the same reasons as given by Mr. McCollum. Dr. McCall, likewise has devoted much time to the work of the league, and has been numbered among the most enthusiastic members.

The election of officers resulted as follows: J. T. Freeman, president; B. A. Jones, first vice-president; Dr. J. S. Anderson, second vice president.

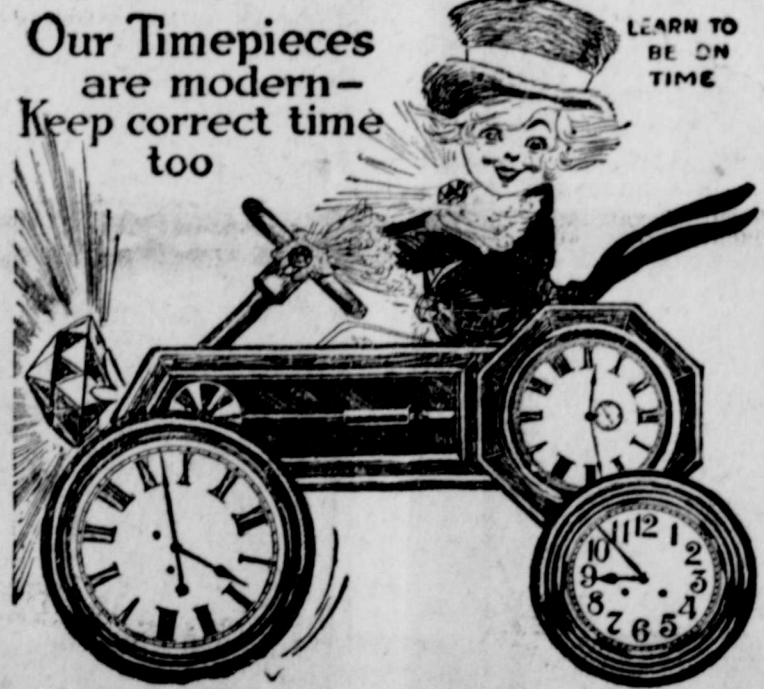
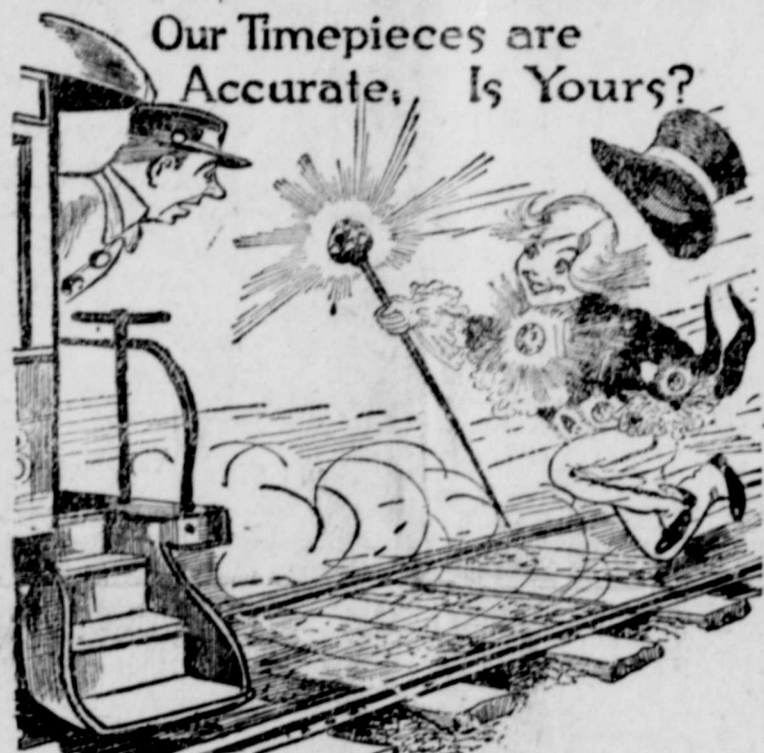

DESTRUCTIVE HAIL.

Serious Damage to Crops in Northwest Part of County.

