RECORD GOLD SPELL

MERCURY DROPS NEARLY SIXTY DEGREES.

Thermometer Registered 12 Degrees Above Zero Thursday Morning, Freezing All Day

The coldest spell of the season went on record Thursday morning when a temperature of 12 degrees above zero was recorded about town, and 16 degrees was officially registered at the Queen hotel. The coldest weather heretofore recorded was 22 degrees above zero.

Following the summer-like weather of Tuesday and Wednesday, the change registered a sheer drop in temperature of about 60 degrees from Wednesday afternoon, when the thermometer registered over 70 degrees until Thursday morning's record of 12 degrees.

A slight norther appearing at 4:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon gave the first intimation of the coming cold blast, but at that many folks were unprepared for the severity of the blast, and frozen water pipes are to be found all over the city. Despite the clear, sunny atmosphere yesterday, the weather continued at a freezing point throughout the day, 29 degrees Fahrenheit being reported at 5:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

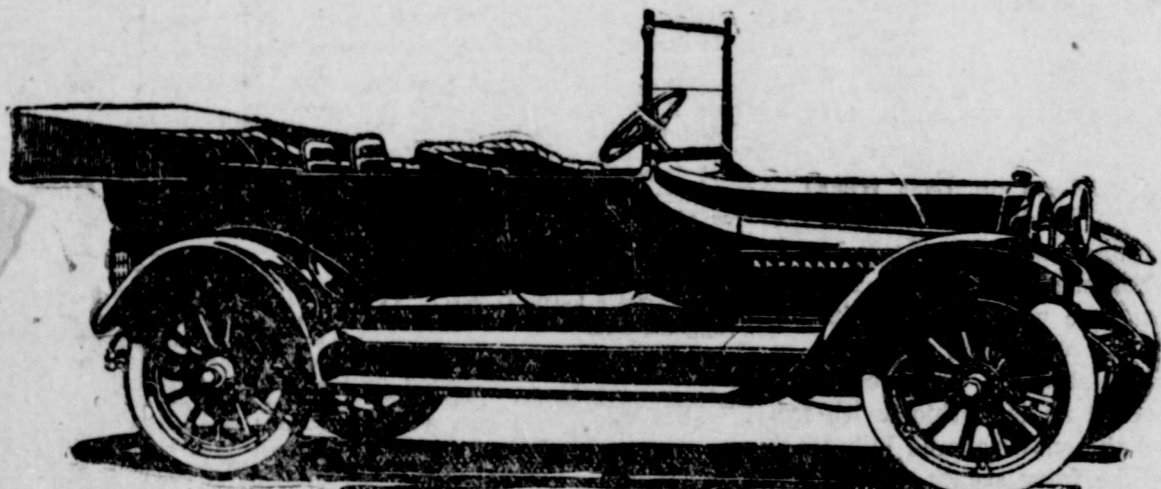

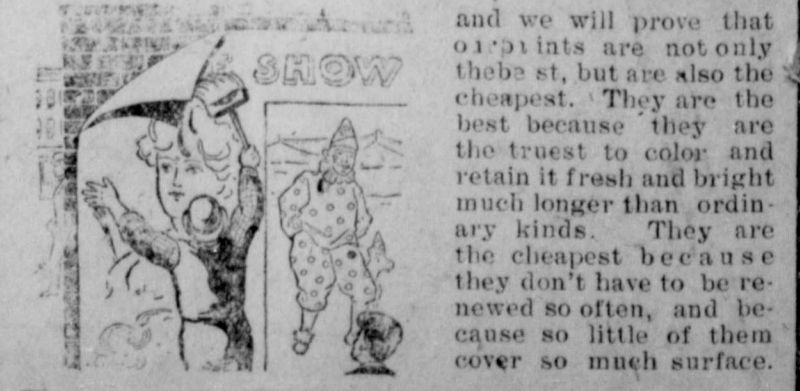

