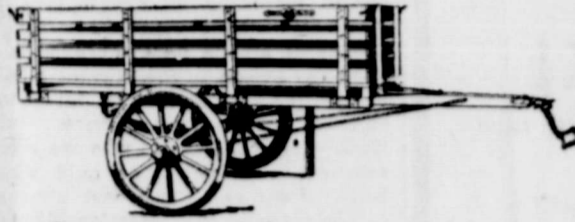
COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES THURS.

HUNG JURY IN TURMAN TRIAL

Jury Was Discharged Yesterday
After Hanging 9 to 3
Since Friday.

The case of State vs. Jim Turman, charged with murder of Will Kettner at Mason, on trial since last Tuesday at Llano went to the jury Friday evening. The jury several times reported to Judge Stubbs that they were unable to agree, having stood 9 to 3 since the first ballot. Each time they were sent back by Judge Stubbs to further consider the case. Monday it became apparent that the dead-lock could not be broken, and the jury was accordingly dismissed.

The case was a hard-fought one, and many witnesses were placed on the stand, quite a number eye-witnesses to the tragedy testifying. The case aroused much interest, and the court house was crowded at each session.

Turman has been released on his original bond, and, unless the court makes some other disposition, the case will come up for retrial at the next term of Llano district court.

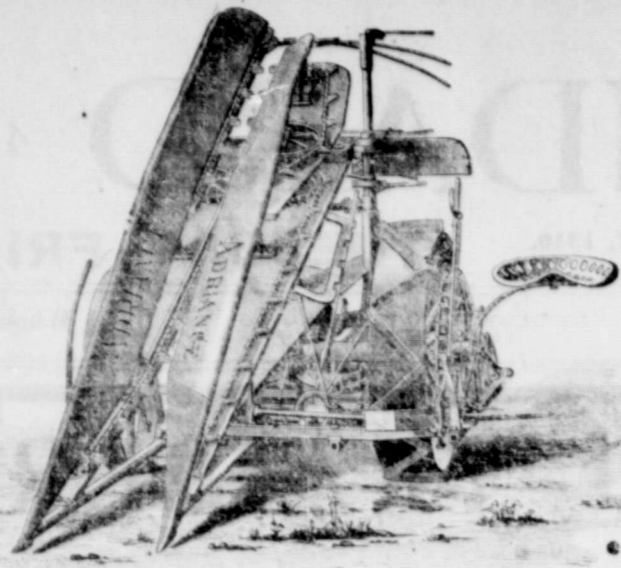

LEARN FACTS OF HEREDITY

Spread of Scientific Knowledge Has Shown That Many Wrong Ideas Have Been Held.

It has been well said that ghosts and haunted houses decrease in frequency in a definite inverse ratio to the increase of our means of lighting. No self-respecting ghost will live in a house lighted with electricity, in which the person who should receive the ghostly visitant with due awe can just lean quietly out of bed, touch a button and flash the whole room full of light. The candle-lighted dwelling was the favorite ghostly haunt. The same is true of the specter of the heredity of disease. The more light is thrown on the subject the less significance heredity has.

This is confirmed by a recent careful study in detail of the spread of tuberculosis in five counties in Minnesota made by an expert for the state department of health. Tuberculosis is proved once more by this study, as shown in the current public health reports, to be an infectious and not a hereditary disease. Only those catch the disease who are much exposed to it, and then only when both patient and those near him are careless about the infection. There is no reason for the dread of inheriting it, and no good reason for fearing its contagion if even a few reasonable precautions are taken.

WHEN AN ICEBERG COLLAPSES

Every Always Source of Great Danger to Craft That May Be in the Immediate Vicinity.

One of the main dangers in the proximity of an iceberg is its unknown extent beneath the water. It is told that the passengers of a steamboat on the Newfoundland coast successfully impounded the captain to approach an iceberg for a close inspection, says a writer in the Wide World. While still apparently sufficiently distant for safety some movement in the water or natural decay acted upon the berg, and it split apart. Instantly it began to readjust its balance. The tremendous masses beneath the water steadily rose as the pieces swung over, and one wide extending ledge came up beneath the boat. "What shall we do now?" inquired a tourist. "Get down on your knees," was the terse reply of the captain. But the great wave from the tumbling ice swept down on the boat and washed it to safety.

The collapse of an iceberg spreads danger to great distances. It may be too far distant to threaten a craft itself, but the wave it raises will swamp the largest boat in the immediate neighborhood.

CLEAN UP WEEK ON IN EARNEST

Committee Visits Every Residence in Brady and Gives Final Reminder.

Unless the unexpected happens—and there is small reason to think it will—Brady will, by the end of the week be the cleanest city in Texas—and the cleanest city it has been in years.

