Mr. Cooper is well known in Brady, having come here in 1910, and remaining here a year or two. He then moved to the Plains country and was for a while located at Sweetwater, Roscoe and Snyder. He returned to Brady and has been making his home here since last May. Cooper is a carpenter by trade, is a good workman, and draws good pay for his work. Such being the case his friends aver he could not be implicated! in the Gibbs case, as robbery was apparently the motive that prompted the crime. It was thought the assailant secured about \$16.00, besides the watch from Gibbs.

No trace has so far been found of Gibbs' watch. Detective Tanner and the local officers yesterday morning searched Cooper's residence, but nothing of incriminating nature was found. Later a razor was secured at the Cooper residence which was said to have been identified by Mrs. Gibbs as the property of the deceased. 





#### SIXTY AEROPLANES IN FLOCK

Forest Must Have Been Spectacular in the Extreme.

A thrilling account is given in the French paper, Liberte, of a recent allied raid with sixty aeroplanes ness. apon the forest of Houlthulst, which is situated about half way between Dixmude and Ypres.

The forest is practically sheltered from the effects of allied artillery, and it has been converted into a regular garrison district with barracks full of troops and munitions depots and the whole camp illuminated with electric light.

Through air photographs the situation of the main military buildings was located exactly, and at 10 p. m. aeroplanes started out in clear moonlight. Immediately the aeroplanes appeared there was great excitement guished and anti-aircraft guns came with relatives at San Angelo. into action, but the airmen, greatly assisted by the moonlight, dropped four tons of high explosives and in-

Some of the aircraft returned to refill with shells no fewer than three times in the course of the night.