A section of the county extending from a few miles west of Melvin almost to Mercury was visited by a severe hail storm Saturday night, resulting in heavy crop damage, corn, cotton and forage crops on some of the farms being literally beaten into the ground.

Fortunately the territory covered by the hail was narrow, in some places not being more than a half mile in width, but covering some ten or fifteen miles in length. The heaviest loss was probably sustained in the Waldrip community, where the hail stones are reported as having been larger than hen eggs and the ground completely covered.

LIVESTOCK SHIPMENTS.
Abner Hanson Markets Three Cars of Cattle and Hogs.
Abner Hanson Tuesday shipped out two cars of cattle and one of hogs to the Fort Worth markets. This shipment was composed of stock gathered at random over this territory, and is one of the many made by Mr. Hanson since last fall, he being one of the regular shippers to the Fort Worth market.
Indicative of the fact that McCulloch county farmers are giving more attention to the raising of hogs now than in the past might be pointed out that, including those shipped by Mr. Hanson Tuesday, a total of 1070 hogs have been marketed by him since January 1st—a period of little more than four and a half months. Based on an average weight of 260 pounds and figured at the minimum price paid by

Mr. Hanson, this means that a total of something like \$11,000 has been distributed among the farmers for hogs alone by this one buyer since the first of the year.
The marketing facilities afforded the farmers by Mr. Hanson is expected to stimulate the raising of more and better hogs by McCulloch county citizens, and will furnish a source of revenue greater than the average man might calculate.

Heavy damage is also reported from Pear Valley and Doole communities, but the loss will not be so heavy as around Waldrip. The hail was accompanied by a torrential rain and a high wind.
While the damage to growing crops will be heavy, yet it is fortunate that it came as early as it did, as there is yet time to replant cotton and some of the forage crops.

night on "The Oneness of God."

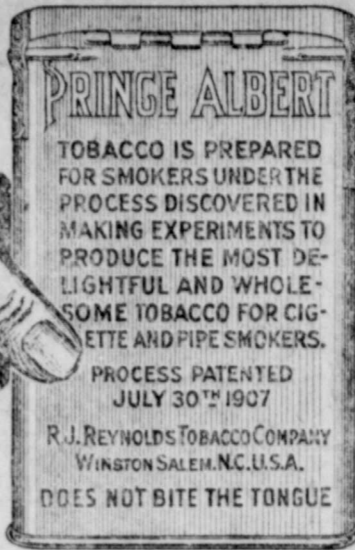
S. W. Turnell and J. A.

