Democrats Show Great Gain—Republicans Increase.

The Democratic electors polled a total of 841 votes in McCulloch county, the Republican electors, 62 and the Socialist electors 119. The amendment lost in the county by a vote of 383 to 449. The vote shows a great increase in Democratic votes polled; the Republicans show over five times as many votes and the Socialists show a decrease

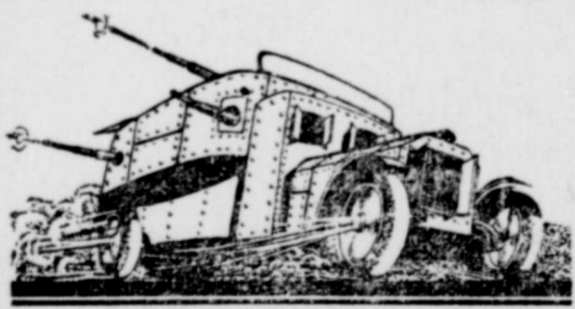

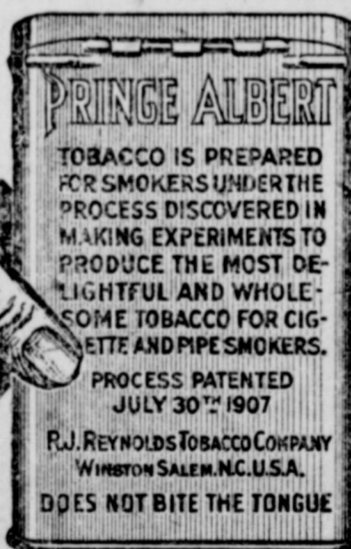

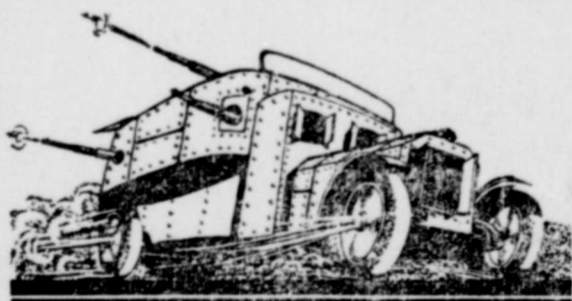

GETTING BUSY.

As an example of their earnestness in the work of road improvement, the Mason County Highway league recently held a meeting, at which committees were appointed as provided for in the constitution and by-laws of that organization. The committees named were an executive committee, committee on Road Administration, committee on Road Construction and Maintenance, committee on Road Materials. The various committees work both independently and in harmony with the main body. One regular meeting night in each month was named for the league.

There is a vast amount of work to be done in each of the various counties through which the National highways propose to pass. There is nothing better than acting while public sentiment is crystallized upon the subject, and in this the Mason county league has set an example worthy of emulation.

Human nature is a remarkable thing. Take an instance that occurred just the other day. Herbert Dodd, who was tried in Austin last week for the murder of Cashier Heinatz when the First National bank at Marble Falls was robbed one year ago, was sentenced to 50 years in the penitentiary. For the same offense his brother, Lewis Dodd, some time ago was sentenced to the penitentiary for 99 years. Herbert Dodd was overjoyed at the result of the trial, and gleefully remarked that he could stand on his head for that long a time. Almost in the same breath he maintained his innocence. The Standard editor is not in position to judge, but Dodd's action is that of a guilty man who is overjoyed at the poor consolation of having saved his worthless neck. To the most of us, the prospect of spending the next fifty years of our lives in a penitentiary would seem like the knell of doom. Yet it was music in the ears of the poor wretch who stood at the bar of justice. Life is never so sweet as when, in the prime and full vigor of life, we are called upon to forfeit it.

CONFIRMS IMPROVEMENTS.

F. W. Greber Gives Assurance of Modern Telephone System

F. W. Greber, general manager, and S. A. McKie, plant superintendent of the West Texas Telephone Co., were here from Brownwood yesterday, and in a conversation with the editor Mr. Greber confirmed our "suspicions" regarding a new phone system for Brady, as outlined in our Tuesday issue. Mr. Greber and Mr. McKie had just returned from Menard, where their construction force is completing some improvements, and this force will be moved within the next week or so to Brady to begin outside work preparatory to the installing of the new system.

