Another Step Taken Toward Clinic **Group Elects** Committee

Another step was taken toward building a clinic in Bovina Friday night.

At a meeting of some 35 citizens who are interested in the project it was agreed to adopt the Sears-Roebuck Foundation plan for raising the necessary funds and constructing the building.

An executive committee, composed of seven members was elected at the Friday night meeting which was in the Community Room of First State Bank.

Named to the executive committee were BedfordCaldwell, Bob Estes, Earl Stevenson, Billy Marshall, Mrs. Jess Walling, Leon Grissom and Grady Sorley.

The committee will serve until the money has been raised. Then, a permanent executive committee will be elected by the people who "buy stock" in the clinic.

Additional information and materials needed to proceed with the fund-raising have been requested from the Sears Foundation in Chicago. The materials are expected to arrive here this week. A meeting of the executive committee then is expected to launch the fund-raising drive.

According to Sears plan, approximately \$50,000 is needed to build and equip the clinic.

The plan was explained to citizens of the community several weeks ago by Norman Davis of Chicago, director of the medical program of the Foundation.

Certificates of indebtedness are scheduled to be sold in multiples of \$25 to area residents. The holders will be repaid from rent from the clinic building and/or upon sale of the clinic to a doctor, who will have a five-year option to





Philip was one of them that were scattered by persecution, from Jerusalem; as he went about, he preached the Word, or saying it another way, He preached Christ. Now read verse 12 of Acts eight, "But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized both men and women." When one believes he will want to be baptized. If he does not believe the preaching about Jesus he might even argue that one does not have to be baptized to be saved.
