### DISTRICT COURT.

#### E. O. Tindel Receives Three Year Sentence on Seduction Charge.

The case of E. O. Tindel, charged with seduction, occupied the court on Tuesday and Wednesday, the case going to the jury late Wednesday afternoon. A verdict of guilty was returned by the jury Thursday morning, and punishment was assessed at three years in the penitentiary. Tindel has given notice of appeal.

Jim Stepany, colored, charged with theft, entered a plea of guilty, and was given two years in the penitentiary, with suspended sentence.

The grand jury completed its labors today, and adjourned for the term.

Dr. Felix Mendel of Essen, Germany, has satisfactorily demonstrated to the medical fraternity of that country that one of the most effectual remedies for wounds is found in a powder consisting of a mixture of 10 parts of bicarbonate of soda, 9 parts acetic acid (vinegar), and 19 parts sugar. Superficial wounds are covered with a thick layer of the powder, but deeper wounds are completely filled with it. As soon as the mixture is placed on the raw sore carbon dioxide is liberated and this causes a constant flow of the fluid from the wound. Inflammation is quickly checked by using this fluid.—Houston Post.

It may be said that the law firm of Woodward & Baker has enjoyed an enviable practice and is generally recognized as one of the foremost law firms of West Texas."

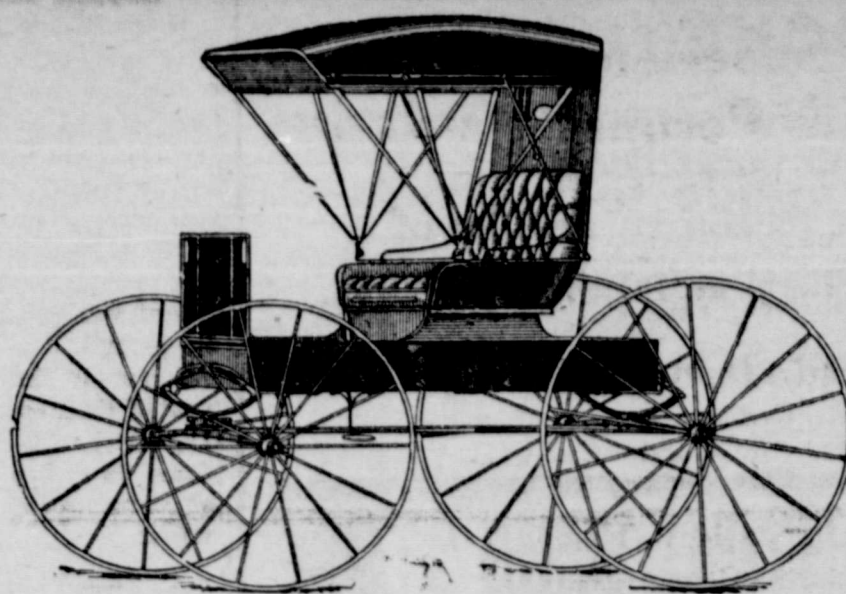

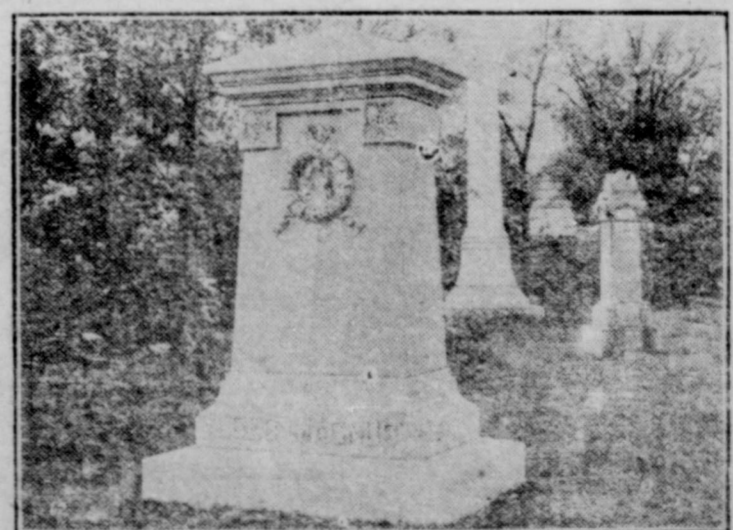

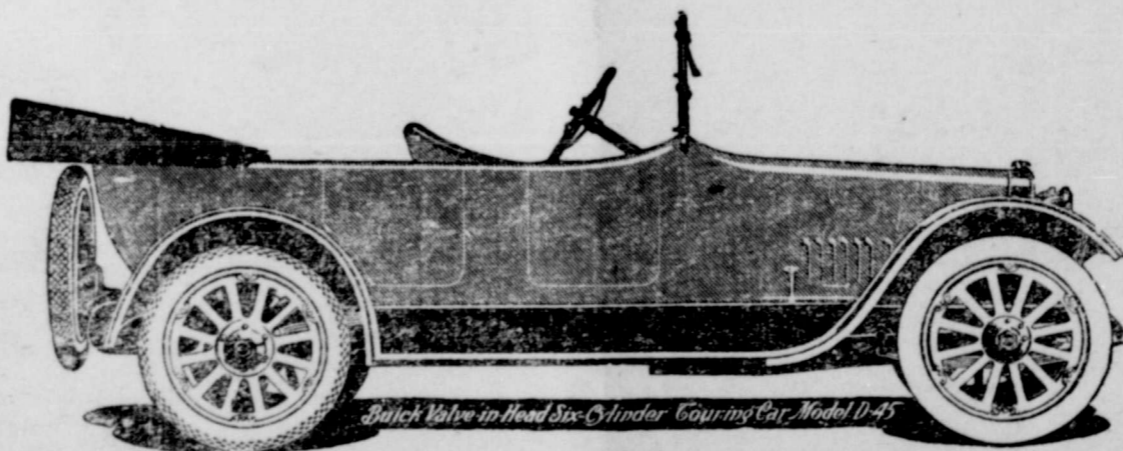

### Visit Turner Well.

Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Savage, Miss Harriet Cook and Mr. Jeff Meers motored last Friday in the Savage car to the Turner & Henderson well on the Polk lease, 4½ miles southeast of Santa Anna, to inspect the newest oil well in this vicinity, and which has aroused the greatest of interest locally. At the time of the visit the well was capped, and there was little to be learned about it, except that it was proving the magnet for innumerable visitors. On the Sunday previous 108 auto loads of visitors were sightseeing there, and the average number of cars visiting the well was said to be between 40 and 50.

Mr. Meers, in company with Broady Ogden, made a second visit to the well Monday, and reported the drillers busily engaged in reaming out the well with a rotary drill. When the well was first uncapped for the rotary, the accumulated gas spouted oil to the top of the derrick. The well is down 1550 feet, and is only a few feet in the oil sands. Within the next few days operations with the rotary should have progressed to such

extent as to give definite information as to the possibilities of the well.

There are oil men by the score in that locality, watching operations with keenest anticipation, and land for several miles around has been leased.
