Mc-Culloch county citizens are not conferring a favor upon anyone when they contribute their pro rata—to do otherwise is to be a slacker the same as if you had failed to register when the government called. .. When you contribute to the Red Cross fund, you are actually putting in money to save lives—of a stranger, maybe; perhaps of a friend—and, who knows, maybe of your own kith and kin. Statistics show that 90 per cent of the wounded who receive first aid, recover and are enabled to go back to the front. Of those who go 24 hours without medical attention, but 40 per cent recover. .. In other words, the money you contribute will do its part towards saving the life of some soldier—some mother's son maybe your own.




