usual, it may be harder for the graduates to locate a good, steady job. However, in our immediate area, there always seems to be jobs for those who really want to work, so if you are in this category, you'll probably make out all right.

+ + + +AN OLD IDEA REGARDING the state of Texas has been brought up by a pair of legislators. With all of the flack that Texas has been receiving, although the state is the nation's richest energy-producer, the idea may have some merit.

We refer to the old idea, and privilege that the state has, of dividing itself up into five smaller states.

Buffeted by Eastern ecologists who oppose offshore oil drilling and construction of oil refineries, and newer threats, such as the loss of natural gas for irrigation purposes, the failure of the farm bill, etc., the idea may be getting closer to being a reality.

According to the treaty under which Texas joined the United States, we retained the right to divide into as many as five states.

Using a little quick arithmetic one can easily see that this would give Texas ten senators instead of two, and would still leave Texans with less representation than New England, which has only 66,608 square miles, to Texas' 267,338.

New England now outvotes Exas 37-26 in the electoral college. Should the state vote to split up, this would be reduced to 37-34. "Splithood" would not change the setup in the House of Representatives, since this is based on population.

State senator Bob Gammage, and Dallas representative Fred Agnich are supporting a movement which would call for a referendum on the splitting question on next year's general election ballot.

We would like to see the referendum, just to see out of curiosity how the voters would react. As usual, the referendum would not be binding, but it would give state legislators a yardstick to go by.

There was a time when we doubt if such a proposition would have been favored by many, simply because of plain old stupidity called PRIDE at being the largest state, for whatever that was worth.

However, since Alaska came along and punctured most Texans' egos, we won't have to worry about that problem quite as much. (Many Texans, though, contend that Texas MAHON VISITS....Congressman George Mahon was greeted by about 70 Bovina residents at a coffee and reception Tuesday afternoon in Community Room of First State Bank of Bovina. Dr. Laycock Presents Visiting Teams Report

Dr. Kenneth Laycock of Canyon met with members of the board of trustees of Bovina Schools and a number of interested spectators

The two Texas lawmakers argue that our state is the nation's major energy producer, one of the major agricultural, industrial and shipping states, but can be rendered helpless in the U.S. Senate, where little old New England has 12 votes to our two.


Three members of the preliminary visiting team and Dr. Laycock wrote reports on their observations during a two-day visit at Bovina Schools.

Noting that the school had "reached a very critical point," Dr. Laycock said positive or negative actions resulting from the self evaluation process would be determined by the community and school. He said there were "islands of strength within the school" and that Bovina needed to conserve what some fine points, saying the team had classified a high percentage of the teachers as outstanding instructors.

"There is an unusually high level of community interest in this school," he commented. Noting that in a number of communities, the interest begins and ends with the sports program, he said that "everyone involved seems to want what is best for the students, even though there has been some evident differences of opinion. The adults should put aside their differences and work for what is better for Bovina Schools."

In conclusion, Laycock noted that "it's difficult to be introspective, but as most faculty members become absorbed in the self-evaluation plan, they become very enthusiastic about what can be accomplished." (Continued on Page 4)

JUNE 7 **Tests Set For Pre-Schoolers**

Vision screening tests for preschool age children of Bovina will be held Saturday, June 7, at the First State Bank it was announced today by Mrs. Kregg Wilson, chairman of the screening project.

Volunteers trained by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness will screen youngsters ages 3-6 for signs of visual problems between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. The volunteer screeners are members of Bovina Young Homemakers.

"Some childhood eye defects, if not corrected before the age of six, can lead to permanent loss of vision in the affected eye," Mrs. Wilson pointed out today in urging all parents to bring their youngsters to the free screening program.

"Children must rely on adults for good sight," she said. "By himself, the child has no way of telling whether his sight is good or bad. A youngster may suffer from blurred vision or use only one eye to see, and still not complain because he doesn't realize he should see better."

The program is being sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and has the endorsement of the Parmer County Medical Society with the cooperation of Dr. Paul Spring. It is under the direction of a Project Advisory Committee.

to detect signs of possible vision defects in children at an age when they still can be corrected with best results. The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness estimates that there are 700,000 school children in Texas needing eye care. Vision difficulties in school chidren can

Volunteer teams will check the child's visual acuity by means of a Snellen "E" chart. If the youngster's performance gives evidence of a vision difficulty, he will be "referred"; this means the parents are notified in writing of the child's need for a complete, professional eye examination. Subsequently, each referral is followed-up to insure that the child has undergone the necessary examination.

Instructor for the training course for screening volunteers was a program consultant for the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Highway Patrol Lists 9 Parmer **April Wrecks**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of April, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of




