J. F. DAVIS DEAD.

Succumbed to Pneumonia Last Night at 4:30.

The death of Julian F. Davis occurred last night at 4:30 o'clock, following an illness of just one week. The news of his passing away casts a gloom over the entire city, Mr. Davis having been one of the most popular and universally esteemed of Brady citizens. Funeral services are announced for 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the family residence, the Masonic fraternity having charge of the ceremonies, and interment will be made in the Brady cemetery.

Mr. Davis was taken ill on Monday of last week, and soon developed a severe case of pneumonia. His condition was recognized as serious, and everything that medical skill and careful nursing could accomplish was done, but without avail.

Mr. Davis was born in this county February 11, 1879, and was, accordingly, 36 years, 11 months and 6 days old at the time of his death. He lived practically all his life in Brady, and for the past ten or twelve years had been employed by the Brady Lumber Co., the past six years having been local manager of the yard. He was a man of bright and cheerful disposition, with a kindly word for all, and one who will be greatly missed in the town and home life.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, and was also a member of the Masonic lodge and the Woodmen of the World.

He is survived by a widow and six-year-old daughter, Mary Louise, and to them goes out the heartfelt sympathy of every citizen.

\$30,000 COLD CASH.

Loan Companies See Profitable Investments in McCulloch.

TRAFFIC FLAGS.

Will Soon Be in Evidence in Business District.

The street committee of the Brady city council has ordered the placing of traffic flags in the downtown district, and Brady citizens will soon be asked to observe traffic ordinances under penalty of violation, Chairman N. T. Cook announced last week.

The order for the making of the traffic flags has been placed with Ernest Sparks, who states they have just been completed, and will be ready to be placed within the next day or two. The flags are composed of a substantial four-cornered post, upon each side of which is the inscription, "Turn to the right." The post will be placed in the center of intersecting streets, and proper observance of the directions will avoid possibility of accident.

No entry fee charged. We feed, water and care for your birds. ALL TO WIN AND NOTHING TO LOSE.

Stock must be entered in the name of the actual owner, who shall be a breeder of the same variety entered, and all birds shall remain in place until the close of the show.

The Y. M. B. L. will not be responsible for loss by sickness or accident to any specimen from any cause whatever, but will assure the exhibitor, whether present or not, that their stock will receive the same care and attention that would be given our own, and that a watchman will be in the building both night and day during the show.

This show will be held under the rules and regulations of the American Poultry Association, and all birds judged by that standard of perfection.

All birds will be judged by comparison. Only one variety to the coop.

Exhibitors may secure application blanks by addressing the Secretary of Y. M. B. L.

AWARDING OF PRIZES

No name, distinction mark or decoration will be allowed on coops or birds until after prizes have been awarded.

No person shall attempt to interfere with or influence the Judges in their decisions.

No Judge shall be a competitor in the class where his decision is to be given.

Immediately after the awards have been given the Blue Ribbon will be placed on the coop containing the winner of the prize, where it must remain until the close of the show.

All winnings will be known as follows: First, Blue Ribbon; Second, Red Ribbon. All birds must be banded at the door. Leg bands will be furnished free by the Y. M. B. L. at the door.

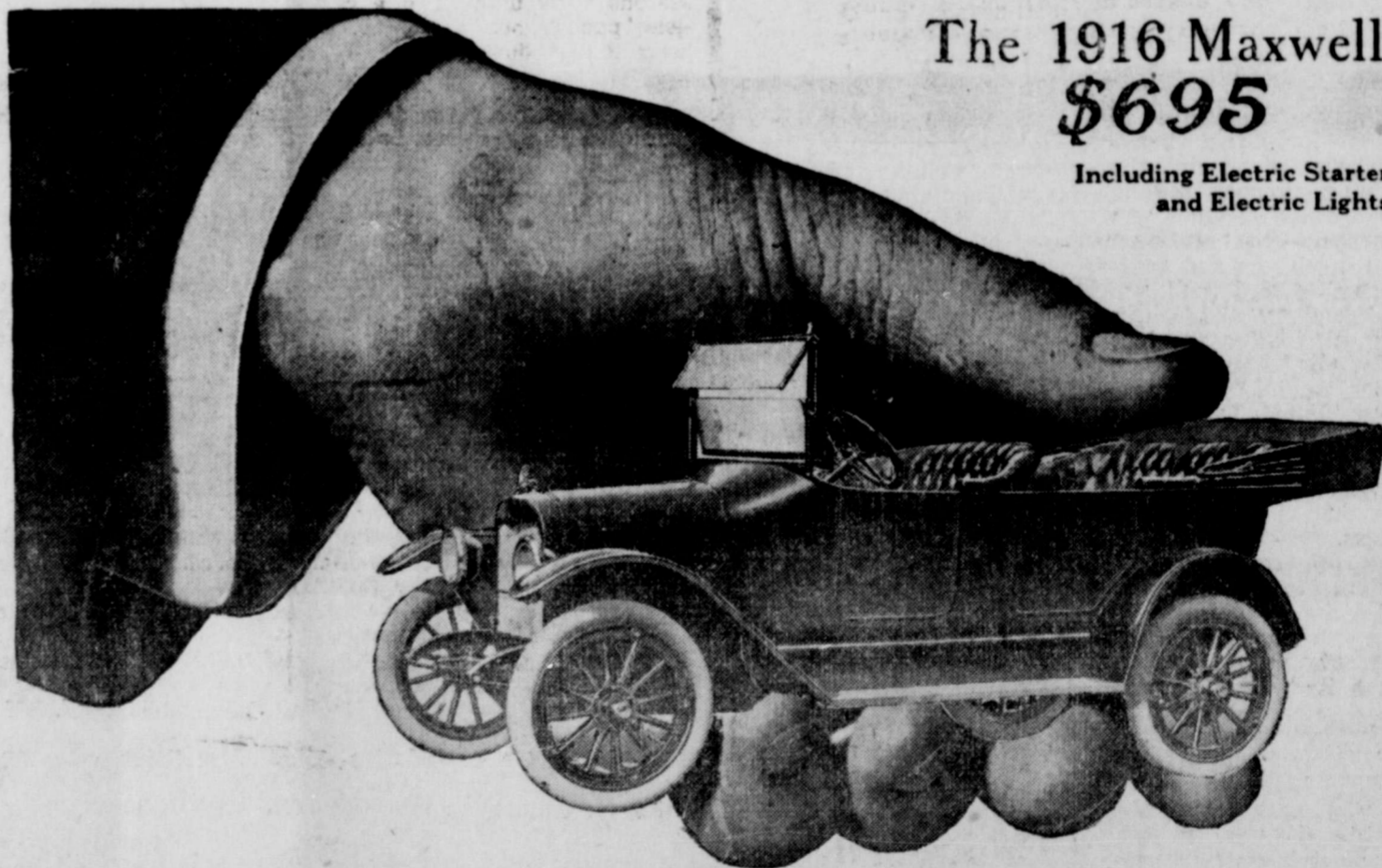
