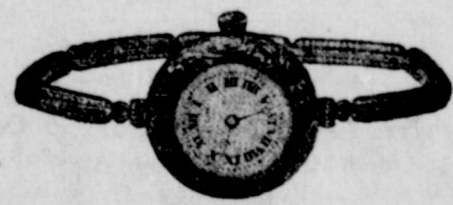

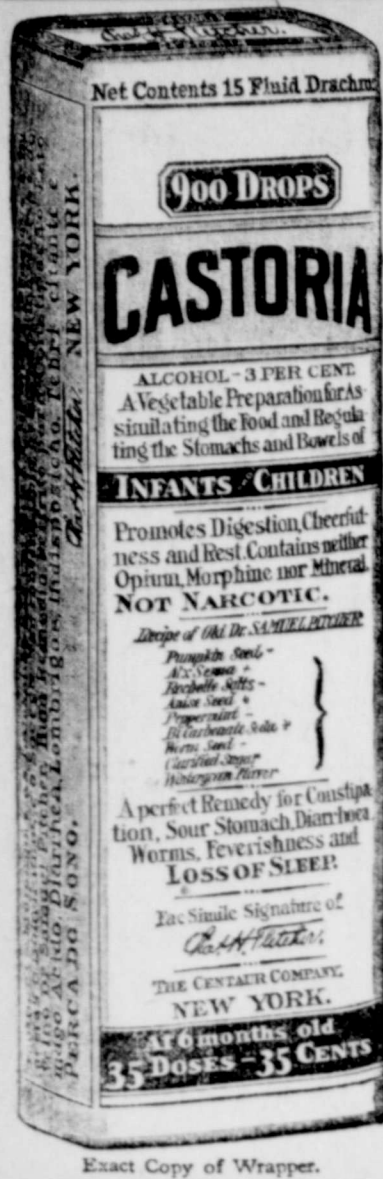

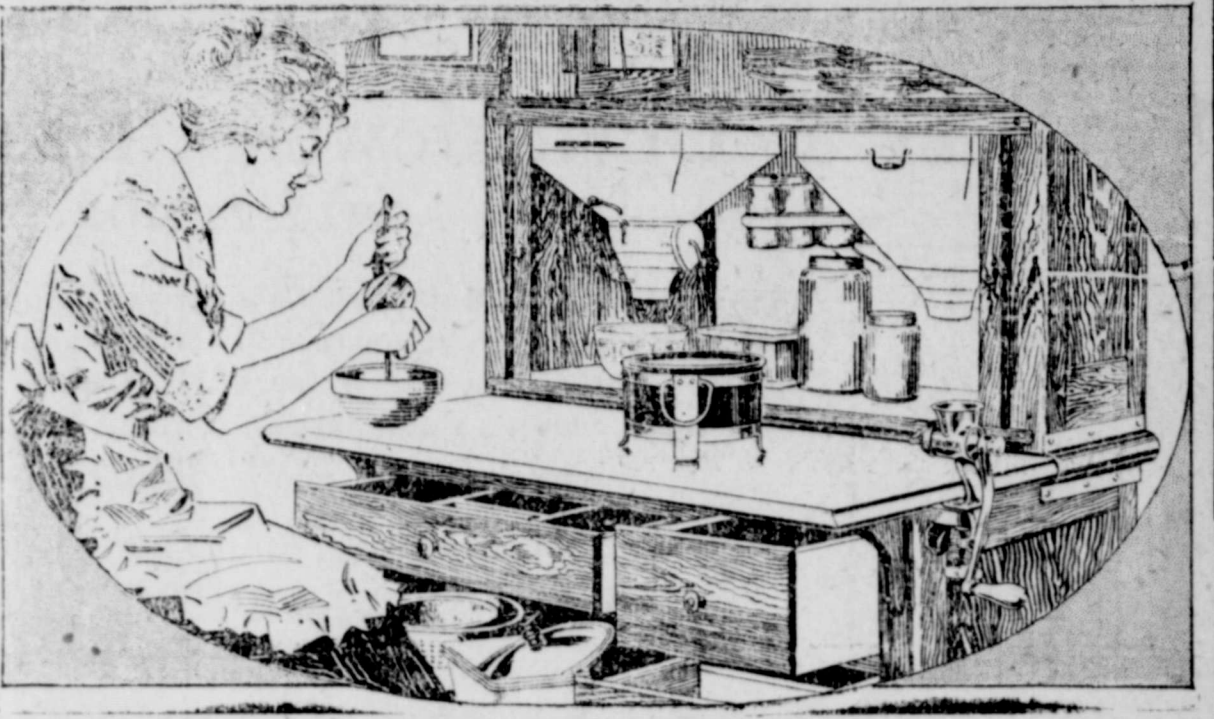

### WILL IMPROVE ROADS.

#### Commissioner Carroll Buys New Engine and Grader.

Commissioner J. M. Carroll was in from Lohm Wednesday, and in the course of conversation stated that he had just placed the order for an oil pull engine and grader, which he expects to put on the roads in his precinct immediately upon its arrival next week. The new engine develops 25 horse-power, while the grader used will make a 10-ft. cut. By using this grader as much work can be done in one day as could be accomplished with good teams in three days, and the cost of operation will be less.

