The teachers called all the missing pupils into school Wednesday for the purpose of having their pictures taken.

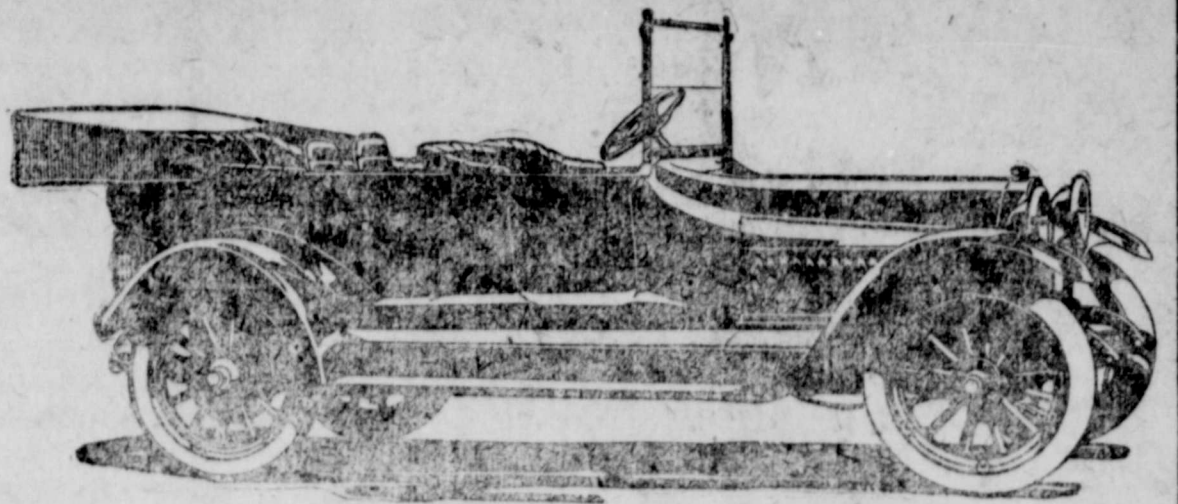

The Commercial National bank

complete instrument. The new
gauge not only records the rain-
fall, but has a thermometer in
connection and also a barometer
of more than ordinary merit.

Our friend, M. A. Leddy of
the Voca community made us
an appreciated call on Monday.
Friend Leddy is greatly inter-
ested in the raising of fine pork-
ers, and his success with a bunch
bought by him last fall has en-
couraged him to still greater
endeavors.

D. H. Henderson was here
from the Lost Creek commu-
nity Tuesday and reported a
light rain and quite a bit of hail
throughout that locality Sunday
evening. While no rain was had
near Brady, it was evident that
rain of some sort was had not
far off, the wind being heavy
with moisture.

Messrs. W. C. Clayton and H.
E. Anderson were in from Route
1 out of Rochelle Tuesday
and both are going to try to get
along with The Standard an-
other year, rather than without
it. They report everything do-
ing well enough in their commu-
nity, except that a good rain
would be appreciated.

Bud Crawford, sage of Pashe,
was here Monday and reported
having lost two fine Jersey 2-
year-old heifers with blackleg,
valued at \$75 each. He also re-
ported it very dry in his commu-
nity, although oats are still very
much alive. In spite of these
discouraging facts, Mr. Craw-
ford retains his usual happy de-
meanor, and never fails to look
on the bright side of things.

The Bartlett well on the west
side of town has struck water.
It will have to be cased off to
go ahead with the drilling. The
water was struck at a depth of
about 1000 feet. It is strong,
black gyp water. There was also
struck a stratum of peculiar
formation, a rock that is like
islinglass or mica. It is brought
up in pieces about an inch thick.
It is free of grit. While there
has been no end of trouble in
drilling this well, yet the drill-
ers and prospectors are using
patience and are going on with
the test. A hole at least 3,000
feet will be sunk if oil is not
struck at a less depth.—Paint
Rock Herald.

