T. P. GRANT MAKES REPORT ON EXTENSIVE TOUR.

Accompanied Messrs. D. E. Colp and E. J. Hernan on Trip Over Southern National Highway to El Paso.

T. P. Grant returned Tuesday morning from a five weeks' trip over the route of the Southern National Highway from Ft.

Washington, D. C., following Mr. Hernan's return to San Antonio.

Not only is the new route as short as the route of the Southern National Highway running from Fort Worth to El Paso via Eastland, Sweetwater, Abilene, and Midland, but with the contemplated road improvement in Brown and other counties between Brady and Fort Worth, and with the work to be done in McCulloch and Menard counties during the coming year, Mr. Grant is firmly of the opinion

At a meeting of the McCulloch County Highway league at the court house yesterday afternoon, Mr. Grant, aroused the greatest of enthusiasm by his report. Through the activity of Mr. Grant Brady has been placed on a new route from Ft. Worth to El Paso, the route running from Fort Worth to Brownwood, thence to Brady, Menard, Sonora, Ozona and Ft. Stockton to El Paso. This route has been placed on the official maps sent by Mr. Hernan to the National Highway league at

that it will become the more popular of the two, inasmuch as it will avoid the bad sand stretches of the northern route. As soon as the local road is put in shape, Mr. Grant states he will be willing to challenge the parties on the old route for a race, and he is confident that better time can be made from Fort Worth to El Paso over the new route.

The good roads movement has bro't other possibilities in store for Brady and McCulloch county. Eastland county is now beginning an extensive good roads improvement, and coupled with the improvements to be made in Brown county, McCulloch county will be placed on the direct route of all tourist travel from Mineral Wells to

Mr. Grant sees great possibilities for McCulloch county during the next few years. The Melvin citizens are alive and awake to good road possibilities and are actively at work on a bond issue for road improvement. An effort will be made also to vote bonds for the road improvement in the Voca and Camp San Saba communities, and with the funds available from the special 15c road tax next year a great amount of road improvement and building will be done in Commissioners Precinct No. 1.

The active co-operation of all the citizens is needed to maintain Brady's enviable position as the center of the half dozen or more highways now proposed, and the Highway league will

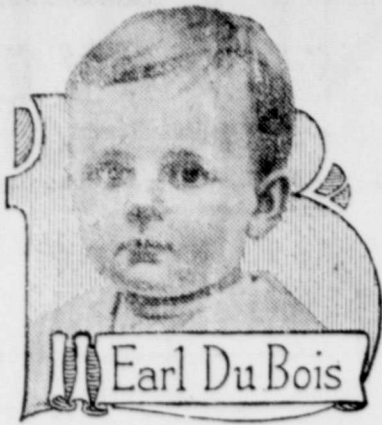

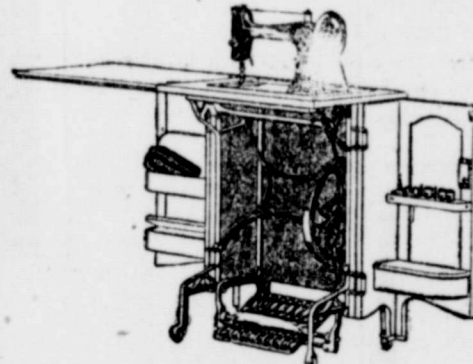