At the last term of the commissioners court, the road funds were divided among the four commissioners precincts in proportion to the assessed valuation in each precinct, and such sum was placed in the hands of the commissioner for use as his best judgment dictated. Everyone realizes that good schools and good roads are the two most important benefits to be derived from the expenditure of public funds, and no one realizes this more than does Mr. Carroll. On account of the high prices of feed and every manner of commodity, it is a practical impossibility to get any man to place a good team on road work at the established rate of \$3.00 per day. In view of this, Mr. Carroll's solution of the problem of building and maintaining good roads in his precinct is highly commendable and praiseworthy.

It is the intention of Commissioner H. E. McBride to follow the same line of procedure with respect to his precinct. Commissioner Chas. Samuelson is also contemplating the sale of the big and unwieldy road engine now in his possession, and the purchase of a lighter engine which would better serve his purpose. With all the commissioners alive to the urgent necessity of good roads building, it is certain that the coming year will see all the main highways of the county placed in first-class shape.

#### TICK ERADICATION

The citizens of McCulloch county are to vote upon the question of Tick Eradication on December 30th. The Standard editor has been of the opinion that tick eradication is a good thing for any community, and we have heretofore urged the necessity of holding such election. However, there appears to be a more than passing opposition to the move, and various plausible arguments have been advanced against the eradication movement.

The Standard's interest in the matter is not personal. On the contrary, it is prompted by a desire to further the interests of the county and the citizens thereof. Experiments by government officials tend to prove the advisability of removing the

ticks. The Standard has a mass of such evidence on hand. Yet claims are advanced that the benefits do not overcome the inconveniences and losses occasioned.

In matters of this kind, the interests that are in the majority should be served. If greater benefit will accrue from eradicating the tick, than will be had from the present status, then the citizens should vote for eradication.

In order to allow a full discussion of the merits, pro and con, of the issue, The Standard invites partisans to present their views through these columns. Such articles should be brief, and to the point, and the length must be limited to 300 words. Personal abuse and slurring references will not be permitted.

The two weekly papers at Dublin have been consolidated, the Progress absorbing the Telephone, and with but one paper in the field, the town and community should be greatly benefited in that the Progress will be strengthened by the undivided support which the merchants will now be enabled to give it. W. C. Huchingson, formerly editor of the Dublin Telephone, has been editing the San Saba Star the past year or more, and his disposal of his Dublin interests leads us to believe that he is now permanently located as our neighbor.

#### A CREMATORY

On January 1, 1917, the state law goes into effect requiring all towns and communities to cease draining of sewage into creeks and rivers. A heavy penalty is attached for violations. The Brady city council has for some time had under advisement the building of a crematory here, as the cheapest and most effective method of disposing of sewage. The septic tank has proven very efficient upon a small basis, but its efficiency and success when operated upon a large scale is to be doubted.

Other methods have been tried out, but have been found too expensive for a small city.

In this connection it may be well to direct attention to the statement made in a recent issue of the Brownwood Bulletin, in the mention of the disposition of carcasses of cattle recently frozen to death. The statement was as follows:

"The crematory here has proven very successful. The fourteen animals burned last night were cremated with only ten gallons of kerosene oil, costing \$1.50. If a load or two of trash had been available, the animals could easily have been burned without additional fuel."

The statement is of more than ordinary interest inasmuch as it clearly demonstrates two facts: The effectiveness of disposing of the articles to be cremated, and the decidedly low cost of operating the crematory.

The Brown county commissioners court is at loggerheads over a proposed issue of \$100,000 in road warrants for the purpose of building good roads in Brown county. Three of the commissioners signed the contract with a firm, who purchased the bonds at par, and who have contracted to do the work upon a certain basis. The county judge and one commissioner opposed the warrant issue, but nevertheless signed the contract, since the majority of the court had already done so. The citizens are now threatening to sue out an injunction to prevent the contract from being carried out. The general opinion seems to be in favor of bond issue. It is pointed out that road warrants are to be issued only in case of emergency, for instance: If a county had been bonded for road improvement and the bonds are not quite sufficient to complete the road building, then the warrants are advisable.
