

BLACKLEG-CHARBON.

Veterinarian to Deliver Free Lecture—Farmers Invited.

Local druggists are in receipt of a letter from Mr. Chrisman, traveling representative of the H. K. Mulford Co., announcing the coming of Dr. H. F. Palmer, chief veterinarian for that company. Dr. Palmer will deliver a lecture in Brady on Friday, April 21st, upon the subject of Blackleg and Charbon, and will also be glad to answer any questions upon diseases of this and like nature, as well as to give information of benefit to farmers and stockmen. Dr. Palmer has a state-wide reputation as an authority upon the treatment and cure of these diseases, and his lecture will be well worth the hearing.

There will be no charge attached to these lectures, and every stockman and farmer in McCulloch and surrounding territory is invited to come to Brady upon the 21st and hear Dr. Palmer.

"Possibly he will deliver a lecture on Blackleg and Charbon, but at any rate I want you to have as many stockmen as possible in town that day to meet the doctor and ask him any questions they may wish to have information on."

Heads the List.

L. E. Laurence returned Saturday from Texarkana, where he took examination for admittance to the bar before the Court of Civil Appeals. Among the list of fourteen taking the examination, were two 3-year students of State university, and one graduate of the University of New York.

Mr. Laurence's many friends are congratulating him upon the excellence of his record, and predict a successful future for him. He expects to locate in San Angelo this fall, where he will hang out his shingle and practice his chosen profession.

KAOLIN DEPOSITS.

J. D. Benson Has Vast Field of Pottery Clay.

J. D. Benson, who lives north of town, has a vast kaolin field on his farm, the exact extent of which is unknown, but which has been roughly estimated as containing 1,000,000 cubic yards of kaolin. Mr. Benson has known of the field for some time, and recently made experiments as to its extent. A hole drilled with a post hole auger about half a mile from the known body disclosed still more kaolin, and another hole about half a mile distant in another direction, also brought like results.

Upon taking the matter up with the Department of the Interior of the United States Geological Survey, Mr. Benson was informed that kaolin has a commercial value, such value being dependent upon the quality of the kaolin and its location with reference to transportation and marketing facilities.

Mr. Benson has sent several samples to dealers in pottery clay and is now awaiting their analysis. The kaolin found on Mr. Benson's place is said to be of very fine quality, and there is a likelihood of a new industry being developed should the analysis prove the kaolin to be all that has been contended.

THE PUBLIC SQUARE.

"The mountain labored, and
brought forth a mouse." In
other words, "Much ado about
nothing."

In his article last Friday,
"Voter" took the position that
Brady's square is all that it
should be; that any change
would be at the expense of the
farmers. All of which convicts
him, not only of being altogether
unobservant, but in addition a
careless reader of The Standard.

The Standard has heretofore
reported the position of the
Brady city council. They are
willing to provide a market
square located convenient to the
business section. They will pro-
vide hitch racks, watering
troughs and such other conveni-
ences as may be suited to or de-
sirable for the folks who come
to Brady. They will grade up,
improve and macadam a sixty-
foot street on all four sides of
the court house square, these
streets being CITY property and
not county property. All they
request of the county commis-
sioners is that they do away
with the hitch racks about the
square, remove the court house
fence, extend the court house
lawn to the street lines, and do
such minor improving as will
make the county property con-
form in appearances with the
city property surrounding.

The commissioners have al-
ready abolished the watering
troughs. The city stands ready
to provide these. Should the
court house lawn be extended;
should seats be placed about the
lawn; should the county prop-
erty be girdled with a walk and
properly curbed, would not such
improvements be as beneficial
to the folks who visit here as
to the folks who live here?

