BUILD 3-STORY VAULT

COMMERCIAL NATL. MAKING IMPROVEMENTS.

New Vault to Be Complete in Every Detail—Additional Accommodations Given.

Contractor Chas. Horn last Friday began the excavation of the basement for the Commercial National bank, which is the first step in a series of improvements that is to transform this building and bank into one of the most up-to-date and well-equipped of any bank west of Fort Worth.

The improvements include the placing of a basement 40x40 feet under the rear of the building; the installation of a furnace and heating equipment; a three-story vault; directors' room; customers' room, and the entire remodeling and refurnishing of the banking quarters. Incidentally the old vault will be torn away to give additional space.

The changes to be made have been contemplated for the past year or so, but the work was delayed from time to time, until at the approach of winter it was decided to await the coming of spring. The wonderful increase in business during the past few years has made the present banking offices entirely too cramped. At various periods these quarters have been extended, but the big vault in the middle of the building proved an obstacle to the proper enlargement, and its removal became a necessity. Also the big vault has proven entirely inadequate to the demands made upon it, and likewise the burglar-proof safe no longer meets requirements.

As before stated, the improvements will convert the Commercial National into one of the most approved bank buildings in West Texas. Every detail for accommodation and efficiency has been worked out.

The new vault will be of three-story design, the first story being located in the basement and being devoted to the storage of books and records of the bank. It will be of massive construction, 12x24 feet outside measurement, and 10x20 feet inside. The second story will be located on the ground floor, and will be used by the bank proper for the safe-keeping of the current ledgers, books, currency and coin of the bank. The present burglar-proof safe will be supplemented by another in order to fully meet every requirement for safety, both of the present moment and for the future. Adjoining the vault will be a commodious directors' room which will be furnished in most approved style and be designed with special care for the use and convenience of the bank officers. To give ample space for this room the present partition in the rear of the bank will be moved some four or more feet forward, thus enlarging these quarters to a considerable degree.

The third story of the vault will be devoted entirely to the use and for the accommodation of customers of the bank. It will be equipped in most approved style with customers' safety boxes and equipment designed for especial use of the customers. Adjoining, and extending as a balcony over the

NEW MASONIC TEMPLE.

Loan Subscription Totaling \$10,000 Assures Erection.

Mr. J. H. White, who has had charge of the solicitation of subscription from among members of the Masonic fraternity to the loan for the building of the new Masonic temple in Brady, reports the fund nearly subscribed in full. But a few hundred dollars are lacking of the desired total, \$10,000, and these amounts will be secured, it is thought, without difficulty from among those members from whom nothing has so far been reported. The amount subscribed, together with the \$2,000 now in the lodge treasury, will be ample to cover the modern, three-story building under contemplation.

At the next regular meeting night of Brady Lodge A. F. & A. M., on Thursday of this week, the plans for the new building will come up for discussion and, without doubt, decisive action will be taken as regards the erection.

Credit for the raising of the loan fund of \$10,000 is due largely to the energy and persistency of Mr. White, chairman of the building committee, who with untiring zeal and uniform courtesy, aroused the greatest enthusiasm for the project among the members. In this he was aided by other members of the lodge, who likewise share in the enthusiasm for the good work.

RAID CREAMERY.

Valuable Fittings Removed Evidently by Junk Gatherers.

The creamery plant belonging to Henry Miller and located just across the Brady bridge on the Coleman road, was the object of a raid upon the part of some vandals, and a number of parts of the machinery were carried off, evidently for the brass contained in them. The discovery of the theft was made by a son of Mr. Miller last week upon a visit to the plant.

Not only were the oilers and other small objects made of brass taken, but two larger pieces, valued at \$50 each, were likewise removed. The thieves even went so far as to remove the head from the engine in order to strip the brass from the interior. The pump on the well was also taken apart for the brass pieces.

The brass secured, at junk prices, will at most total only a few paltry dollars, but to Mr. Miller the loss represents a matter of a couple of hundred dollars. Consequently he is very much aroused over the affair, and is willing to pay liberally for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties.

The creamery is not in operation at present, consequently the theft was not discovered for several days after it had occurred.

RAIN---MILLIONS IN IT

BOUNTIFUL DOWNPOUR REPORTED OVER COUNTY.

From One and One-Half to Five Inches Rainfall—McCulloch County in Splendid Shape.

The McCulloch country is in splendid shape, so far as season and moisture is concerned, following the opportune rain which fell all during Friday night, and part of Saturday. The rain was general, covering all portions of the state from East Texas to the western border, according to press reports. In McCulloch county it could not have been surpassed. Every community reports a splendid rain, the reports varying from 1½ inches at Brady, where the rain was probably the lightest, to three and five inches in the northern and western portions of the county, which seem to have had the heaviest downpour. Three inches of rain is reported at Melvin, and a five inch rain is reported from the Waldrip community. Good showers were had in addition a day or two previous in the south part of the county.

Not only did the rain fall so as to completely saturate the earth, but tanks everywhere are reported full and running over. Brady dam was likewise filled to overflowing, the creek still running Monday.

The benefits of the rain are inestimable. Oats everywhere were beginning to suffer, and many had begun plowing their oats up. What remains, however, is said to be looking fine, and has come out wonderfully in the past couple of days. Farmers were never better up with their work than just prior to the rain, and farms everywhere were in readiness for the moisture. From now on there will be busy times with the farmer, and those who have not already put in their corn will utilize every day for completing this part of the work. Incidentally the season will be ample for cotton planting.

Still another benefit of the rain was the stock water put out, besides which the rise in the creek cleared out the drift and accumulated trash.

McCulloch county and her citizens are dressed up for spring.
