Queen Hotel Block Purchased by J. E. Bell.

A deal was closed Wednesday whereby J. E. Bell of this city becomes the owner of the Queen hotel property located on the northeast corner of the public square, the deal involving a consideration of \$15,000. The property was acquired from the C. C. Bumgardner estate.

The building is two stories in height, a portion of the second floor extending over the buildings owned and occupied by Polk's barber shop and the Central Drug store.

BRADY GETS REDUCTION.
Insurance Commission Grants Lower Rate for Good Record.

Local fire insurance agencies Monday received notification from the State Fire Insurance Commission of the granting of a reduction of 15 per cent of the Brady rate on account of the low loss ration maintained here during the past three years, the change being effective the 25th of the past month.

This matter was taken up with the state commission several months ago by the city authorities and all the necessary data regarding fire losses furnished the commission, and the granting of the reduction is a result of their investigation. According to the finding of the commission the loss ratio for the three years of 1913, 1914 and 1915 is .182 per cent of the premiums, thereby entitling the city to the maximum 15 per cent reduction.

This reduction does not come off the key rate, but is to be taken from the final rate, and only affects risks within the corporate limits of the city. In order to maintain this reduced rate it is necessary to submit a report at the end of each year showing the loss ratio for the town, the promulgation of the present rate covering only the remainder of the present year.