As for the "cleanliness" of
the square, we wish to state that
its cleanliness does not reflect
credit in any degree upon the
county—rather it does honor to
the city sanitary department,
whose force daily gathers up
the refuse, waste paper and rub-
bish from the streets. On the
other hand, we doubt if even
the "Voter" would care to have
his place of business fronting
the back side of a livery stable.
That is the position of Brady
merchants, and one of the rea-
sons why Brady did not secure
a higher score in the "Cleanest
Town in Texas" campaign of a
few years ago was because of
her unsightly and unsanitary
public square.

In asserting that this work
would have to be done at the
expense of the farmers, "Voter"
evidently forgets that the tax-
payers of Brady pay into the
road and bridge tax fund of the
county something like one-third
of the entire amount, and yet
not one cent of this fund can be
legally expended in the improve-
ment of the city's thorough-
fares.

The "Voter" is satisfied with
conditions as they are. Yet
where there is one court house
square on the order of Brady's
there are twenty-five in Texas
where the market square has
supplanted the public square
hitch rack. Majority rule is
good old Democratic doctrine—
and we are strong for the ma-
jority.

Twenty-five members of the
local B. Y. P. U. drove to Doole

rendered a program under the

a most enjoyable time. There
was a large attendance, the
school house being crowded, and
the program was thoroughly en-
joyed. An unexpected surprise,
and a most pleasant one, was
the lunch served by the Doole
folks. There was an abundance
of every manner of good things
to eat, and the Brady delegation
speaks in terms of highest praise

an aspirant for re-election that a change should be made, and somebody else given the office. In ordinary county offices, where hundreds of people are qualified to take care of them, this suggestion frequently holds good, but it has no application whatever to the district judgeship, where matters of large magnitude and importance have to be passed upon, but on the contrary when a district judge has made good, his long years of service are only an additional reason why he should be retained, as it is everywhere recognized that years of experience are necessary, even with the best lawyers, to fit them for competent district judges. In this day efficiency is demanded in every department of life, and efficiency alone will satisfy the public. No well informed or unprejudiced man in this district will challenge the efficiency of Judge Goodwin, and his capability as a judge.

The members of our supreme court who make good usually hold their positions as long as their physical and intellectual powers are at their best, and render better service every year, the same holds good of the judgeship of our courts of civil appeals, and the people have long since learned that changes in the courts, unless a man is shown to be unfit or incompetent, should not be made. The same, likewise, holds good with our district judges. In addition to this, a genuinely good lawyer makes quite a sacrifice to become a trial judge and serve the public in this capacity for a number of years, because if he remains upon the bench for ten years or more, he naturally gets out of touch with his clientele and is put to quite a disadvantage. Should he be compelled to re-enter the practice of law; and if he has made a first-class judge for ten or fifteen years, and it is manifest that the situation cannot be improved by a change, it is an injustice, both to the judge and to the public, to bring about a change, and individual preferences and individual likes and dislikes should yield to those higher and weightier considerations. It matters not who may offer to succeed Judge Goodwin, it goes without saying that the situation at best cannot be improved upon, and in view of what has been stated, there is the risk that the conduct of the courts might not, for a time at least, be up to their present high standard, and this is said without any thought of disparagement to any of the many honorable and capable members of the bar throughout the district, who might aspire to this position.

We bespeak for Judge Goodwin the support, not merely of the county, but of the citizenship of the entire district, and sincerely trust that he will be permitted to render the same useful service which has characterized his administration of the law for the many years past.

BOND ELECTION.

School Bond Election on May 6 at San Saba.

Following the unanimous election last Saturday of Messrs. R. W. Bursleson, J. W. Carroll and R. R. Sloan, nominees of the citizens mass meeting for school trustees, the new board met Tuesday night and ordered an election for May 6th to decide whether or not it is the will of the tax payers of this district that \$6000 of additional bonds be issued for the purpose of completing the basement of the school building and making other necessary improvements.

The order for the election was in response to a petition signed by W. J. Moore and forty-one others. The new members of the board were elected on a platform which stood for the early completion of the building, and they lost no time in taking the first step toward the redemption

of their pledge, the hold-over members already being in accord with the proposition.
