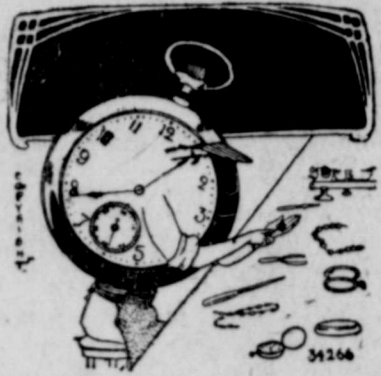

COMMISSIONERS COURT.

County Officials Hold Brief Session This Week.

Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, the following business having been transacted during the term of court.

Refund in the sum of \$9.34 was ordered allowed Mrs. W. T. Melton on taxes already paid by her.

Allowance of \$10.00 per month for Steve Powell, a pauper, was ordered hereafter paid to W. B. Woods.

Returns of the election held June 17th in Smith Common School district for the purpose of determining whether or not

an increase of a 10c tax on the \$100 valuation should be levied, was declared by the court as follows: For the increase in tax, 8; against the increase, 0. The tax was accordingly ordered levied.

Court ordered one-fourth of tax assessed against Henry Hoerster on account of cattle remitted, for the reason that he was assessed for 200 head of cattle, when he had but 150 head in his possession.

The watering troughs about the public square were ordered sold to J. E. Bell for the sum of \$10.00.

J. L. Ford was allowed the sum of \$6.00 per month for the care of Mrs. P. A. Story, a pauper.

The returns of the special election held June 14th in McCulloch county for the purpose of determining whether or not there should be levied a special road tax not to exceed 15c on the \$100.00 worth of property, was declared as follows: Total votes cast, 784; For the tax, 298; majority for the tax, 278. The tax was accordingly ordered levied.

Monthly report of S. H. Mayo, tax collector, was examined and approved.

Bond of Geo. Nix, butcher at Brady, with J. F. Schaeg and C. W. L. Schaeg as sureties, was examined and approved.

Quarterly report of W. K. McGonagill, butcher at Melvin, was examined and approved.

Members of court were allowed their per diem.

Road Minutes.

A certain tract of land conveyed by E. E. Willoughby to McCulloch county for the purpose of creating a public road, was ordered reconveyed to Mr. Willoughby the same having never been accepted by the county or used as a public road. Land conveyed to McCulloch

county by H. P. Jordan for the purposes of establishing a cemetery at the town of Melvin, was ordered conveyed to a corporation known as the Melvin Cemetery association, and full rights to said property were ordered vested in said association to enable it to dispose of burial lots, and to manage and control the said property.

Court adjourned Wednesday, the 12th.

A GOLDEN RULE CITY.

San Angelo's corporation court is
not being maintained as a
source of revenue.

Its officers are not making ar-
rests or trying cases as a means
of securing profit.

Fees paid into this court do
not benefit an individual, but go
direct into the coffers of the
city.

Police Chief Snow and Offi-
cers Cunningham and Murphy,
Recorder M. B. Jones, and City
Attorney Amos Loveland will
continue to draw their salaries
whether a single case is tried or
a single fine assessed by the tri-
bunal the year around.

So much for the new city
charter. It has taken a long step
in the right direction. But the
officers have taken a longer step.

City Attorney Loveland, in
discussing the system Saturday,
remarked that these officers
"feel that our duties include pre-
vention of crime as well as
punishment of the criminal." They
feel that out of court there
are times when they may assist
in adjusting differences, and
thus keep down disturbances.

Punishment of crime, where
punishment is deserved, is just.
Prevention of crime takes a
higher talent; specialization
along a very different line. There
are few courts or police depart-
ments in the country which have
seriously attempted it. It opens
a broad field to the police offi-
cer and the good that may be
accomplished can hardly be es-
timated.

The Golden Rule is a safe
guide, and it is the Golden Rule
that San Angelo officials have
adopted for use in every indi-
vidual case. The people will

watch with interest, develop-
ments along this new line of en-
deavor. The city officials will
have the united backing of all
good citizens, and we feel that
earnest effort will result in a
large measure of success.—San
Angelo Standard.