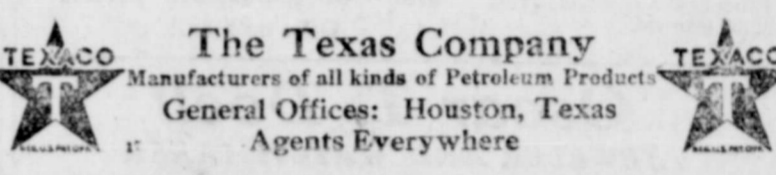

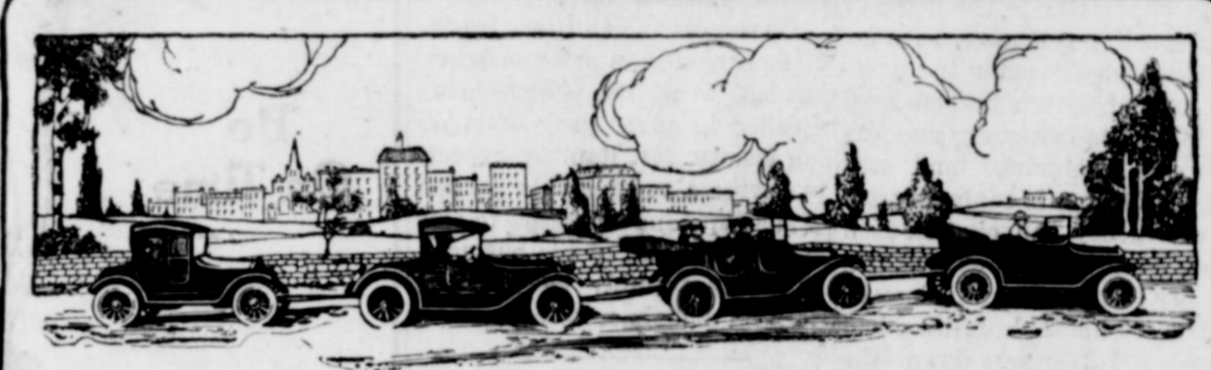

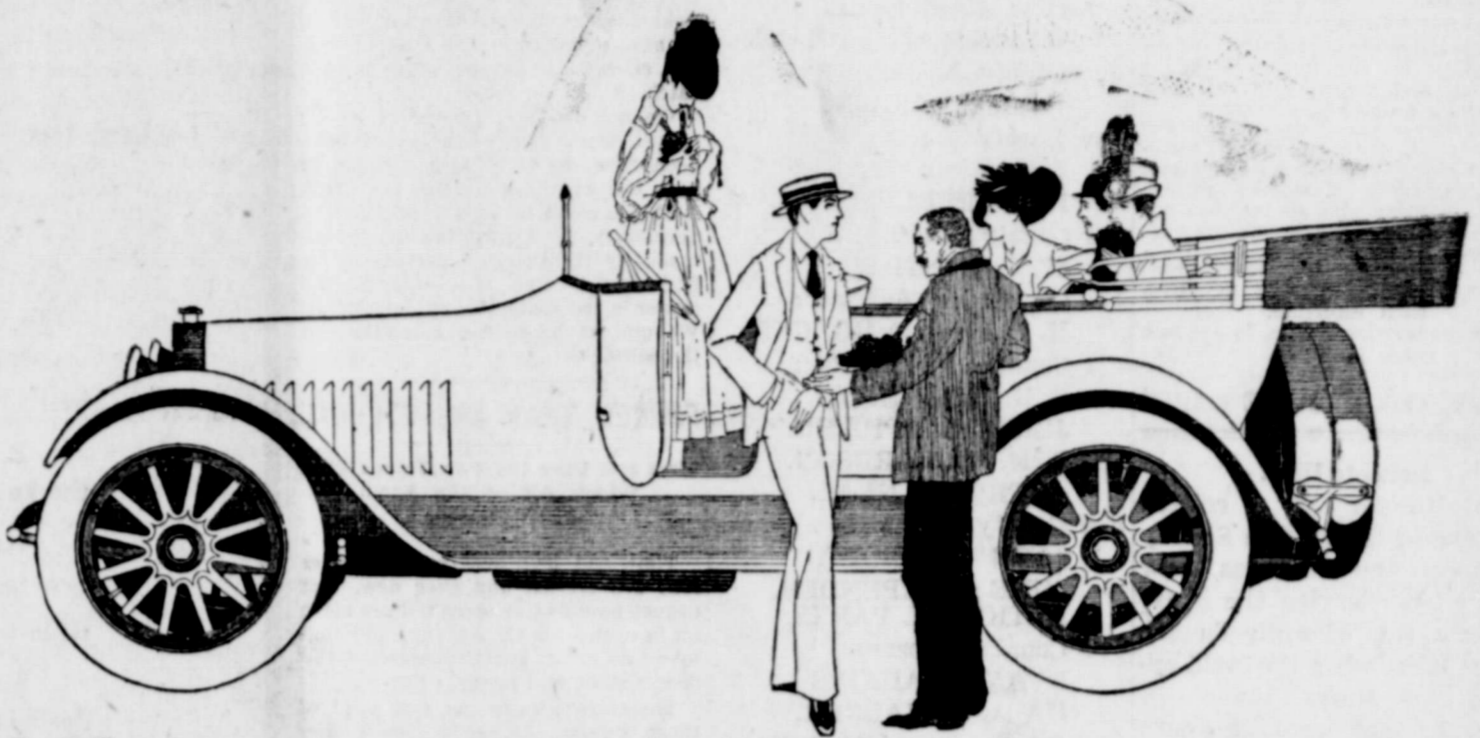

The other thing is simply one of mathematics: If the Chalmers factory can turn out 125 cars a day and Chalmers dealers all over the United States are selling 425 a day, how long will the supply last?

Arranging Irish Marriages.

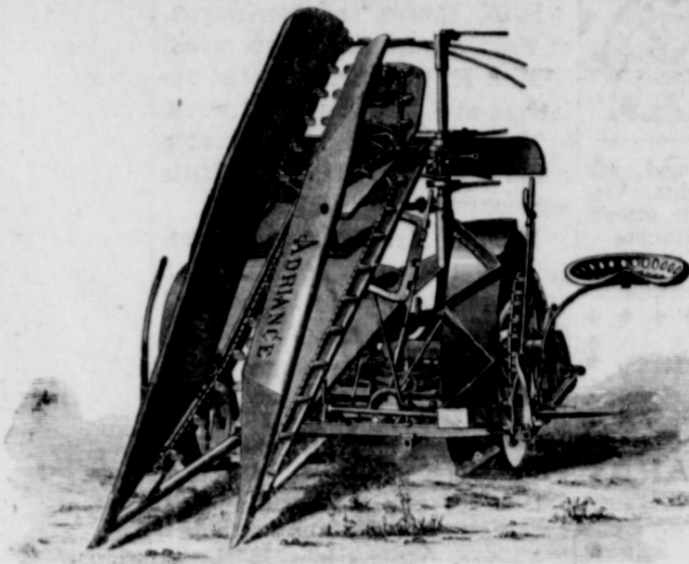
Law Notes says that a case tried be-
fore the recorder of Galway, Ireland,
not long ago, revealed that marriages

appeared that the husband investi-
gated the stock, goods and chattels on

held that it had no power to grant
relief to the extent of annulling the
marriage.

Too Much for Engineers.

Some forty years ago some English-
men proposed to dig a canal on the
northwest coast of Africa, south of

Feed Crop Prospects.

