TWO PLEAS OF GUILTY NEW PHONE SYSTEM

SENTENCE GIVEN CHARLIE SELLMAN AND MEXICAN. IN OPERATION BY APRIL 15TH IS PLAN.

Former Draws Two Years for Theft of Horse, Latter Two Years Each on Two Counts Switchboard Arrived Yesterday—15 Days Required to Complete the Transferring.

The grand jury, which continued in session all last week, resumed its labors Monday and up to noon today had not yet adjourned. Difficulty and delay in securing the presence of desired witnesses has made their progress slow and tedious. So far the following indictments have been returned into court: Valentine Sancedo, forgery, three counts; Andrez Munoz, assault to murder; Charlie Sellman, theft of horse, two counts; I. H. White, burglary.

A plea of guilty was entered in court Monday by Valentine Sancedo in two cases of forgery, and sentence of two years in the penitentiary was imposed in each case. The prisoner accepted immediate sentence.

Charlie Sellman entered a plea of guilty on one charge of theft of horse, and accepted immediate sentence of two years in the penitentiary imposed by the court.

WILL MARSDEN DEAD

PASSED AWAY FRI. NIGHT—FUNERAL SUN. EVE.

Well Known Throughout County—Large Concourse of Friends Pay Last Respect to Dead.

The Grim Reaper last Friday night at 7:30 o'clock removed from our midst one of Brady's most popular and highly esteemed citizens—Will Marsden. His death occurred at the family residence after an illness of three weeks, during which he fought bravely against the ravages of Bright's disease, with which he had suffered for a number of years. The end came peacefully, and for the last three days he lay in a semi-conscious state.

Will Marsden was born in Bee county, coming here with his parents in 1885. For the past 22 years he had been prominently identified with the educational interests of the county, teaching in various of the public schools, and for the past year and one-half he held the position of principal of the Brady school. He was everywhere recognized as an educator of great ability, and his universal popularity was attested by the large throngs of citizens, not only of Brady, but from all parts of the county, who attended the funeral and paid their last respect to the dead.

Mr. Marsden was a member of the Woodmen of the World and the I. O. O. F., and both of these organizations, in full regalia and with banners and flags draped, marched in the funeral procession. The Rebekahs also marched in a body to the residence. Messrs. Virgil Jones, John Starkey and E. E. Spiller, representing the Woodmen, and M. S. Sellers, Evans Adkins and J. C. Koerth, representing the Odd Fellows, acted as pall bearers.

Funeral services were held at the residence at 4:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. G. Forester delivering the funeral oration, and several hymns being sung. The Woodmen then took charge of the body with Mr. C. D. Allen Master of Ceremonies, and the procession made its way to the cemetery, where the body was committed to the grave, with the beautiful ritual of the Woodmen, the symbol of the white dove being used.

The grave was lined with flowers and evergreens, and

great masses of cut flowers and floral wreaths, including one from the Woodmen and another from the Odd Fellows, literally covered the mound.

A quartette composed of Prof. J. C. Robbins, Messrs. F. T. Fowler, C. W. Bashaw and W. J. Yantis sang several songs, closing with "Nearer, My God, to Thee," and benediction was pronounced by Rev. Forester.

PUBLICITY LAW.

The Publicity Law, providing for the publication in some county newspaper of all notices of sale, etc., (a few notices alone being excepted) has passed the house on the final reading by a large majority, and is now pending in the Senate. This law will do away with the obsolete method now being practiced of posting notices of sale in three public places.

The absurdity of the present practice has long been apparent to everyone. A certain party stated to this editor last week: "I recently had to foreclose on a piece of machinery in San Antonio, Texas. The attorney asked me if I wanted the notice of sale published in some newspaper. I told him, 'I should say not. Post the notice' in three as inconspicuous places as you can find." He did so, and the result was I bought that machine for \$500, when it would easily have brought \$1,000 had the sale been generally known."

For years just such practice has been going on. Property has been sold to the highest bidder at ridiculous figures, simply because the matter was not advertised, except by posting. Not one man in a thousand sees this notice; the sale is held unknown to all except one or two interested individuals, and the property is knocked down at figures that are ridiculous.

It is practically certain that the Publicity Law will be passed by the senate, and the general public will thereby be enabled to gain information that properly should be theirs on matters of common interest.

