


Coronation ceremonies of football queen and football hero are scheduled for half-time of the Bovina-Lazbuddie football game on Mustang Field.

Pleased we were to read in last week's issue of this paper that steps are being taken by the post office department to get overnight mail delivery in this area.

October 31 is the date set for putting the overnight delivery into effect.

Since Bovina Businesses Football Contest started a couple of weeks ago, we've noticed that the mail from Farwell to Bovina is slow. This probably is caused more by the geographical location between Bovina and Farwell and their post office sectional centers, Amarillo and Lubbock, respec-

tively, than anything else. The way we understand the set-up, we on the end of the line, so to speak, from the Amarillo center, and the same is true for Farwell and its Lubbock sectional center.

Thus, mail from Bovina to Farwell, say, has to go to Amavina. rillo, then Lubbock, then Farwell. This is true eventhough the two towns are only 12 miles apart. We're not against the post office's way of shipping the mail as long as we get the kind of delivery service we figure we're entitled to.

We tend to be old-maidish about the football contest entry blanks and when we received several from Farwell in Monday's mail we carefully and individually examined the post marks to be sure they all said no later than "Sept. 17" since Friday is, of course, the deadline for getting entries in the mail or in the contest entry box for that week.

Sure enough, they all qualified from the post mark standpoint. Not all the Farwell entries came that late; just some of them.



Parmer County Football --

Ponies Earn 6-6 Tie With AA Chieftains

First Deadlock In 12 Games

In drizzling rain and uncomfortable, unseasonable low temperatures, the Bovina Mustangs battled the Friona Chieftains to a 6-6 deadlock in the second football game of the season for each team Friday night on the Friona field.

The tie, though it will forever be considered that in the record books, was a victory of a sort for the Class A Mustangs as they went into the game as underdogs to the Class AA Chieftains.

The weather, no doubt, hampered the offensive play of both teams. The drizzle made the pigskin slick and limited the number of passes which the teams would have probably thrown under normal, dry con-

ditions. The weather was also considered to be at least partially responsible for fumbles during the tilt. The Chieftains had five fumbles while the Mustangs were guilty of three miscues.

Except for the one scoring play by each team, the game had a defensive nature. After allowing the Friona team a TD on its first possession, the Mustangs played tough defense for the remaining three and a half quarters.

Offensively, the Mustangs managed only three first downs while the Chieftains had eight. Bovina's tally came early in


