#### CHARGE IS DISMISSED

NATH COOPER EASILY ESTABLISHES AN ALIBI.

Dallas Authorities Acknowledge Their Error and Pay Exhonorated Man's Return Fare.

Attorney Sam McCollum returned Friday morning from Dallas, where he went earlier in the week in the interest of Nath Cooper, who was arrested here Tuesday on a charge of having killed Jim Gibbs in Dallas on the night of December 6th. When asked regarding the case, Mr. McCollum stated that the charges were dismissed against his client shortly after arrival in Dallas, when witnesses who were supposed to be able to identify the man last seen with Gibbs, stated that Cooper was not the man wanted. He was released immediately, and his many Brady friends are congratulating him upon his being able to prove his innocence of any knowledge of the crime so easily.

The Dallas News contains the following account of Mr. Cooper's exoneration on the charge which had been preferred against him:

"Following a visit to the county attorney's office yesterday by Captain of Police Henry Tanner, County Attorney M. T. Lively ordered the dismissal of the charge that had been filed on affidavit of Detective Tanner against Nate Cooper, charging him with killing Jim Gibbs on Dec. 7.

"Mr. Cooper, who was arrested at Brady, accompanied Mr. Tanner to Dallas and it was then shown to the satisfaction of the officers that he had not been the man who was with Gibbs before his death. He established a complete alibi. The city will pay his fare back to Brady.

"I was never in Dallas before. I know nothing about the murder, and I can prove my whereabouts without any trouble. I knew Gibbs only by sight," Cooper said after being taken to the office of Captain Tanner.

"The charge filed was made on circumstantial evidence gathered by the department. The officers admit their biggest asset was the description of a man who was seen drinking with Gibbs during the afternoon be-

fore he was killed. This man was described as being six feet, seven inches tall, dressed in a dark suit and wearing an extra large pair of shoes.

"Cooper is slightly over six

feet tall, but his shoes are not extra large. He laughed and joked with his attorney and a friend, who also came from Brady and he did not appear to be worried over his arrest."