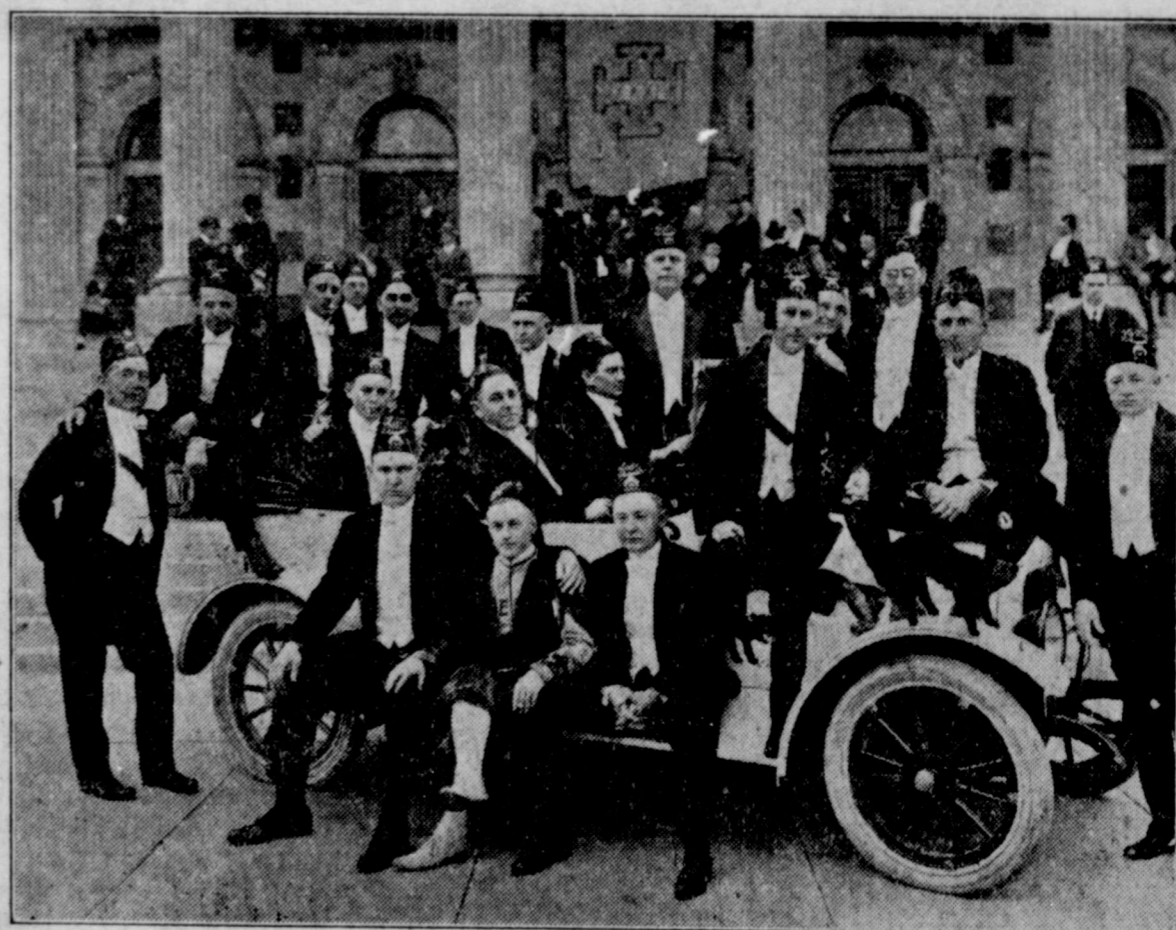

members, tested out the springs and durability of this powerful and good looking car.

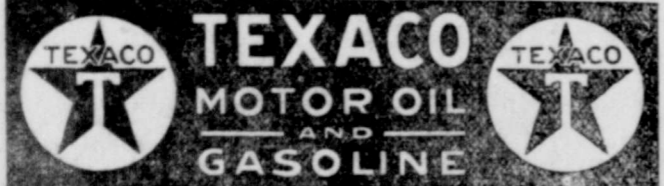

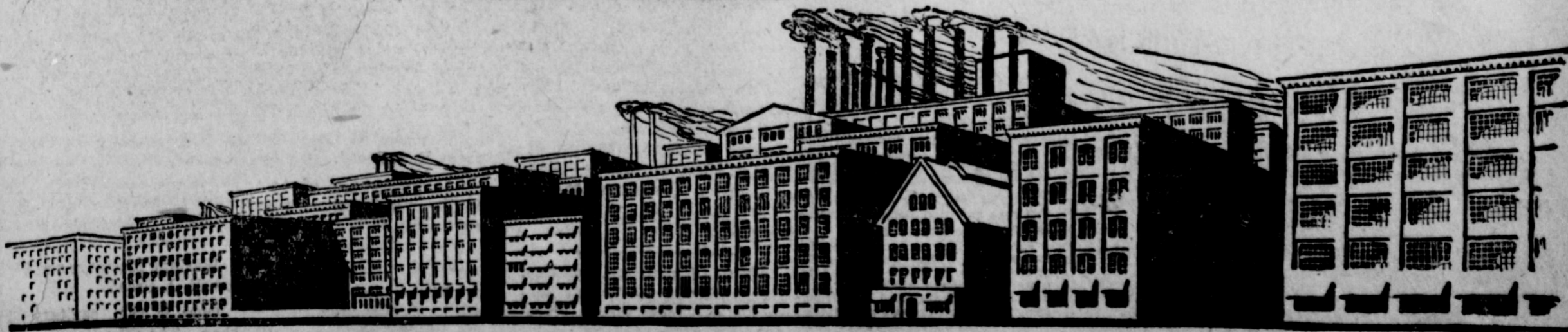