Mr. Greber says he was fortunate in buying the new equipment for the local office, having contracted for the same last March, before the great advance in metals. While the cost of improvements is placed at \$13,500, this estimate is merely preliminary, and will approximate more nearly \$16,500, inasmuch as the entire office and business equipment, as well as the phone boxes will be new. Mr. Greber feels justified in making the expenditure, even though it gives them an investment in advance of the town's growth, by reason of the excellent and permanent quarters secured. The only change in rates will be those of the business phones, which will be uniformly \$3.00 per month, the same as in all the towns where the West Texas has central energy systems.

Mr. Greber was also enthusiastic over the road building contemplated throughout this section. He states that it is estimated \$500,000 will be required to improve the seven main highways in Brown county, and that the good roads advocates there had devised plans whereby this work could be accomplished without making the cost burdensome. He mentioned the fact that eleven new buildings were now in course of construction in Brownwood, and gave as his opinion that the present building boom in Brady is just beginning of a series of building and growth that has prevailed in all live towns of Central West Texas.

COTTON STATISTICS.

McCulloch County Ginned 14,079 Bales Prior to Oct. 18.

The bureau of census of the U. S. department of commerce announces that a total of 2,846,646 bales of cotton were ginned in Texas prior to October 18th, as compared with 2,001,416 bales at a corresponding time last year. The figures are in running bales, counting round bales as half bales, and linters not being included.

In McCulloch county the report shows a total of 14,079 bales ginned as compared with 10,815 bales last year.

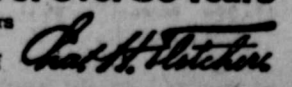

GETTING BUSY.

As an example of their earnestness in the work of road improvement, the Mason County Highway league recently held a meeting, at which committees were appointed as provided for in the constitution and by-laws of that organization. The committees named were an executive committee, committee on Road Administration, committee on Road Construction and Maintenance, committee on Road Materials. The various committees work both independently and in harmony with the main body. One regular meeting night in each month was named for the league.

There is a vast amount of work to be done in each of the various counties through which the National highways propose to pass. There is nothing better than acting while public sentiment is crystallized upon the subject, and in this the Mason county league has set an example worthy of emulation.

CONFIRMS IMPROVEMENTS.

F. W. Greber Gives Assurance of Modern Telephone System

F. W. Greber, general manager, and S. A. McKie, plant superintendent of the West Texas Telephone Co., were here from Brownwood yesterday, and in a conversation with the editor Mr. Greber confirmed our "suspicions" regarding a new phone system for Brady, as outlined in our Tuesday issue. Mr. Greber and Mr. McKie had just returned from Menard, where their construction force is completing some improvements, and this force will be moved within the next week or so to Brady to begin outside work preparatory to the installing of the new system.

Mr. Greber says he was fortunate in buying the new equipment for the local office, having contracted for the same last March, before the great advance in metals. While the cost of improvements is placed at \$13,500, this estimate is merely preliminary, and will approximate more nearly \$16,500, inasmuch as the entire office and business equipment, as well as the phone boxes will be new. Mr. Greber feels justified in making the expenditure, even though it gives them an investment in advance of the town's growth, by reason of the excellent and permanent quarters secured. The only change in rates will be those of the business phones, which will be uniformly \$3.00 per month, the same as in all the towns where the West Texas has central energy systems.

Mr. Greber was also enthusiastic over the road building contemplated throughout this section. He states that it is estimated \$500,000 will be required to improve the seven main highways in Brown county, and that the good roads advocates there had devised plans whereby this work could be accomplished without making the cost burdensome. He mentioned the fact that eleven new buildings were now in course of construction in Brownwood, and gave his opinion that the present building boom in Brady is just beginning of a series of building and growth that has prevailed in all live towns of Central West Texas.

The figures are in running bales, counting round bales as half bales, and linters not being included.

In McCulloch county the report shows a total of 14,079 bales ginned as compared with 10,815 bales last year.

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
