GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION

Organized at Rousing Mass Meeting at Court House Yesterday--E. J. Hernan Arouses Great Enthusiasm by Address.

(At a rousing mass meeting attended by fully 300 citizens of Brady, as well as by delegates from neighboring points both within the county and from adjoining points, and with a goodly sprinkling of ladies in the audience, a Good Roads association was yesterday organized with an initial membership of 78, which will be affiliated with the State and National Highways associations, and through which Brady will take an active part in the determined effort now being made to have Brady

recognized as on the route of one, probably two, and in all likelihood, three great highways that will traverse this section of the country.

The mass meeting was the result of the visit here yesterday of Mr. E. J. Hernan, director of the National Highway association, Washington, D. C., who was making an inspection tour of the proposed route of the Puget Sound to the Gulf

twenty-five cars drove to the Mason county line in the morning to meet the Mason delegation, who were bringing Mr. Hernan that far enroute to Brady, and formed in procession to escort him to Brady.

Mr. Hernan made a concise and business-like statement of the good roads movement. He opened his remarks by expressing appreciation of the committee which drove out to meet

leaving Austin.

Mr. Hernan told of the first transcontinental highway that had been undertaken, being built from the Atlantic coast as far as St. Louis, where the work was halted by reason of the panic of 1836. He told how government interest had become centered in aiding the development of railroad and steamship lines, with growing apathy upon the part of both citizens and repre-

sentatives of the people on the good roads question. Only of recent years has this interest been re-awakened, with the result that Congress has now appropriated a fund of \$85,000,000 for road improvement. \$10,000,000 of this sum is to be expended for roads to the national forests, and the balance is to be apportioned among the various states of the union according to size, population and road mileage. Through the efforts of the Good Roads association, Texas' apportionment has been placed at \$4,500,000. There is a condition attached to this, however, and that is that each state sharing in this fund must have a state highway commission, under whose supervision all national highways must be constructed in order to give uniformity of construction, and the best roads at the least cost. Mr. Hernan stated that out of forty-eight states but two did not have this office, and Texas was one of the two. However, this matter is being urged by the Texas Good Roads association, and Governor Ferguson has promised his active support and influence towards the creation of this office.

Mr. Hernan stated that the matter of building good roads had passed the county or precinct stage; that it was national in its scope. The hundreds and thousands of tourists who use the national highways contribute not one cent to the building or to the maintenance of the highways, which is all the more reason why state and federal aid should be given for the maintenance of these highways. He called attention to the fact that this aid was only for maintenance, and that the roads must

THE PARKING ORDINANCE.

A petition is being circulated today requesting the city council to rescind the ordinance recently passed regulating the placing of automobiles and designating the places where they shall be allowed to stand. Objection to the ordinance is chiefly because of the confusion which it is thought will result from standing autos at the county hitch rack alongside horses which may be skittish. The further objection is raised that the ordinance does not relieve the congestion on the street in front of the opera house inasmuch as the same congestion will prevail if autos are parked a block further up.

In The Standard's humble opinion, the ordinance, is on the whole, not without merit, and with a few amendments should be allowed to stand. The objection to mixing teams and autos about the court house hitch rail could be overcome by assigning two sides of the square to autos and two to vehicles. The parking of cars alongside the picture show should be assigned to but one side of the street, allowing the other side for free and uninterrupted passage. As it is, it is positively dangerous to drive through the narrow lane left when cars are parked on either side of Blackburn street. Aside from the danger of colliding with standing or passing vehicles, there is always the danger of running over someone attempting to pass from between the autos to the other side.

And while upon the subject, we might add that a dimmer ordinance would be timely. The bright electric lights glaring into the eyes of an approaching automobilist is some day going to cause one of the drivers to go into the ditch with serious consequences. By coating the upper half of the lights their usefulness would not be impaired and the light would be thrown on the ground a sufficient distance in front of the car for proper guidance and observation.