College Station, Texas, June
6.—Crop conditions in Texas at
the moment are not as promisi-
ng for food and feed as they
were at this time last year.

The five District Agents of
Farm Demonstration Work of
the A. and M. College and United
States Department of Agri-
culture, met for conference at
College Station last week. It was
the consensus of opinion of these
men, whose districts cover all
parts of the State, that there is
a probability of a short crop this
year. One fact in evidence is the
increased acreage in cotton and
another is that the sentiment
for feed crops this year for some
reason is not as strong as last
year. The next three weeks is a
very critical period with the corn
crop. The stalk is small, and
even the best cultivation cannot
produce a maximum crop of
corn. Therefore, the necessity
arises for planting peas, sorg-
hum, peanuts and June-corn to
make up this prospective short-
age.

It is good business in farming
to hedge against a loss, either
partial or total, in one crop by
planting a substitute. These sub-
stitute crops can be planted with
safety up to June 25th. The farm-
ers of the State will make a
crop cheaper this year than in
several years past, because they
have plenty of their own feed,
and they should profit by this
year's experience.

All interests concerned in agri-
cultural welfare are urged to
bring these facts immediately to
the attention of the farmers.

REV. OTIS HAWKINS DEAD.

Well Known Christian Minister Died at Dallas Monday.

His many Brady friends were shocked Tuesday by the news of the death of Rev. Otis Hawkins at his home in Dallas Monday morning about 10:00 o'clock, his death resulting from a pistol wound self inflicted.

For several years Rev. Hawkins was engaged in the benevolent work of the Christian churches of Texas, his duties taking him into almost every community of the State and he was one of the most widely known and popular ministers in the State. He visited Brady about three years ago, at which time he delivered an illustrated lecture at the Christian tabernacle on the work in which he was engaged. He was a fluent and highly entertaining speaker and made many friends here, to whom his death came as a severe shock.

Wednesday morning's Dallas News contained the following write-up of his death:

Nerve-racking pains which accompanied a headache of three days is the cause assigned for the sudden death of the Rev. Otis Hawkins, benevolent worker, who died forty-five minutes after he fired a bullet into his head yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock. He was removed from home, 4821 Reiger avenue, to the Baptist Sanitarium. He never regained consciousness.

The Rev. Mr. Hawkins had been ill for some time and Dr. H. Leslie Moore, who visited him a short time before the shot was fired, advised the employment of a trained nurse.

Yesterday morning Mrs. Hawkins started to the door in response to a summons of the nurse who had arrived when she heard the report of a pistol. The wife and the nurse rushed upstairs and found the body lying on the floor and a smoking revolver. It is the belief of members of the household and close friends that the excruciating pains attending his serious illness resulted in a sudden derangement of the patient's mind and that he reached into the dresser drawer and procured the revolver, firing the shot immediately.

The body is being held at the parlors of Ed C. Smith & Bro. pending funeral arrangements.

The Rev. Mr. Hawkins was about 40 years old. He has been prominent in charitable and benevolent work of the Christian Church for several years. For the last several months he served as field agent for the Fowler Home for the Aged. He has lived in Dallas several years and was well known throughout the State.

The National Benevolent Association operates the Juliette Fowler home for orphans and aged people at Dallas and fourteen other institutions in the United States. The Rev. Mr. Hawkins resigned his position with the Dallas organization to accept a position at St. Louis with the same association. On account of his ability as a speaker he was chosen to deliver addresses in behalf of the church. He had just completed work at the conventions of the church in New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Colorado and Arkansas.

During his connection with the local benevolent institutions the home for the orphans was moved from near Grand Prairie to Dallas and a \$45,000 building was constructed for their accommodation.

SEAL OF UNIVERSITY.

"Cultivated Mind is the Guardian Genius of Democracy."

Here is an interesting bit of history connected with the seal of the University of Texas, which is well worth knowing:

The University seal was designed and adopted at the first meeting of the Board of Regents, November 1, 1881, for all official documents of the University. It was an encircled Texas star, subtended by a wreath of olive and live-oak branches, and the words "Non sine pulvere palma" written under the star.