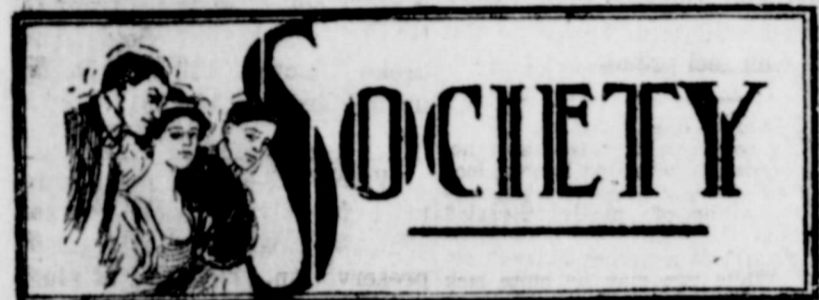

Bethlehem's Bid on Shells for the United States Navy

To the American People:
The Secretary of the Navy has awarded contracts amounting to over \$3,000,000 to a British bidder for 14 and 16-inch projectiles for the Navy because of very much lower prices offered by the English bidders.

We know nothing of the basis upon which the British bids were made, but the public is entitled to know the facts upon which we ourselves bid for this work.

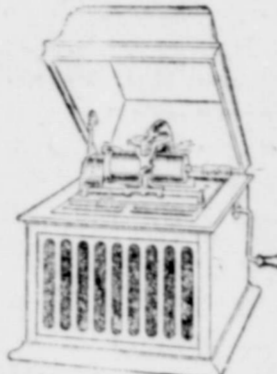
Two years ago we took contracts to make 4,200 14-inch shells at a price of \$1,515,000. Up to now not a single shell has been accepted by the Government, although we have expended, in wages, materials, etc., on these orders \$522,581, and we have not received a SINGLE DOLLAR on these contracts.

In addition, a literal interpretation of the contract might make us liable for penalties amounting to \$175,010.

In the light of our experience, and having no other basis, we bid for 16-inch shells approximately the same rate per pound as that which the Navy Department actually awarded a 14-inch shell contract one year ago.

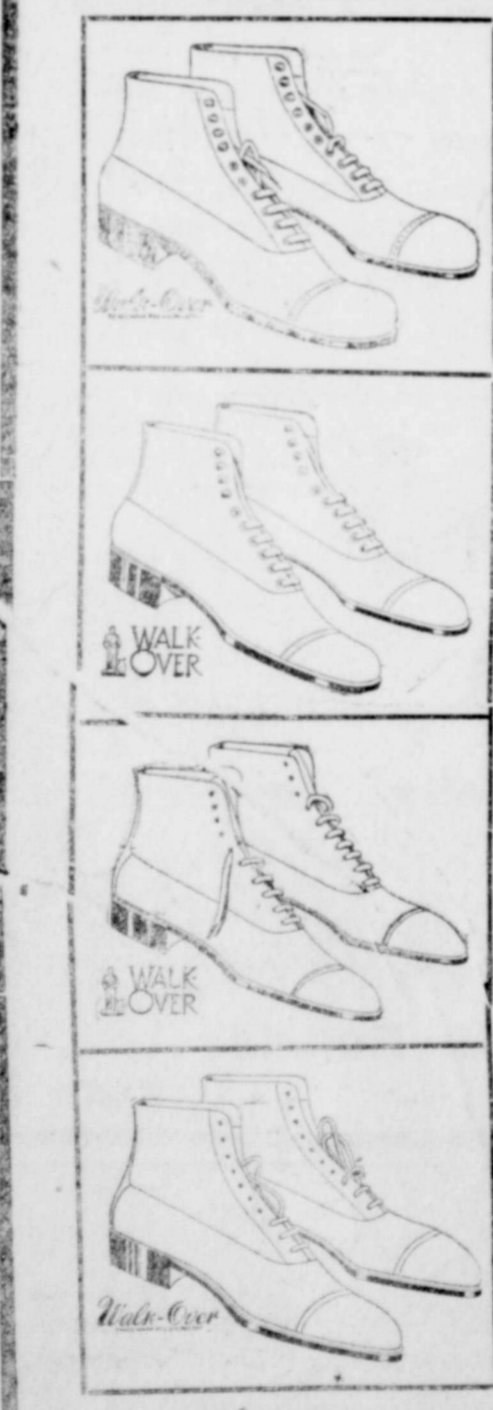
