WITH NINE TEAMS

Slow-Pitch Softball Begins Here Mon.

The 1974 Lions Club-sponsored men's slow-pitch softball league here will get underway Monday with nine teams organized to compete in the five-week season which will conclude with a City Tournament to determine the winners of the championship trophy.

Because of the number of teams entered and the lack of time to schedule a double round-robin, each team will play the others one time with the tournament at the end of the season slated to be a double elimination event.

The opening games will kick off at 8 p.m. with the second game set at 9:15, according to A.L. Nuttall, league commissioner.

In a meeting Monday night, team managers drew up a set of rules for the league. A minimum of eight players will be required to begin a game with 8:10 p.m. set as a forfeit time for the first game and 9:30 set as forfeit time for the second game. Four complete innings must be played in the event of rained-out games. Make-up games will be played on Wednesday nights.

The \$30 entry fee for each team, in addition to an 18-man roster, must be turned in to Nuttall by Monday, July 15. Games are scheduled Monday,

Tuesday, Thursday and Friday nights each week with a coin flip determining the home team. The teams playing each night will be required to furnish umpires.

Spraying Service, Larry Jesko. On the schedule the teams will be denoted by numbers, from one to nine, in the order listed above.

A concession stand will be operated at the ball park each night with residents of the community invited to attend all the games, said Nuttall.

Sherley Grain Keeps Share Of League Lead

Sherley Grain, Bovina's entry in the Friona Senior Little League, won a pair of games during the last week of June, to remain in a tie for the league lead with a 5-1 record as play entered the final two weeks of the season.

On Saturday, June 22, Sherley downed Cattle Town Feed Yard, 9-3 and then on Thursday, June 27, the team edged past Pioneer Cattle Order Buyers, 6-4. The latter win avenged Sherley's lone defeat in league play, an 8-7 setback on June 10.

Going into games on July 1, Sherley is all tied up with Hi-Plains Feed Yard for first place in the league, and the two teams are slated to play on Friday, July 5 at 8 p.m. This game should go a long way toward deciding the league title. Bovina scored a 17-9 win over Hi-Plains in the teams' first meeting.

In their 9-3 win over Cattle Town, Sherley scored four runs in the fourth and four more in the seventh. Hits by Tommy Serna, Dan Cox and Ruben Salazar sparked the fourth inning uprising. Gerald Shelby's single added to four walks accounted for the four-run seventh.

Sherley's other run came on Salazar's second-inning triple and a fielder's choice.

Against Pioneer Cattle, Shelby got a two-run double in the first inning to stake the team to a 2-0 lead. He repeated the feat in the third, and Gary Stone's single scored him. Rocky Bartlett's hit scored Stone, and Sherley had a 6-0 lead.

The Bovina team then withstood Pioneer's fourth and fifth inning rallies, during which they scored four runs and left the bases loaded in the fourth.

Sherley was to play Cattle

Town, which has been a streaking team, in a Tuesday night game this week. This score was unavailable by the Blade's deadline.

**'Voters For Life' Send
Letters To Congress**

Twenty members of the Bovina "Voters For Life" met in Community Room of First State Bank of Bovina Tuesday night of last week to frame a letter which will be sent this week to each U.S. Senator and Congressman in conjunction with the nation-wide "Operation AVALANCHE," according to Neal Mager, publicity chairman of the committee.

"This non-denominational letter will join a flood of letters, totaling 10 million pieces of mail weighing 213,000 pounds, from all over the nation," Mager explained. "Each politician will receive 576 pounds of mail, each letter imploring Congress to pass a Human Life Amendment reversing the Supreme Court's decision on abortion," he continued.

Stan Klimek was elected chairman of the Bovina committee at the meeting with Mrs. Mary Rose Brito elected secretary, Jerry Wright fi-

nance chairman, Mager publicity chairman, and Joe Schilling and Father John Coppinger S.A. of St. Ann's Catholic Church elected candidate research chairmen.

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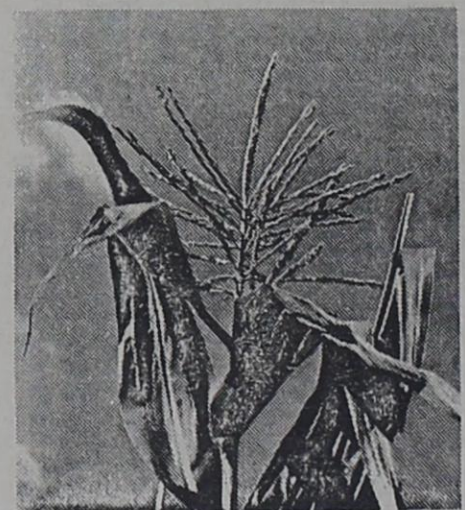

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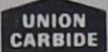

The sale will be held in conjunction with the opening of the new Deaf Smith County Library.