This original seal was in use until 1905, when, upon the recommendation of Dr. W. J. Battle, a new design was adopted and a die made for it. Dr. Battle recommended a change on account of three serious defects of the old seal. These were that it was not sufficiently distinctive, very common-place, and was faulty from the standpoint of correct heraldry. In his address to President Prather of the University on October 22, 1902, he described the new seal as follows: "Within a circle of gules bearing the legend, 'Sigillum Universitatis Texanae,' a disk azure with the motto, 'Disciplina Praesidium Civitatis,' surrounding a shield tenné bearing a mullet within a wreath of olive and live-oak branches argent; on a chief of the last an open book proper."

To conform with general usage, the design features a shield form which shows the origin of heraldic arms. The shield is divided into two fields, the upper white, the lower, orange, the University colors. In the lower and larger field are the historic wreath and the star of the great State of Texas. In the upper field is an open book, a proper symbol for an educational institution. The shield rests in a circle of blue, the color of sincerity, containing the motto, "Disciplina praesidium civitatis."

This motto was translated from President Mirabeau Lamar's famous statement, "Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy," by Dr. E. Whitfield Fay, of the school of Latin. The words "Sigillum Universitatis Texanae" were inscribed in a red disk around the disk of blue.

The new seal as suggested by Dr. Battle, was drawn by Charles Young of Philadelphia, and was then submitted to the Board of

Regents on October 31, 1905, when it was adopted by the board with the change of the words "Seal of the University of Texas" instead of the Latin translation of these words.

What The War Is Doing For The Farmer

The European war is not an unmitigated evil; nor yet is it an unmitigated blessing for this country. We shall not attempt to go into the ethical side of the question at all, but shall discuss "war brides", munition plants or other similar phases of the situation. We shall look at the war purely from the standpoint of prices for raw products, either produced here in this country or imported from foreign countries. And of course when we consider raw products we must carry the subject further on into the matter of the prices we get and the prices we must pay for finished products. We shall confine our consideration, too, to those products which have their origin on the farm either in the raw state or finished and manufactured into edible or wearable articles.



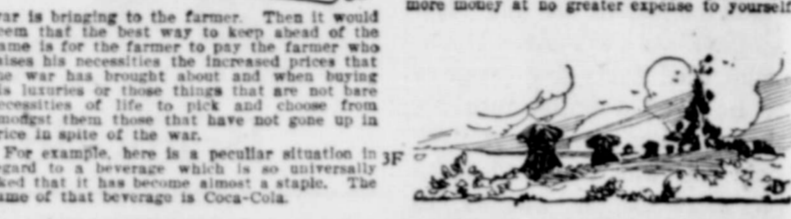
Let us take wheat, for example. We all know that the war has put the price of wheat way up. Very well—this means that the whole country, city, town and rural population as well as paying more for their flour—therefore the wheat raiser should theoretically be getting rich on a product which it costs him no more to raise than formerly and for which he gets more money.

But wait a minute—there are other things to consider in this matter of growing rich off of the war. Cotton and wool and meats and farm machinery and sugar have gone up too. This means that while the wheat raiser is getting more for his product, he is also paying some other agricultural more for his product. This cuts down somewhat on the profits the



war is bringing to the farmer. Then it would seem that the best way to keep ahead of the game is for the farmer to pay the farmer who raises his necessities the increased prices that the war has brought about and when buying his luxuries or those things that are not necessities of life to pick and choose from amongst them those that have not gone up in price in spite of the war.