Last Saturday, under the efficient and earnest direction of Y. M. B. L. Secretary F. R. Wulff, the sanitary committee of the Brady council, together with members of the league, formulated plans to visit every section of Brady and notify the residents of the Clean Up campaign. This was done that there might be no excuse for anyone being ignorant of or unadvised as to the campaign for cleaning up the city. Personal visits were made to every residence and circulars were left at each door, together with an admonition where citizens had evidently made no move to observe the Clean Up proclamation.

The Standard editor is gratified to say that the majority of the residences visited by him on the North Side, were in admirable condition. Many of them were as trim and as neat as could be expected, with not a sign of rubbish to be found. Others had their rubbish gathered in a convenient spot, while a few—and they the exception—had a choice collection of garbage and refuse that should be an undertaker's delight.

Four committees had been sent out, each committee being composed of one member of the sanitary committee and one member of the Y. M. B. L., and the city had been divided into as many sections, each committee being responsible for his section. Each committee reports the same conditions was outlined in the preceding paragraph, many citizens having already observed the Clean Up, while others were engaged in the work, and still others promised their co-operation. Just a few exhibited indifference in the matter, and some were openly defiant.

The city wagons were started out yesterday and will gather free of all charge the rubbish that has been accumulated for them. The wagons will be continued on the work all week, or until every section has been visited and everyone has had an opportunity to do their part. If anyone is overlooked, he is kindly requested to notify the city sanitary department, and the wagon will be sent to his place.

Following the clean up week, an inspection will be made of all premises, and any of them remaining unsanitary, will have complaint brought against them. The clean up is absolutely essential to the general health and welfare, and its provisions are to be strictly enforced.

ORGANIZE RED CROSS SOCIETY

Initial Membership of Seventy-Five—Society to be Auxiliary of Brownwood Chapter

One of the most successful and enthusiastic of local meetings in many a day was the Red Cross tea given on Monday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. G. R. White, at which time a local Red Cross society was organized.

The White residence was beautifully decorated for the occasion, large U. S. flags adorning the various rooms and the entrance to the residence. In the dining room was a silver basket containing white roses tied with red, white and blue ribbon. The guests were met at the door by girls wearing aprons in the shape of a red cross and similar aprons were worn by the girls serving.

The purpose of the organization of a Red Cross chapter was explained by Mrs. J. H. White, who was made temporary chairman of the meeting. Mrs. J. R. Stone was selected as temporary secretary and Mrs. C. T. White temporary treasurer.

As explained by Mrs. White, the local society becomes an auxiliary of the Brownwood Red Cross chapter. The society is organized for a period of one year, and at the conclusion of this period it automatically goes out of existence, and cannot be reorganized without permission from the National Red Cross. Membership dues are \$1.00 per annum, and are forwarded to the parent organization at Brownwood, 50 per cent of the total dues being forwarded to the national headquarters and the balance retained by Brownwood. Voluntary contributions, however, remain in the home treasury for home use. Before becoming eligible to the "First Aid" society, one must be a member of the Red Cross association. Following the completion of the course in "First Aid" the student may stand an examination and qualify as an assistant to a regular nurse in field work. Mrs. White explained that the joining of the Red Cross society did not mean going to the battlefields, but that the organization devoted its energies to useful tasks at home.

The great interest in the work was evident in the enrollment of a total of 75 members in the local society. On account of the large number, it was decided to make three divisions of the body, one for the north side and two for the south side. A meeting of the organization will be held at the Odd Fellows hall on next Saturday at which time the organization will be made permanent, and by that time it is anticipated that advice will be had from the Brownwood chapter as to what class of work it is desired the Brady chapter shall engage in. A "First Aid" society was also formed.

Co-incident with the organization of the chapter, a very enjoyable social time was enjoyed by the guests. A quartette composed of Mesdames W. D. Crothers, Duke Mann, Edd Broad and O. E. Jackson sang the "Star Spangled Banner" and "America." Tea was served, and the voluntary contribution totalled \$25.70, which, together with the money contributed to the fund by members of social clubs, makes a very nice nest egg for the new Red Cross chapter.

It is desired that as many as may be interested in the work, join the local body, new members being welcome at any time.

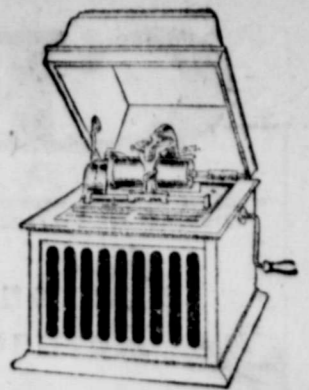