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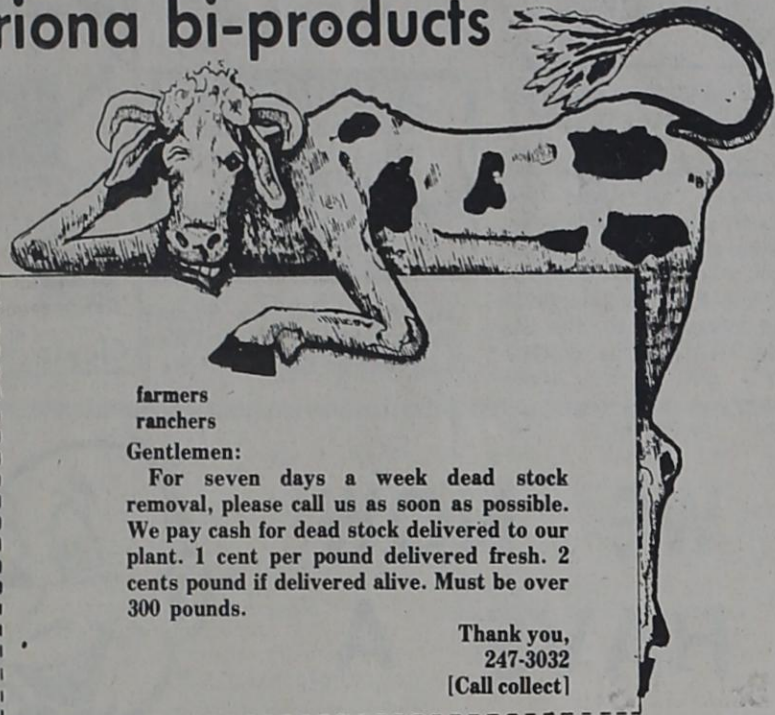

Former Bovina Teacher Killed

A domestic quarrel between an estranged Amarillo couple Monday afternoon erupted into a shooting which left Fleta and Willie Blackshear both dead in her home at 4023 Terrace.

Mrs. Blackshear, 60, was the former Fleta Terry, an elementary teacher in Bovina Schools in the 1950's and early 60's.

Police arrived at the scene shortly after the shooting and the couple was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital where they were both pronounced dead on arrival.

Blackshear was shot three times, once in the lower jaw and twice in the chest. Mrs. Blackshear was shot one time in the center of her chest. The rifle barrel was also apparently bent on her head.

Mrs. Blackshear, a native of Tangier, Okla., had been an Amarillo resident 10 years. She was a school teacher and member of the Polk Street Methodist Church in Amarillo.

Survivors include one son, Terry of Amarillo; two sisters, Mrs. Cleta Robison of Benton,

Ark., and Mrs. Walter Parks of Woodward, Okla.; one brother, Fred Baker Jr. of Lancaster, Calif.; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Baker of Amarillo; and one grandchild. She was preceded in death by a husband, Ernest Terry.

Funeral services were pending Tuesday with an Amarillo funeral home.

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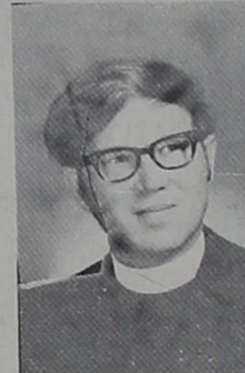

Dynamism Without Extremism

Jesus was not an extremist nor a revolutionary in the sense the words are used today. Although his marvelous teachings had the most profound influence upon the course of human history, it was as leaven and not as dynamite that his influence worked. Present-day extremists who would impute the posture of a revolutionary to mild and gentle Jesus betray their total ignorance of Christ and of the gospels. Jesus was no extremist.

Jesus was in possession of the measureless gift of the Holy Spirit, but not even then did Jesus manifest any extremism. He did not roll in the straw, nor speak in tongues, nor cast dirt in the air, but fulfilled perfectly the prophecy of Isaiah that the voice of the Messiah should not be in the streets and that he would not strive nor cry aloud [Isaiah 42:1].