The sympathy of the newspa-
per fraternity is extended the
publishers of the Brownwood
Herald, whose plant was de-
stroyed by fire early Monday
morning. The Herald was estab-
lished about a month ago, and
possessed an \$18,000 equip-
ment. The heat of the flames melted
the type and damaged the type-
setting machines so badly as to
necessitate rebuilding. The ori-
gin of the fire has not been de-
termined. The publishers an-
nounce the resumption of pub-
lication as soon as repairs can
be made.

Necessity is the mother of in-

first of this week when a Ger-
man submarine arrived in New
York harbor, having crossed the
ocean with a cargo of 750 tons
of dyes and chemicals. The ves-

sel enabling it to more easily es-
cape detection by allied war ves-
sels. The submarine expects to
return shortly to Germany with
a cargo of rubber and nickel.

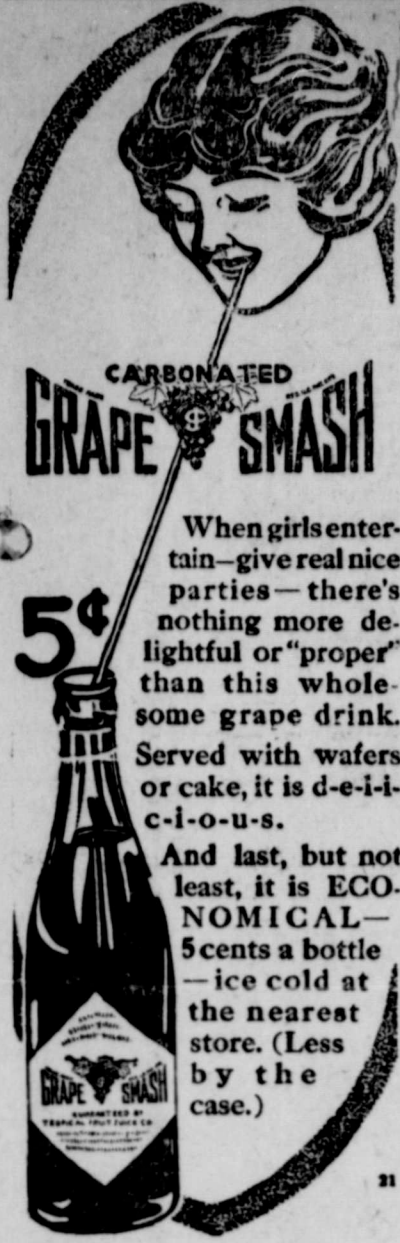

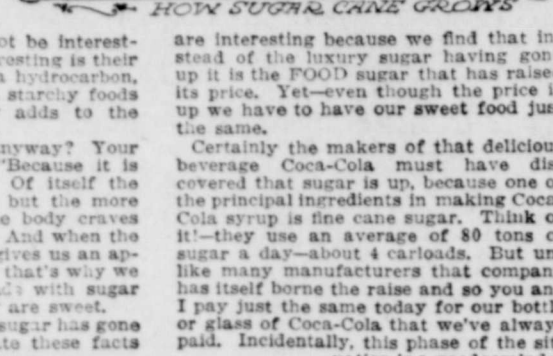

Santa Fe to Pay Death Benefits.

The Santa Fe Railway Company has adopted a plan for the payments of death benefits to the families of employes who die while in service. The scheme contemplates in event of death of an employe having two or more years continuous service, payment of a death benefit amounting to a sum equal to five percent of the employe's wages for the preceding twelve months multiplied by the number of years of continuous service, provided that the maximum payment shall be the equivalent of the wages earned for the preceding twelve months, but shall in no case be more than \$3,000, nor less than \$250.

In announcing the plan, Pres-

ident Ripley has stated that owing to the absence of accurate data as to cost, the plan will be given a trial for two years. Mr. Ripley expressed the hope that conditions may enable this company to continue it in effect after that time.

With the distribution of pay checks on July 15th, each employe will be handed a card to be filled out, giving the name of his or her beneficiary.

Notice to Election Officers of McCulloch Co.

