McCULLOCH GETS RAIN

ALL PARTS OF COUNTY VISITED BY DOWNPOUR.

Between Three and Four Inches Had at Lohn—Tanks Filled to Overflowing.

The most welcome rain in a long period fell Sunday night and part of Monday morning, and from reports the downpour was general throughout this section. Probably the heaviest rain was had in the Lohn community, the total precipitation having been something like three or four inches, and tanks in that community were filled to overflowing.

In Brady the total rainfall amounted to 1.2 inches. At Brownwood 1.1 inches fell, and at Mercury, Rochelle and intermediate points heavy rains were had. Whiteland, Melvin and Eden also report good rains and Paint Rock, San Angelo, Ballinger and Coleman received good rains, while out at Sweetwater the rain was lighter. Menard had a good rain, as did also Calf Creek, Voca, Mason and other points to the south. East good rains were had at San Saba, Lometa, Goldthwaite and Lampasas.

A severe electrical storm accompanied the rain at Brownwood, and about 75 telephones were put temporarily out of commission, trees were blown and a flying piece of timber tore a hole in the Walker-Smith building at that place. Two telephone poles between Brownwood and Ballinger, and one between Brownwood and Brady were struck by lightning and destroyed. Three different sections in Rannels county were visited by hail, the estimated

damage being \$100,000.

Something over a foot of water was put in Brady dam by the rain, which will materially increase the supply available for home consumption. Practically all of the water in the dam came out of Post Oak creek, for while much water was put in Brady creek farther up, there were so many dry holes that the creek did not run through.

Not only does the rain relieve the water situation, which had become quite serious throughout the county, but it will be of great benefit to small grain and pasture. The dry weather has enabled farmers to keep pretty well up with their cotton, and while the rain will stop picking to some extent for a few days, no great damage is estimated as having been done to that crop.

10 to 15 Bales Destroyed in Cotton Yard.

Fire was discovered in the Mercury public cotton yard between 1:00 and 2:00 o'clock Monday morning. Public Weigher A. J. Beasley, assisted by a dozen neighbors, did some heroic work in fighting the flames by hand, and aided by the heavy rain, which came up opportunely, succeeded in saving the greater portion of the cotton in the yard. Between ten and fifteen bales were destroyed, entailing a heavy loss upon the owners. No cause for the fire is known.

COTTON IN McCULLOCH.

2004 Bales Ginned to September 1st—195 Last Year.

The rapidity with which cotton has been gathered during the long dry spell is exemplified in the U. S. government's report on the ginnings prior to September 1st. In McCulloch county 2004 bales were ginned, as compared with 495 at a corresponding time last year. The total ginnings in the state of Texas amounted to 521,550 bales, as compared with 271,328 bales ginned up to September 1 in 1915.

GRAND JURY'S REPORT

ELEVEN BILLS—FOUR FELONIES, 6 MISDEMEANORS.

Body Calls Attention of Road Overseers to Complaints of Neglect of Public Roads.

The grand jury completed a week of strenuous work Saturday, having examined witnesses from far and near. Eleven true bills were found—four for felonies and seven for misdemeanors, none of which have, so far, been given out.

The following is the report of the grand jury:

To the Hon. John W. Goodwin, District Judge:

We, your grand jurors, duly organized and impaneled as such for the September term of our district court, 1916, respectfully submit to you the following report of our labors:

We have been in session for six days and have examined about 120 witnesses, from all parts of the county. We have made a thorough sifting of all alleged offenses that have come to our knowledge, and we are glad to report that our county is in good shape in regard to crime, with the exception of a few isolated cases of petty theft. As a result of our work, we have found eleven bills, four felonies and seven misdemeanors. We find that the officers throughout the county have been active in their work after violators of the law, and as a result the work of the grand jury has been quite light, considering the population of our county.

We find the court house in good condition, with the exception of the plastering on the walls, and we recommend that the commissioners court give this matter immediate attention, to the end that the plastering may be repaired before it gets in such a condition as to require a large expenditure of money. We have also visited the jail and wish to especially commend the condition of the same as being in excellent sanitary condition, and we find only three prisoners in same and find they are well cared for and the jail in all respects is in good shape.

We have had some complaints brought to our attention concerning the condition of our public roads, and we feel sure that some of our road overseers have been careless in the performance of duty, and we hope by calling their attention to the matter in this way that they will be more careful in the future. We do not at the present, however, feel that any of them have been negligent to the extent as to justify an indictment.

In conclusion, we wish to say that we are gratified at the general conditions of our county with reference to violations of law, and we wish to commend the excellent and efficient work of all our officers, both district and county. We also wish to thank Your Honor for the courtesies and kindness shown us.

INJUNCTION GRANTED.

Restrains Commissioners From Executing Bridge Contract.

District Judge John W. Goodwin last week issued an order restraining the commissioners court of Coleman county from executing a contract for repairs on Coleman county bridges calling for an expenditure of \$12,951 in rebuilding and making repairs on five bridges in that county. The injunction was issued upon the petition of Coleman's county judge, W. Marcus Weathered, as a private citizen, and in addition to the commissioners, was directed against Austin Bros. Bridge Co. Bond in the sum of \$500, as required by law, was made by Mr. Weathered.

In his petition the plaintiff alleges in substance that Coleman county operates under a special road law which requires commissioners courts to advertise for bids and to let to lowest bidder all contracts for work on roads and bridges, where the amount exceeds \$200.00, and at time of making contract to have the county treasurer set aside a special fund to provide payment for such contract.

The petition alleges that the contract cited in this suit was entered into between Austin Bros. and D. T. Gillis, S. H. Thurman and Lewis C. Crowder, members of the commissioners court, without bids being advertised for and over the protest of plaintiff and J. S. Gilmore, members of said court, and without creating any fund for the payment of such debt or setting aside any portion of the tax levy. That the action of the said three members of the court is illegal and a conversion of funds, tending to unjustly increase the burden of taxation, and plaintiff asks for injunction against defendants restraining them from performing the contract in any particular, and for a cancellation of the contract.

Judge Weathered says that, upon his own initiative, he had a competent engineer to visit the five bridges under contract for repairs and that said engineer agreed to make the repairs as specified in the contract with Austin Bros. for \$10,200, which is \$2,751 less than the contract entered into by the court with Austin Bros., the consideration of such contract being for \$12,951.