Jesus was not an extremist in his dress and appearance. He wore no garments of camel's hair as did John, nor did he affect any other outlandish or bizarre clothing, but dressed most remarkably like all other men, a fact attested by the need of the Pharisees and priests to bribe Jesus with thirty pieces of silver to identify him.

Jesus never led a riot, organized any underground, or engaged in filthy and obscene conversation. He was not a nudist, and exhibitionist, an extrovert or introvert. He never sanctioned rebellion, revolt, civil disobedience or violence of any kind.

Jesus paid his taxes, observed the Sabbath, attended the synagogue, read the scriptures daily, for twenty years endured the toils and discipline of that small carpenter's shop in Nazareth. He rebuked Peter for neglecting to provide the customary bowl of water in which to wash his feet-he wanted the smell of a clean person.



Tina Isaac Commissioner At Girls State Session

Tina Isaac, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Isaac of Bovina, returned recently from the 1974 session of Bluebonnet Girls State on the campus of Texas Lutheran College at Sequin. Miss Isaac, who will be a senior this fall in Bovina High School, was elected to Commissioner of Place 4 in Giant County during the session.

She was sponsored by the Bovina Woman's Study Club. Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, purpose of the program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume as duties.

The '74 session had grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University at Waco in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in the state. This year, 494 girls from Texas, in addition to two from Mexico, participated making a total of more than 10,750 taking part in the citizenship program since its inception.

Former citizens of Girls State and members of the Texas American Legion Auxiliary comprise the 60 staff members and counselors who volunteer their services to direct and lead the program.

Miss Frances Goff of Houston, director of Special Projects for the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, was director of the session. Associate director was Mrs. T.J. Manning of Houston.

assistant principal at Clear Creek High School in League City. Mrs. Sam Altmore of Hearne was chairman of the Auxiliary Girls State Committee.

Chief Justice Joe Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State in the rotunda of the state capitol on Monday, June 17.

One of the highlights of the session was the selection of two outstanding citizens from the '74 session who will be sent to Girls Nation in Washington, D.C. Two girls were also selected to participate in an all-Girls State choir to perform at the American Legion Auxiliary National Convention in Miami, Fla., in August. Also, 12 girls

were named to U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen's Internship Program to be held in Washington, D.C., July 7 through 12. This is the second year Sen. Bentsen has sponsored the program for Texas Girls State.

Guest speakers at the '74 session included Lynn Steward, Commander of the American Legion; Tom Reavley, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas; Governor Dolph Briscoe; Mrs. Carole McClellan, member of the Austin Independent School District Board; Jim Ray, executive director of the Texas Constitution Revision Convention Committee; John Adams of the FBI; and Sarah Weddington, member of the Texas House of Representatives.

PREDICTS DPS

July 4th Holiday Will See 42 Die

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents during the 102-hour July 4th holiday weekend would claim 42 lives in Texas.

Speir, who did not make an estimate for the Christmas-New Year period because of rapidly changing conditions brought on by the energy crisis, said the traffic situation has become more stable in recent months. He noted that gasoline is readily available in most sections of the state, and pointed out that this would probably bring additional traffic to the highways during the approaching holiday.

The July 4th holiday last year, which was only 30 hours in length, resulted in 13 traffic deaths in Texas. The 1972 holiday, which was 102-hours long—the same as the upcoming

period—was marred by 80 deaths.

The DPS director pointed out that excessive speed and drinking drivers would make the largest contribution to the fatal accident toll, and he warned that all available DPS troopers and department facilities will be utilized to watch for unsafe and reckless motorists.

"We urge every Texas driver to join with us in this all-out effort to make the July 4th holiday period as safe as possible" he added.

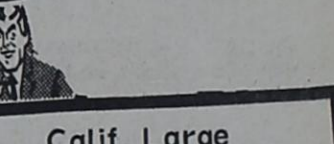

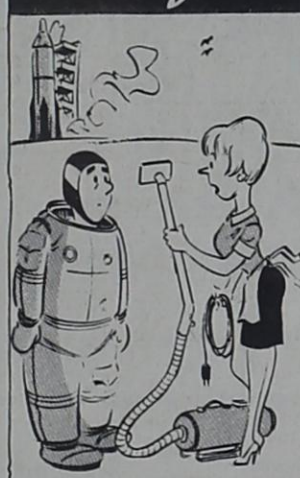
Girl Scout Day Camp Slated Here