Each of the parties whose names appear below will take notice of his appointment as presiding judge of the Primary Election to be held on the 22nd of this month; each of said officers are required to hold the election at the place set opposite his name.

The law provides that such presiding judge shall select an associate judge and two clerks to assist in conducting the election, and in case the presiding judge is of the opinion that more than 100 votes will be polled, he may appoint two additional clerks to assist in conducting said election.

To those who desire to vote in Primary Election.

1. "You cannot vote at a primary election unless you are 21 years old, have resided in the State for twelve months, and in the county in which you offer to vote, for six months, and paid your poll tax, State, county and city or town, prior to February 1, or received a certificate of exemption, if you are exempt and a certificate is required."
 2. "You are not entitled to vote at a primary election if you are not 21 years old at the time you offer to vote, notwithstanding you may become 21 years old on or before the date of holding the general election."
 3. "You vote by marking out all names for whom you do not desire to vote."
 4. "The name of the presiding judge will be written on the opposite side of your ballot. After preparing your ballot, fold it so that his name will be visible, and deliver it to one of the election judges."
 5. "You cannot carry with you to the polling place any paper or ballot on which is marked or printed the names of any one for whom you have agreed to vote, or for whom you have been requested to vote, and any judge of the election may require you to make affidavit that you have no such paper or ballot, and if you have such, you will be requested to deliver it to the officers of the election before you will be allowed to prepare your ballot."
 6. "If you need any assistance in the preparation of your ballot, it must be given by the election judges, and a heavy fine and imprisonment is imposed upon any judge or clerk of an election who by word, writing, sign or token indicates how he desires you to vote."
 7. "The fact a person will have resided in the county six months at the time of the general election in November, will not authorize him to vote in the primary in July unless he will have resided six months in the county at the date of the primary."
- The above is taken from the Revised Election Laws of Texas by the Attorney General's Department of this State.

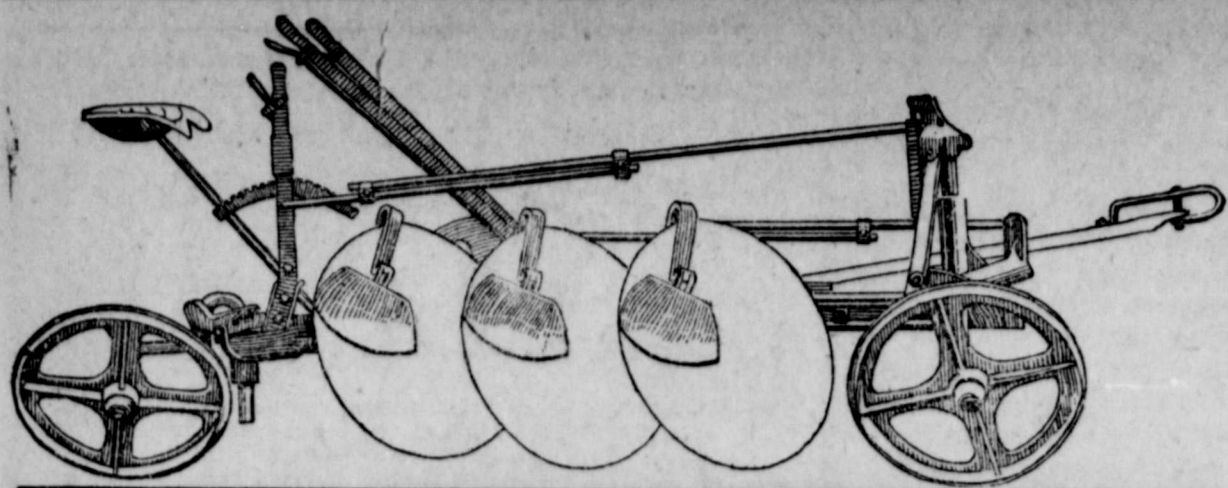

COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

Probably no man in public life in Texas today is better known or has a more enviable record than has Henry B. Terrell, who is now serving his first term as State Comptroller. For fifteen years he served the people of the Waco District in the House and Senate, resigning the office of State Senator to become Comptroller of Public Accounts in January, 1915, to which office he had been elected in the preceding election by an overwhelming majority, carrying three times as many counties, both pro and anti, as his nearest competitor. He enjoys the distinction of never having been defeated for public office nor was any vote he ever cast during his long legislative career ever questioned by an opponent on the stump.