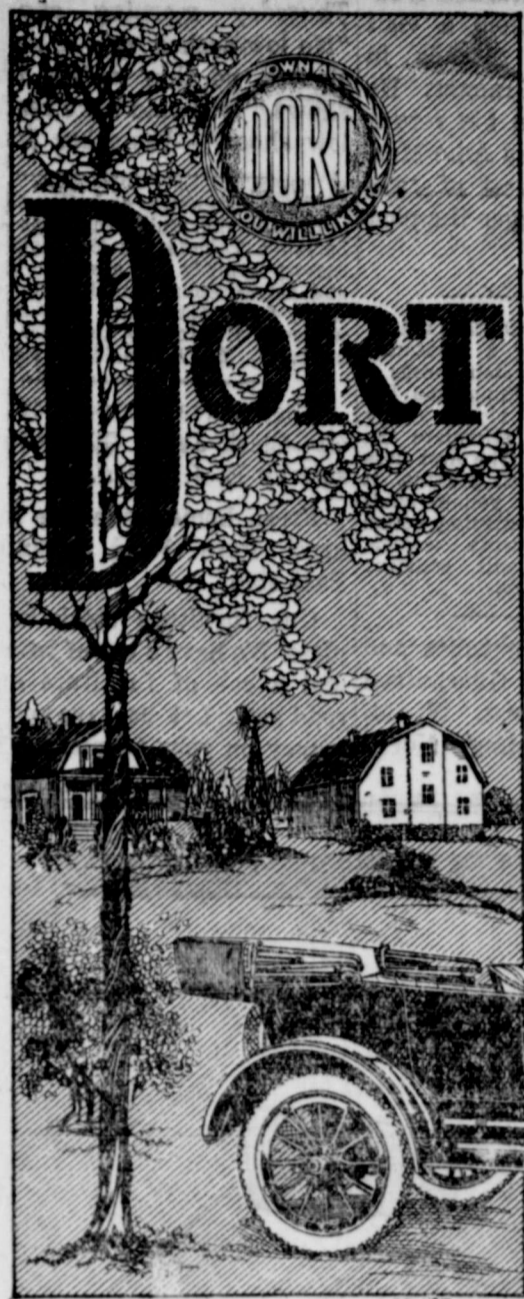

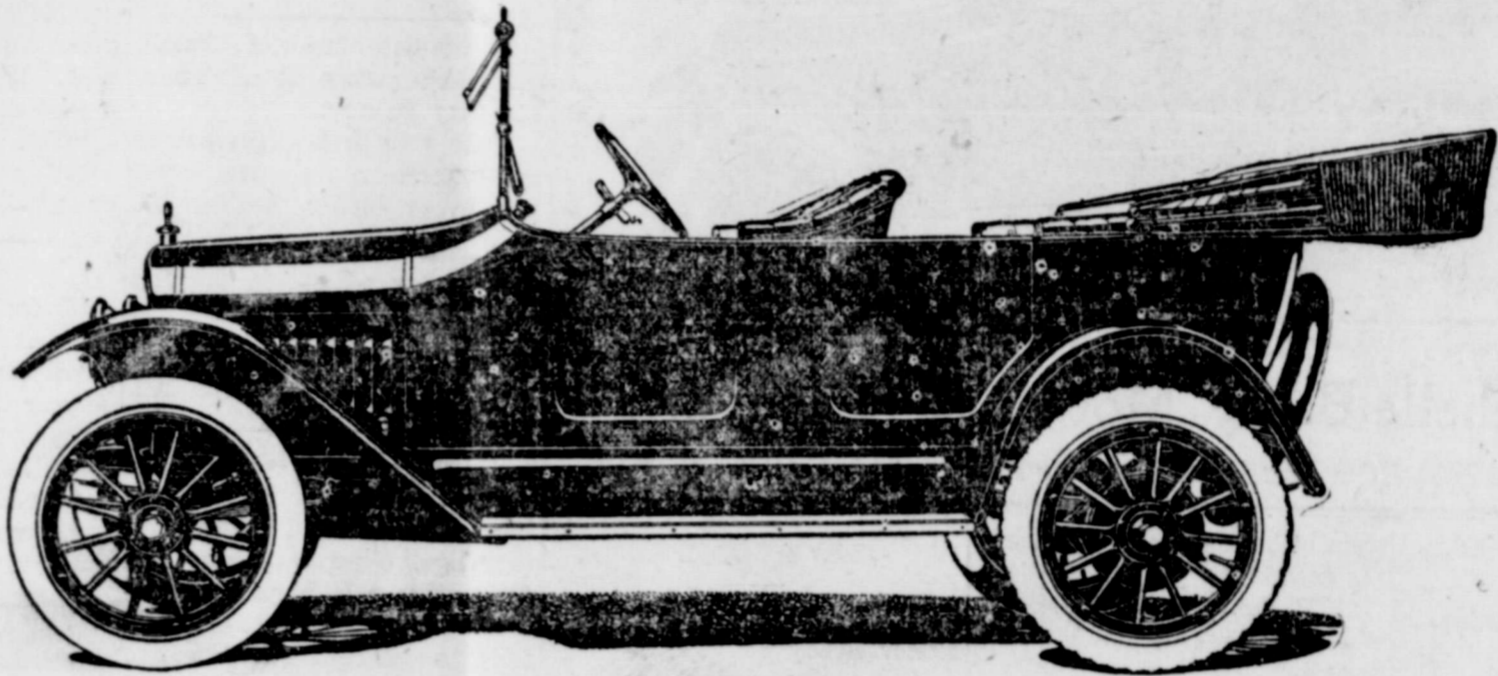
