Teresa's. Homemade German sausage will be featured, along with the pancakes, Mrs. Brito said.






MRS. BOB FILLPOT

Parmer County has undergone many changes since a rancher and his wife moved here from Kansas City back around 1908, but one of their descendants is always good for a tasty recipe.

Mrs. Bob Fillpot, known to almost everyone as Judy, is adept at culinary arts in her kitchen, or over a campfire on a fishing trip. Perhaps she inherited some of her skill from the F. O. Jersigs who learned the hard way when they came here and established the 60 Ranch 10 miles northwest of Bovina.

Dr. Bill Thomas, Extension | 4-H Foods --Service swine specialist. from College Station, first speaker, stated "the initiation of a hog enterprise can be justified by one of the following conditions (1) marketing home-grown grain through hogs (2) utilizing labor more efficiently and (3) substituting swine production for an unprofitable farm enterprise."

Dr. Thomas presented a discussion on factors to consider when going into the hog business. One factor to consider is adequate financing. This is absolutely necessary due to the lack of income for at least six months after initiating a new hog enterprise, according to Dr. Thomas.

Type of operation was another factor Dr. Thomas discussed. Alternatives are many and some of the common types are as follows (1) purebred production (2) feeder pig production (3) finishing pig production and (4) complete farrow through finishing.
