



Shortage in Raw Materials Gives Rise to Alarm Among Manufacturing Interests-America Must Apply Every Resource to Meet World's Demand for Food-Labor Saving Machines and Man Power on the Farms Vital Factors in Economic Crisis-Appeal for Government Action.

Government action ensuring the farmers of America ample supplies of farm implements and competent farm labor is virtually necessary to this country's future participation in the war, declare the manufacturers of farming tools and machinery in the United States. This action must be immediate and radical, they say, or in 1918 the United States will fall to profuce foodstuffs necessary to feed the civil population of our allies and to keep the allied armies in tighting trim. This declaration is made in a public statement by the National Implement and Vehicle Association, whose members manufacture most of the farming implements used in and exported from the United States. It is the Association's answer to an anxious inquiry ment shortage addressed to it in behalf of the country's farming interests by ex-Governor W. D. Hoard of Wisconsin, one of the leaders of American agriculture and publisher of Hoard's Dairyman. The statement, which is signed by Charles S. Brantingham, Chairman of the Association's Executive Committee, says: Unless prompt action is taken by

When the Secretary of the Treasury came to estimate the additional war expenses for the year 1917-18, he calculated that they would amount to some \$6,600,-000,000, of which \$3,000,000,000 was to be allotted to the allies, and \$3,600,-000,000 was to be utilized for the do mestic purposes. Thinking that it would be a fair proposition to divide this latter sum between loans and taxes, he concluded that the amount

tent on loans at the outset of a war is a mistake. Disadvantages of Excessive Taxes.

The disadvantages of excessive taxes at the outset of the war are as follows 1. Excessive taxes on consumption will cause popular resentment. 2. Excessive taxes on industry will disarrange business, damp enthusiasm and restrict the spirit of enterprise at the very time when the opposite is

3. Excessive taxes on incomes will de plete the surplus available for invest the enormous loans which will be neces sary in any event.

4. Excessive taxes on wealth will cause a serious diminution of the inomes which are at present largely drawn upon for the support of educational and philanthropic enterprises. Moreover, these sources of support would be dried up precisely at the time when the need would be greatest.

5. Excessive taxation at the outset of the war will reduce the elasticity available for the increasing demands that are soon to come.

Great Britain's Policy. Take Great Britain as an example. During the first year of the war she increased taxes only slightly, in order to keep industries going at top notch. During the second year she raised by
