### BUYS SUTTON CO. LAND

R. A. KING ACQUIRES BIG HOLDINGS LAST WEEK.

Melton & Co. Close Deal Aggregating \$41,600—Ranch Comprises 8,320 Acre Tract.

Melton & Co. last week closed the deal for 8,320 acres in Sutton county, R. A. King of this city purchasing the property of Judge Taylor of San Antonio. The price paid was \$5.00 per acre, the deal aggregating \$41,600, which makes it one of the largest, if not the largest deal, pulled off in Brady in some time.

The ranch comprises thirteen sections, and is a most desirable piece of ranch property, being well improved, and being fenced wolf-proof. Mr. King expects to stock the ranch with cattle, sheep and goats, and he and his family expect to move to their newly-acquired property about the first of June.

The news of their removal from the city will prove a source of regret to all Brady citizens, they being one of the most prominent, as well as highly esteemed in the city, and Mrs. King being one of the leaders in church and club work. Mr. King has been retired for a number of years, but is quite enthusiastic over once more getting into the harness and is anxiously looking forward to beginning work on the ranch. He still retains his property interests in Brady, and their friends trust this will serve to bring them back again at some future time.

Another big ranch deal reported by Melton & Co. is that of 10 3/4 sections out of the Comfort ranch, Matthew Capps of Voca being the purchaser. The Comfort ranch was recently bought by G. R. White from the McCulloch County Land & Cattle Co., the deal being closed by Melton & Co., and Capps, in turn purchased part of the ranch from Mr. White. The deal comprises 6,680 acres of splendid ranch property, and the price paid was \$7.50 per acre, aggregating \$51,600. Mr. Capps will stock the ranch.

## INCENDIARY FIRE.

### Destroys Blacksmith Shop and Equipment at Placid.

Sheriff Wall was notified by phone about 4:00 o'clock Monday morning of a fire at Placid which pointed strongly towards incendiary circumstances. Mr. Wall, in company with Deputy John Martin, hastened to the scene where the officers made a close investigation of the occurrence.

The fire was discovered about 3:00 o'clock by J. W. Turnell, who was sitting up with a sick child near by the blacksmith shop, where the fire originated. Neighbors hastened to the scene, but nothing could be done towards saving the building or contents. That the fire was of incendiary origin was indicated by the fact that a ring of fire encircled the entire building, and a kerosene can was discovered among the ruins, although the blacksmith kept no oil about the place. Owing to the confusion following the fire, and the fact that all footprints were obliterated by those who gathered at the scene, no clue was developed by the officers.

The blacksmith shop was conducted by a man named Jones, who had leased the property from a widow now residing in San Angelo. The building with all the contents, including about \$150 worth of new material, was destroyed, the total loss being placed at \$550. No insurance was carried upon either the building or the contents.

## PAINT ROCK WELL.

### Reaches Depth of 1130 Feet—Four Derricks at Santa Anna.

G. F. Barlett, who has charge of the drilling of the oil well for Tom Slick at Paint Rock, yesterday phoned local parties that they had reached a depth of 1130 feet. The crook in the well caused by shelving rock or a protruding boulder has been overcome, the obstacle having been removed by blasting out with dynamite.

Mr. Barlett also advised that four derricks had been erected in the Santa Anna field. However, no operations there are possible at present because of the scarcity of water. Until water can be provided, or until it rains, drilling will, of a necessity, have to be suspended. For a like reason, the well recently brought in near Santa Anna is not being pumped.

## MURDER CHARGED.

### Willie Mayse, Aged 14, Arrested for Death of Gordon Mayse.

Willie, the 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Mayse, was arrested Saturday at Brownwood upon complaint of his grandfather, J. S. Mayse, and charged with the murder of the lad's uncle, Gordon Mayse, aged 13.

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Mayse, parents of the boy, last week removed to Brownwood, where Mr. Mayse is following his profession of blacksmith, and the boy last Friday left for that place to join his parents. In charge of Deputy Sheriff Hodges of Brownwood, and accompanied by his father, the lad was brought to Brady Sunday, and formally charged with the murder. He was later released upon \$500 bond.

The charge grew out of the death on Sunday evening, March 19th, of Gordon Mayse from a target wound in the left temple. At the time the death was ascribed to accidental causes, and the gun was alleged to have been in the hands of the victim himself. Because of discrepancies in the stories told by Willie Mayse, who was with Gordon Mayse, his uncle, at the time of the accident, an investigator was undertaken by the local officers. It was observed that the charge of fine shot had not penetrated the temple at an angle, as would most likely have been the case in an accident, but indicated that the gun had been held in a horizontal position.

Willie Mayse finally admitted that he had fired the gun, but claimed it was only in fun, and that the two boys had proposed to "shoot one another."

The examining trial of Willie Mayse has been set for Friday.

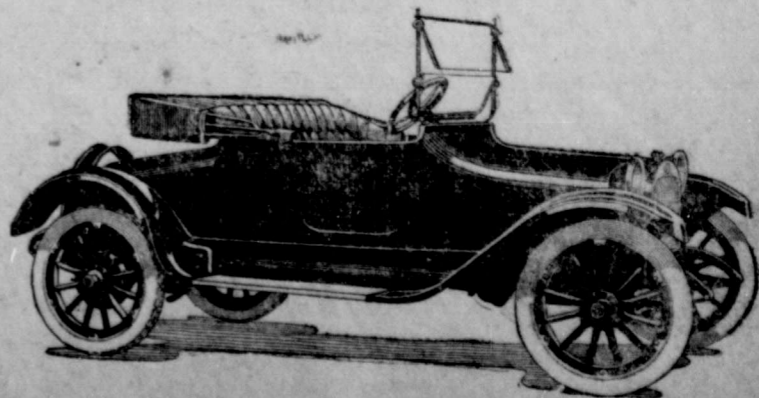
