11,000,000 BALES GINNED.

Final Report Issued by Government Census Bureau.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—The final cotton ginning report of the census bureau issued today shows 11,059,430 running bales, or 11,183,182 equivalent 500-pound bales of cotton, exclusive of linters, were ginned from the 1915 crop. These figures are recorded as the official statistics of production for the crop. Included in the figures are 39,623 bales which ginner's estimate would be turned out after the March canvass.

Ginnings by states in equivalent 500-pound bales: Alabama, 1,020,208; Arkansas, 815,846; Florida, 47,816; Georgia, 1,907,310; Louisiana, 340,606; Mississippi, 953,620; Missouri, 47,930; North Carolina, 698,852; Oklahoma, 639,209; South Carolina, 1-133,581; Tennessee, 302,898; Texas, 3,223,803; Virginia, 15,809; all other states, 35,694.

Make Good Records.

W. M. Swift, chief clerk of the railway mail service department of the United States, was here Tuesday and examined the clerks at the local postoffice, all of whom made exceptional records for efficiency and accuracy.

Out of a total of 926 cards, O. B. Westbrook handled 925 correctly in 37 minutes time, grading 99.90 per cent. Ras Spiller and Otto Armstrong each handled 920 cards out of 926 correctly in 39 minutes time, grading 99.35 per cent. In the knowledge of connections Westbrook answered the full 78 questions asked correctly, while Armstrong answered 77 correctly out of the 78.

The nearly perfect scores made by the postoffice employees were favorably commented upon by the inspector, and is indicative of the high degree of efficiency maintained in the local postoffice department.

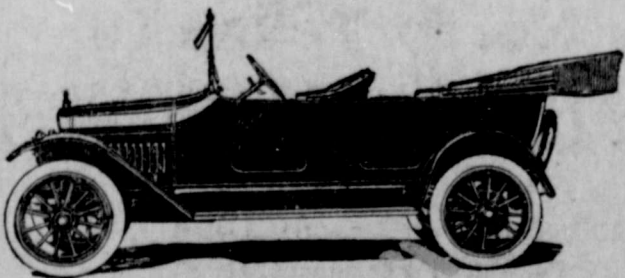



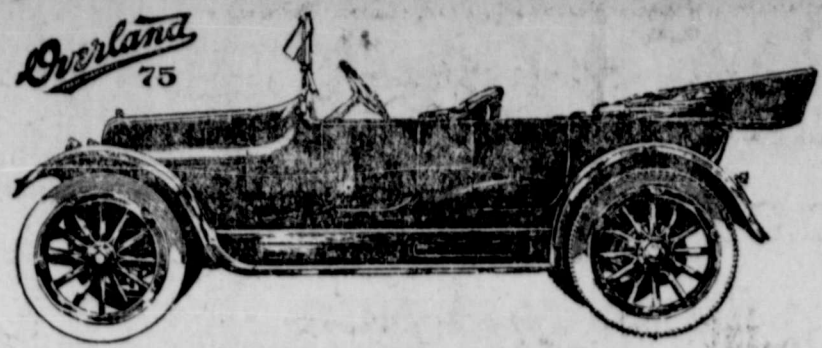

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY.

Reception Given Ladies of Various Churches Notable Event.

The reception given the ladies of the various churches of Brady by the Missionary Society of the Methodist church Wednesday was a very enjoyable affair, a splendid program being rendered. Each paper gave vivid pictures of their phase of the work, and that you may, in a measure, realize the vast field of endeavor this work covers, the request was made that our papers be given copies of these to be published. It is too late to get them in this week's issue, so we have given a brief review of the program. The papers will be printed later.

After scripture reading by Rev. Bailey and prayer by Rev. Grant, Mrs. Joe White welcomed the ladies in behalf of the Missionary Society, her message carrying a heart throb of love to every lady and a feeling of good cheer to all.

Rev. I. T. Morris gave a brief resume of woman's work along missionary lines, showing again so truly that wherever man is found carrying the message of the cross, woman, with her sweet ministry of love, is filling in and sealing by numerous acts of devotion, as only a woman can, the story of Jesus' love to those around her. Mrs. L. A. Williams and Mrs. J. T. Mann told of the work our young people are doing, Mrs. Williams telling how they were being trained in the local work--giving out over this section of the country, enlisting the young people of other churches to become more

efficient in the Master's service, pointing out the great inspiration a band of trained workers would be, working for the advancement of Christ's cause. Mrs. Mann reviewed the work of reaching out from the local church to places at home and abroad, showing so clearly how acts of love and service done here in the home land will widen and grow on and on until they reach those in the foreign lands.

In telling of "How We Should Train Our Children for Missionary Service," Mrs. S. W. Hughes pointed out the great importance of our first getting a vision of the great opportunity we have in molding these young lives for eternity; then preparing ourselves to rightly teach and wisely lead that we may leave upon these young lives the imprint of the Master's.

