

TRAGIC DEATH SUNDAY

GORDON MAYSE ACCIDENT-
ALLY SHOOTS SELF.

Dies Within 35 Minutes Without Having Regained Consciousness—Funeral Yesterday.

Gordon, the 13-year-old son of J. S. Mayse, met a tragic death Sunday evening through accidentally shooting himself. The accident happened about ten minutes before 8:00 o'clock p. m. Gordon, with his cousin, was in the vicinity of his home in North Brady, the lads trying to shoot rats with a .22 target rifle loaded with shot shells. A cartridge became hung in the gun, and in an effort to extract it the gun was discharged by young Mayse, the charge of fine shot striking him in the left temple. Although medical aid was at once summoned nothing could be done, and within 35 minutes the unfortunate youth had breathed his last without ever regaining consciousness.

Funeral services were held from the family home yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, Rev. J. M. Reynolds conducting, and interment was had in Brady cemetery. The funeral was largely attended, the many friends of the family, as well as scores of schoolmates of the youth, attesting his popularity and the sympathy for the bereaved father, brothers and sister.

Gordon Mayse was a bright young boy and a favorite with his playmates at Brady school, where he had been attending. He was of a happy, good natured disposition, and his untimely fate brings sadness to his many companions and to the friends of the family as well.

Destitute Mexicans.

The three Mexicans, two men and a woman, who were arrested here last week charged with robbing and burning John Garms' store at Lightner, were taken to Paint Rock and placed in jail. One of the Mexicans arrested was the sole support of a wife, a mother and a sister, who are in destitute circumstances, being without food of any kind, and no money. One of the women is old, another is sick, while the third is a young girl. A 10-year-old girl left behind when they took her mother to prison, was taken in charge yesterday by Abram Garcia, who will give her a temporary home.

These poor Mexicans need food and immediate attention until their countrymen can be induced to care for them. Other Mexicans in this community seem to want to stay away from the camp occupied by these women, perhaps fearing they may be suspected of complicity in the Lightner robbery.—Melvin Advocate.

DRESS UP NEXT.

With Easter coming so late this year, spring will be far advanced long before it comes time for Easter apparel. Hence Dress Up weeks, March 27th to April 8th, have been named, and will be universally observed throughout the United States as the period of donning spring finery. Merchants everywhere are co-operating in the Dress Up idea by directing attention to their offerings appropriate to such an occasion, and no one should fail to observe the period.

And in dressing up, it is well to remember that the idea goes further than merely adorning one's self or arraying one's self in finery. Dress up should include clean up, paint up, screen up and home adornment of every kind as well. The whole idea revolves around the home beautiful, the city beautiful and the community beautiful. No one can be or long remain beautiful or attractive amidst unsightly surroundings.

Let everyone help make Brady the most attractive of cities. Then will "Dress Up" week become of fullest significance.

A special charter and the commission form of government would be a great help in the growth of Brady cityward.

Candidates for city offices should have their applications for place upon the official ballot in the hands of Mayor Pro Tem H. P. Roddie not later than Saturday of this week, to assure the printing of the name upon the ballot. Ten days before the election is the specified time for such action.

The citizens of Ballinger are again to vote to determine whether or not the city shall adopt the commission form of government, the election having been ordered by the mayor of that city. A year ago the question was submitted and was defeated. Since then a campaign of education has been undertaken and it is thought the decision will be reversed at the coming election. The change from the old form of government to the commission form is taking a big stumbling block out of the path of progress of a community.

The coming city election promises to be the quietest in years. So far no one has offered for the positions of aldermen, to which office two are to be elected, and it is to be hoped that Messrs. N. T. Cook and L. A. Williams, whose terms are about to expire, will allow their names to be placed on the ballot for re-election. Both have been faithful officers, and have given material aid in advancing the city's interests; their accomplishment being all the more remarkable in view of the limited finances with which they were obliged to work.

Moberly, Missouri, a town of 12,000 inhabitants, has enacted "blue laws" which prohibit the sale of anything except pills during the time between midnight Saturday and Monday morning. Enforcement of the Sunday ordinance caused the arrest soon after midnight Saturday of the editors of Moberly's three daily newspapers and two newsboys who were delivering St. Louis dailies. Taxicabs paraded the streets Sunday, but were not allowed to carry passengers. The Lord should gather Moberly and its ruling citizens to His bosom—they are too good to suffer contamination at the hands of a lost and ruined world.—Dublin Progress.

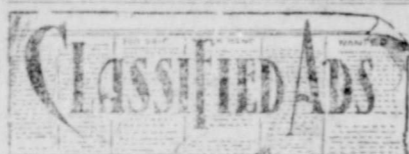

TO ERECT NEW GIN.

Calf Creek Citizens to Have a Modern Plant.

Calf Creek citizens are delighted over the assurance of a thoroughly modern gin for that community, and work is to begin on the plant in the near future. The new gin will be erected by J. S. Thompson of Grit, and will be located in the old part of town about a mile south of the present post office.

Mr. Thompson has already begun the erection of a dwelling for himself and will have it ready for occupancy within a week or two. A big tank for the new gin was completed last Friday, and work will begin on the gin plant as soon as material is at hand.

The gin plant will be of the Murray manufacture, with four 70-saws and will be one of the newest and most approved approved patterns. The estimated cost is placed at \$6,000. The old gin was not operated last year and Calf Creek residents were obliged to haul their cotton to Brady for ginning, consequently they have more than ordinary interest in the erection of the new plant.

Election Proclamation.

Brady, Texas, Feb. 29, 1916. By the authority vested in me by Article 1099 of the Civil Ordinances of the City of Brady, Texas, an election is hereby ordered to be held on the first Tuesday in April, 1916, being the 4th day of said month, for the purpose of electing a Mayor, City Marshal, two (2) Aldermen, City Attorney, City Recorder and City Secretary for the City of Brady, Texas, who shall hold their office for a term of two years, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Said election shall be held in the northwest corner room of the first floor of the court house.

J. M. Duke, the regularly appointed presiding officer, shall hold said election and shall appoint two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

The election will be held in accordance with the general laws of the State of Texas and in accordance with the Ordinances of the City of Brady, Texas.

SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE.

Scholastics for 1916 Outnumber Those of 1915 by 88.

According to figures compiled by Miss Loise Bradley, tax assessor and collector for Brady Independent School District No. 1, the increase of scholastics enrolled for 1916 show an increase of 88 over the enrollment for last year, a net gain of a fraction over 14 per cent.

The increase shown is very gratifying, not only to Miss Bradley herself, but to the school board and the entire citizenship at large, and is material evidence of the fact that the population of the city and the district is on the increase.

Last year the total number of scholastics was 624, as compared with 712 for the present year.

The time limit for making transfers and the enrollment of scholastics expires April 1st, and it is quite likely that the above figures will be slightly increased before that date.