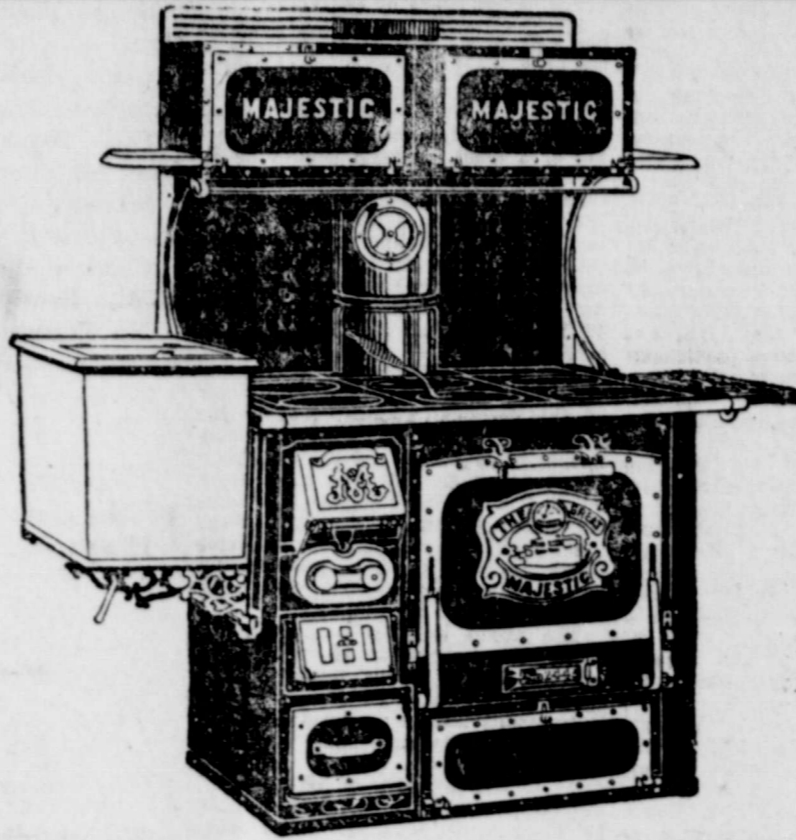

President Ripley States Santa Fe's Position on Eight-Hour Wage Law and Asks an Important Question.

The Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Co.

Chicago, Ill., September 8, 1916.

To the Santa Fe Employees and the Public:

This is the position of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company regarding the controversy with its train-service employes over their demand for increased compensation:

Congress, hastily acting under a threat of four leaders of labor organizations, enacted a so-called eight-hour law, which is nothing more nor less than an advance of twenty to twenty-five per cent in the wages of the best paid men in railway service.

It is only fair to our employes and the public to say that the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company does not intend to comply with the law except as and when ordered to do so by the court of last resort.

The merits of the case have been fully explained in the last few months and need no further mention.

Should the courts finally decide that the increase must be paid, there will be an immediate demand from the remaining classes of labor, resulting in entire inability to pay without heavy increases in rates to be paid by the public—especially the farming class.

An Ordinance.

Regulating the hitching of horses and other animals, the standing of vehicles and automobiles, and regulating the driving of vehicles and automobiles, in the City of Brady, Texas, and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, and providing a penalty.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Brady, Texas:

That from and after the passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to hitch any Horse, Mule or any other Animal or Animals, or any team of Horses, Mules or any other Animals, or to leave standing or let stand any Horse or Mule or any other Animal, or any team of Horses, Mule or any other Animal or Vehicle of any kind or any Automobile or Motor Vehicle of any kind, for a period of longer than 20 minutes, on any of the following streets or sections of streets, in the City of Brady, Texas, to-wit:

On North Bridge Street between North First Street and Main Street; on Main Street between Church Street and Elm Street; on Commerce Street between Church Street and Pecan Street; on Blackburn Street between Main Street and South Second Street.

Provided however, that this Ordinance shall not be construed as to prohibit the hitching of Horses, Mules or other Animals to the hitching rack around the Court House Square as it now exists.

And provided, that under this Ordinance, any person or persons, shall have the right to park his or her Vehicle or Automobile next to said hitching rack around the said Public Square in the City of Brady, Texas.