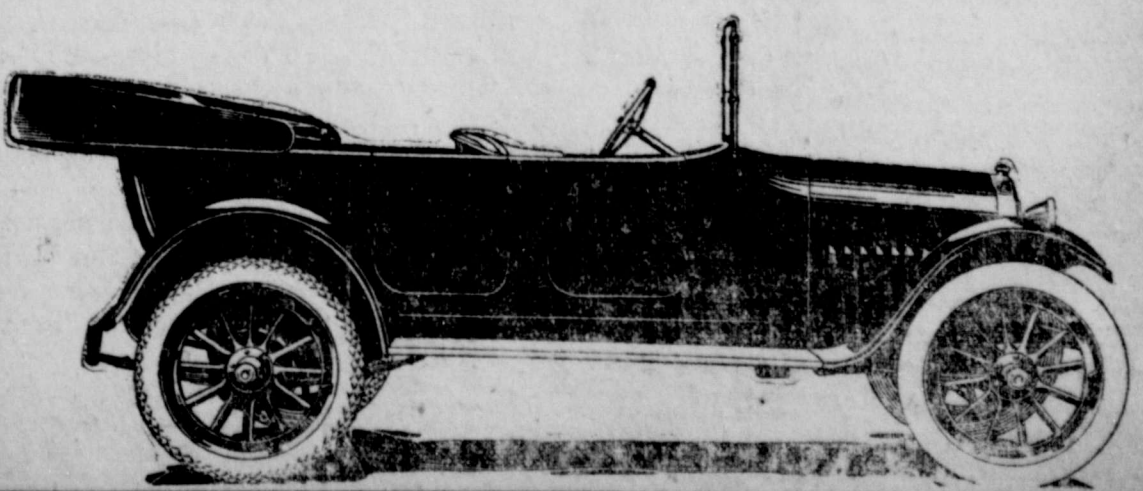

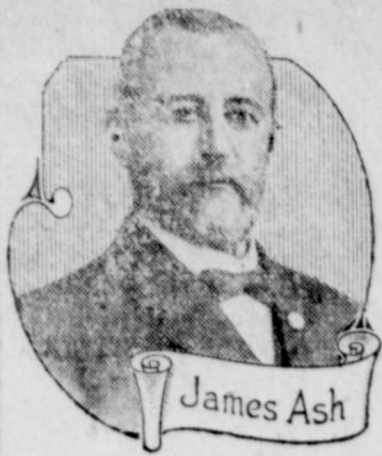

LOHN ORGANIZES.

Good Roads Club to Represent
Community.

On last Saturday afternoon a Good Roads club was organized at Lohn, following an interesting meeting in which T. P. Grant explained the need of such an organization to co-operate with other county organizations of a similar character, as well as with those of neighboring counties to assure the permanency of the Southwest Trail as now routed through this county.

The meeting was held in the new Lohn school auditorium and a good-sized audience of representative citizens was on hand to hear his address. Mr. Grant dealt at length with the subject explaining that the Southwest Trail as at first planned, contemplated a highway running from Chicago through Wichita, Kan., with an ultimate destination of California and the Pacific coast. After this trail had been established, the desirability of a connection to the south and southwest, and particularly to the Gulf Coast and Old Mexico became apparent and the matter was taken up with the Texas Good Roads association. Through a fortunate chain of circumstances, and mainly by reason of Mr. Grant's tireless and effective work, the Southwest Trail was routed from Wichita Falls down through Archer City, Albany, Baird, Coleman, Lohn, Brady, and down to San Antonio, thus establishing connection with highways to both the Gulf coast and through Laredo into Old Mexico.

The highway has already been marked from Brady to the Coleman county line, and will shortly be marked from Brady to the Mason county line. In his work which required great effort and several weeks time in all, besides innumerable trips back and forth over the route from Wichita, Kansas, to San Antonio, Mr. Grant has had the support and co-operation of the Brady Y. M. B. L., whose directors see the beginning of great possibilities for this county and this section by reason of Grant's foresight. To strengthen the local organization, and in order that all communities enroute may help in completing the work on the highway, Good Roads associations have been organized all along the line.

Lohn's response was enthusiastic. Following Mr. Grant's address Dr. J. P. Barton gave a strong endorsement of the good roads movement, and suggested the organization of a Good Roads club. This received hearty endorsement of N. J. Huie and Will Roberts, and Prof. W. W. Joyce added the finishing touch in a brief and clever talk upon the value of good roads to a community. The result was that Mr. Joyce was elected president of the Lohn Good Roads club and W. F. Roberts, Jr., secretary-treasurer. A committee of five was named by Mr. Joyce to solicit membership and contributions in order that Lohn may assist in the work yet to be done by Mr. Grant. The new highway maps show the Southwest Trail routed through McCulloch county, but other sections are desirous of securing this highway and will make every effort to do so. To keep the highway as at present routed, Mr. Grant must see to the completion of all connections as now outlined; must get every community through which the trail passes as enthusiastic over the proposition as are those alive to the importance of this route. This work will require much

time and effort, as well as expense. By earnest co-operation all this can be accomplished, and Lohn, through her new Good Roads club has pledged her assistance in the work.

Accompanying Mr. Grant to Lohn were Messrs. G. M. Bennett, Duke Mann, Howard Broad, M. S. Sellers and H. F. Schwenker.

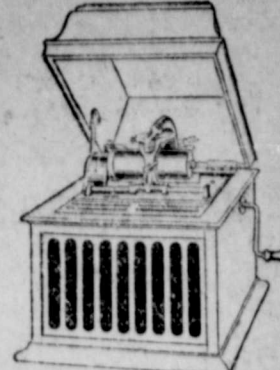

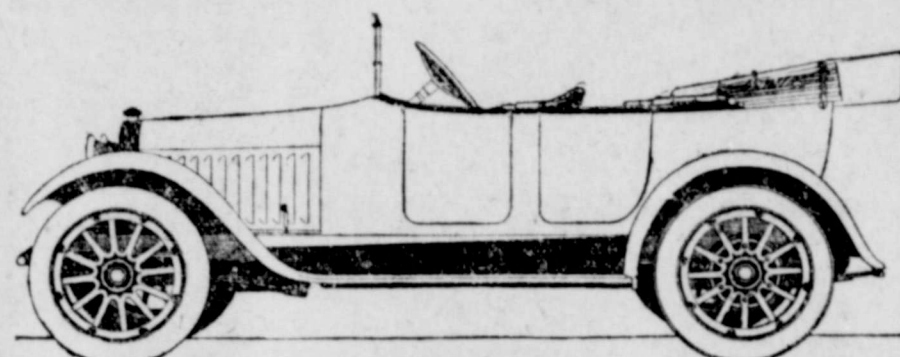