C. B. Whitehead, one of the
live citizens of the Calf Creek
community paid us an appreci-
ated call Saturday, and stated
that he had just been over his
oats and wheat patches and
found both looking fine, with
prospects that they would stand
until up in April even with no
rain. Mr. Whitehead has 40
acres of oats and 15 acres of
wheat. Even at that, he is not
worried over his feed problem,
for he has a granary full of
oats. He has just sold 250 bush-
els of oats, and has 800 bush-
els left, which, he figures, will
carry him over another year.

ago quit planting so much cotton
and practiced raising his living

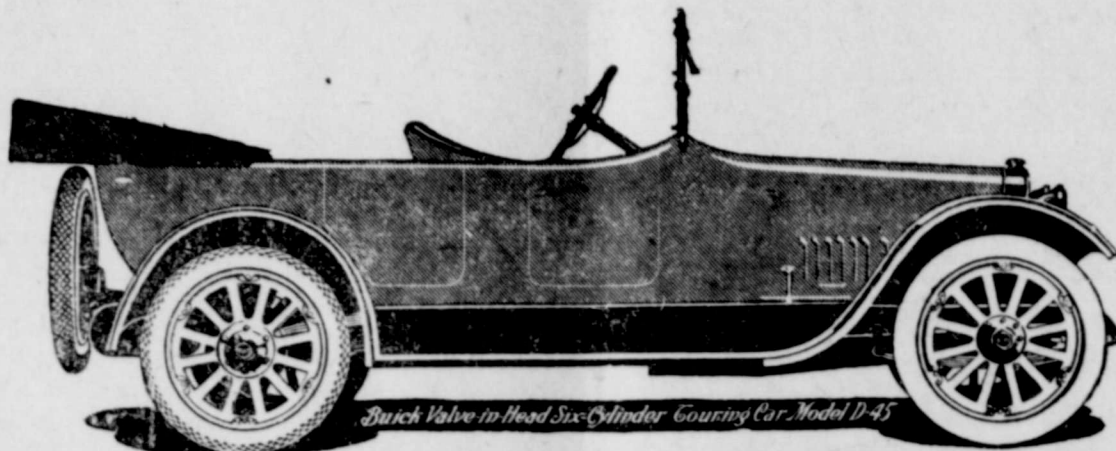

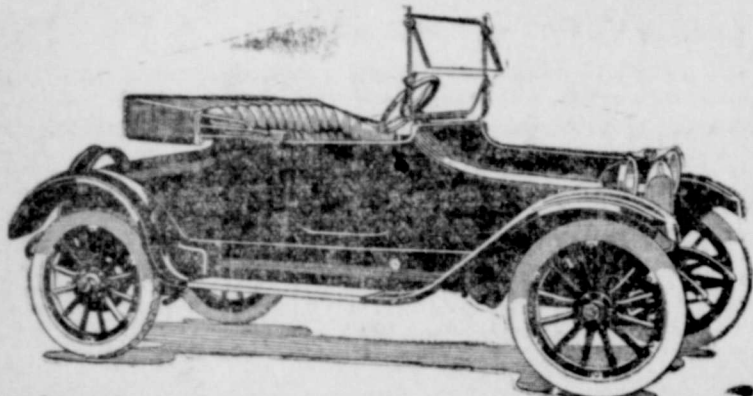

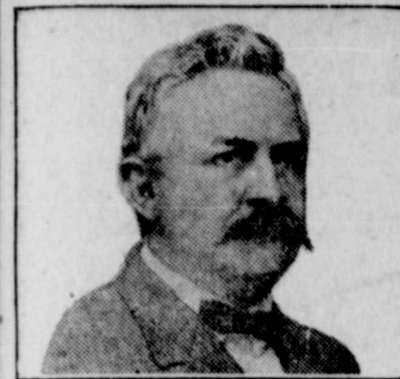
Baptist Meeting.