Miss Minna Elliot and Mrs. S. W. Hughes sang as a duet, "Somebody Knows 'Tis Jesus." Mrs. J. A. Snider vividly pictured the seriousness and importance of wisely dealing with our boys and girls during the adolescent period--the period when youth retires within itself, so to speak, as a flower with petals closely folded, securely locking the sweet fragrance and beauty of the unfolded flower to our vision. But we should let nature teach us here. She sends the warm sun rays, the life-giving rain drops and waits for the gradual unfolding when the flower bursts into bloom, charming every beholder. If we will only tenderly watch and wait with our youth at this period, letting our love warm their hearts and the tear drops of understanding nurture them ten-

derly until, having won their confidence, the life unfolds to bless and brighten our pathway. Miss Harriet Cook told of the great need of Social Service workers.

The meeting was adjourned for the noon hour. Lunch was served in the church, this social hour being one of the most enjoyable of the day.

The afternoon session was opened with a song, after which several talks were made by members of the North Side Bible class, showing the great blessings that come to those who study God's word.

Mrs. W. J. Yantis spoke of the needs of our realizing our obligations in "Christian Stewardship."

Rev. Power gave a very concise statement showing how we are just pretending to fulfill our obligations in this line, no church averaging giving as much as even a nickel a day per member to the church work; emphasizing the fact that God has given us all we have merely as a trust to be used for Him. Be that gift a talent for speech, song, making of money or whatever it may be 'tis not ours to use for selfish purposes. We must all render an account of our stewardship.

Mrs. W. N. White gave a very instructive talk on "Education in Foreign Lands," showing how the full-rounded education could be none other than a Christian education.

Mrs. T. P. Grant, in telling of "Medical Missions" only proved that the Divine Healer often won the heart of the sinner by first healing the sick body, and that we can often succeed here,

where otherwise we must fail.

In dealing with the immigrant question, Mrs. Dave Camp so clearly showed how we had such a great opportunity of winning these foreigners to Jesus by reaching the thousands who come to our shores, but who now, because of the awful war, are going back to the home land. Have we been true to the trust? Mrs. Bert Stobaugh gave a brief review of the work done by the mountain schools. This is where some of our greatest work is being done, for from these schools have come some of our great Christian workers.

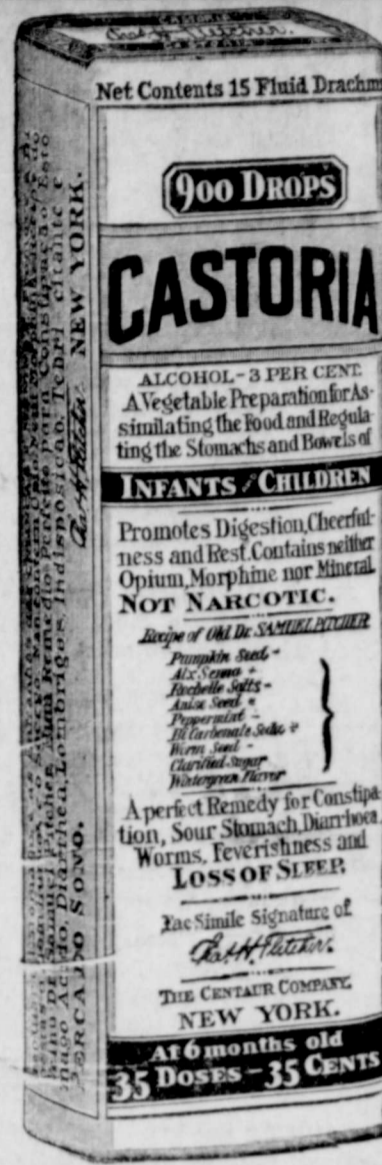

expects to have between 300 and 400 chickens this year, and in addition some 50 or 75 turkeys—all of which represent future income, instead of outgo. Mr. Bolding reported a very nice shower in the Lohn community, the moisture being sufficient to sprout feterita, with which he planted eleven acres last Friday.

Friend A. F. McCoy of the Nine community made us an interesting call Wednesday and reported practically everyone in his community done with work until it rains. While oats and wheat are still looking fairly good, a close examination shows but a few spears put forth, and according to Mr. McCoy a good rain soon must be had to make them worth saving. Mr. McCoy frankly admits that he has made nineteen crops in McCulloch county and has made sixteen failures on corn. He has come to the conclusion that it is of no avail to plant corn too early, for the reason that it is apt to be killed by a late frost; and again, it is liable to be parched by the hot winds in July just when it is beginning to tassle. He expects to wait for a rain before planting, and said that while he planted later last year than most of his neighbors, he made

better corn. He believes in deep breaking, but shallow cultivating, and says keeping the cracks filled with a dust mulch is all the cultivating that should be done during the dry, hot months. He also points to the fact that late planted cotton is not as liable to the boll weevil as is early variety. However, he admits there is no hard and fast rule for farming in this country, because of the varied conditions which confront the farmer in

successing seasons, and each man's experience during a course of several years is his best guide as to methods.