His administration of the Comptroller's office, which is one of the most important offices in the State, has been universally commended by the people of every political belief. His rigid enforcement of the liquor laws has met the approval of every man who believes the law should be supreme. While refusing to persecute, he has prosecuted to the fullest extent each and every violator of the law and as a result of his prosecutions and activities there has been closed under his administration more saloons, illegitimate clubs, and boot-legging joints combined than under the administration of all former Comptrollers for the same length of time.

He has known no creed or faction, but has given every man a full hearing and a square deal. He has issued many public statements that it was unnecessary to employ attorneys to reach the Comptroller's office, but that the doors were open to all who had business there and a letter would answer the purpose of an attorney.

He is the first Comptroller to install an auditing system whereby accounts of public officials, State departments and State institutions handling the people's money may be audited from time to time. This system has only been in effect a few months, though in this brief time more than \$100,000.00 has been recovered from officials and ex-officials which had been stolen or withheld from the State prior to his administration. He has referred to the Attorney General's Department and District Attorneys over the State for collection, accounts amounting to more than \$100,000.00. Some of the money above referred to has been due the State for fifteen years and in some instances men have been out of office from five to ten years. Twenty-two indictments have been returned by various grand juries over the State as a result of his investigations. He has collected more than \$75,000.00 in interest on school bonds that was past due and had been past due from six months to three years when he entered the office.

By carefully scrutinizing accounts presented to the Department for payment it is estimated that he is saving the tax-payers at least \$50,000.00 per annum.

System and service has been the watchword under Mr. Terrell's administration, and his friends are proud of the record he has made. He recently made the statement that if the next Legislature will give him the authority, and such assistance as he needs, that he will recover to the people more than \$1,000,000.00 that has been withheld from the Treasury from one to twenty years.—(Political advertisement.)

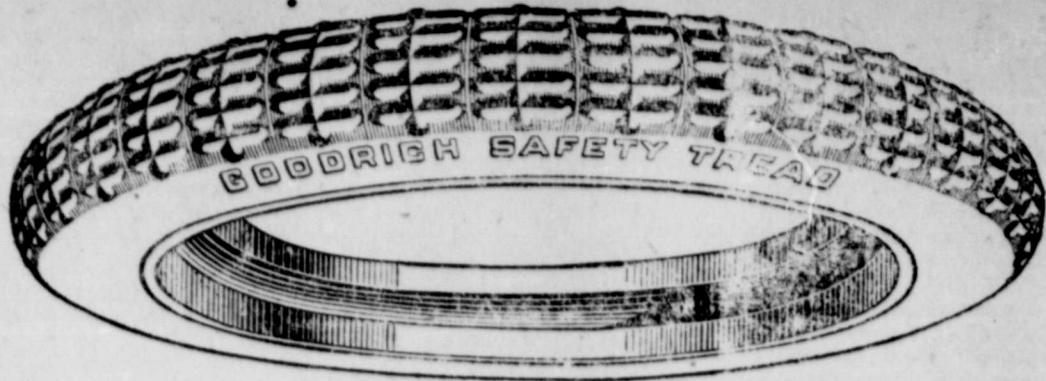

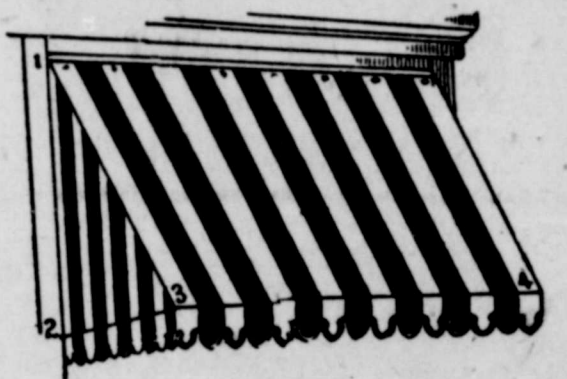