From and after the passage of this Ordinance, any person or persons, driving any vehicle of any kind or any Automobile, shall keep to the right and shall drive on the right hand side of the Street only, and shall not turn around except at corners of blocks, and shall before turning, give a signal by holding out his or her hand on the side to which he or she wishes to turn; And provided, that no person shall at any time when driving any vehicle of any kind or Automobile, turn across any street in the City of Brady, without first having given a signal by holding out his or her hand on the side to which he or she wishes to turn.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances of the City of Brady, in conflict herewith are hereby directly repealed.

Any person or persons, violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not more than \$5.00.

first be built according to the standard set by the government. In speaking of the efforts to build roads by precincts, Mr. Hernan said a good road was only as good as its worst place; hence no matter if one precinct had a splendid road, unless adjoining precincts had one just as good the road was to be considered only as bad. Mr. Hernan remarked that he had noted the attempts of McCulloch county to build up its roads by precincts—and emphasized the word "attempt."

He urged that Brady and all points in McCulloch county join in a good roads organization, affiliate with the Texas Good Roads association, which in turn would give them recognition by the National Good Roads association. He stressed the importance of this affiliation for the reason that unless all points along the National Highway cooperated and used their influence to one purpose, it would be a comparatively easy matter for one big city to develop enough influence to override one section or one small community. He stated further that the citizens should give more than passive interest to this proposition, and that a National highway was of more importance and benefit to a community than a great trunk railway—yes, even two trunk railways.

Mr. Grant, as chairman, then called attention to the fact that Brady and McCulloch county had an opportunity to become a part of not only the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway, but of the Great Plains highway, and of the highway now proposed to run from Brady via Brownwood to Fort Worth.

F. M. Newman proposed the organization of a McCulloch County Highway league, and the proposal was speedily acted upon. T. P. Grant was unanimously chosen president, Sam McCollum, vice president, and J. T. Freeman, was chosen secretary-treasurer.

A call for members resulted in a rush, not only from Brady citizens, but from practically every community represented in the meeting, a total of 78 names being registered. Fredonia's delegation deemed their interests lay more closely with those of Brady and accordingly placed their membership here. Membership fee was placed at \$5.00.

TO REBUILD CHURCH.

Baptist Congregation Raising Fund for Improvement.

The members of the First Baptist church of Brady are actively at work upon the solicitation of funds for the purpose of rebuilding and enlarging their church upon plans outlined several months ago in The Standard. Mrs. J. L. Jordan is chairman of a committee which is raising the required funds, and at a committee meeting recently reported \$2,000 having already been subscribed. It is expected to increase this subscription to \$3,000, which sum will be required to complete the rebuilding.

The plans of improvement, as now contemplated, will convert the present building into a modern and commodious edifice, with basement Sunday school rooms and a gallery, which may be used as Sunday school rooms and as part of the church auditorium. Two entrances will also be provided, one on the west and another on the south side, and the chancel and choir loft will be located in the north end of the edifice.

The present plans contemplate merely the rebuilding of the church building, and the matter of furnishing the church will be left to some future date, the present furniture being used in the meantime. A feature of the improvement is that it will be possible at some later date to place a brick veneer on the building, which would transform it into a substantial and thoroughly modern edifice.

The work of rebuilding will be taken up immediately upon the securing of the necessary funds.

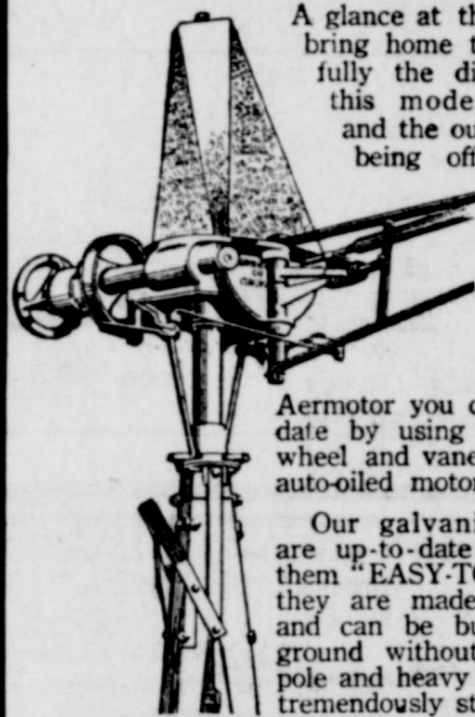
