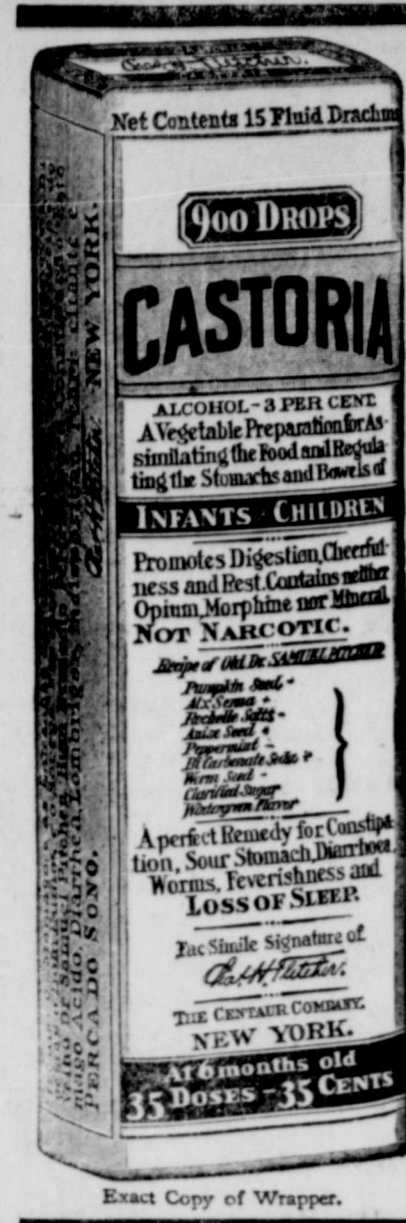

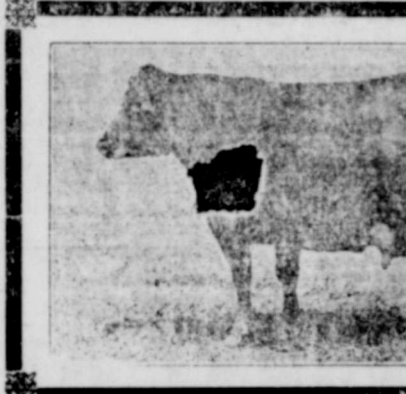
